

Law Enforcement's New Yardstick

ST. AUGUSTINE—Perhaps it will never quite rank with the landing of Juan Ponce de Leon in 1513, or the sacking of the city by Sir Francis Drake in 1586, but the Florida Sheriffs Association took an important step here on Jánuary 20, 1966, which I hope will someday be added to St. Augustine's stockpile of historic events.

It happened during the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Association, and I am not referring to my election as president. Some future historian may be willing to waste a footnote on the fact that I was the second St. Augustinian to be so honored; but the important event I have in mind—the real "meat" of the meeting for historians—was the passing of a resolution dealing with something new under the Florida sun: voluntary minimum standards for law enforcement officers.

This resolution, which matches similar action taken by the Florida Police Chiefs Association, calls for creation of a Governor's Advisory Council for Voluntary Minimum Standards composed of four members of the Florida Sheriffs Association, four members of the Florida Police Chiefs Association, the Attorney General and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction—all to be appointed by the Governor.

It will be the function of this council to recommend minimum standards for law enforcement recruits such as age, background, citizenship, education and physical and mental fitness.

The council will also recommend voluntary minimum standards for in-service training of law enforcement officers.

If the recommendations are then adopted statewide by Sheriffs and Police Chiefs, law enforcement will take a giant stride forward in quality and professional status. Salaries will be upgraded; officers will have more incentive to take in-service training; and better qualified recruits will become available.

Obviously the impact of the action we took in St. Augustine can be very great; and I doubt that the Florida Sheriffs Association, with its large array of accomplishments, has ever taken a more important step, or one that has a greater potential for the betterment of law enforcement.

I intend to give it my full support, and I hope every Sheriff and Police Chief will do likewise; so that January 20, 1966, will go down in the records as one of the most important dates in the history of law enforcement in Florida.

It can be just that.





YEARS OF PROGRESS

Here is a condensation of an address presented at the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, January 19, 1966, by Ed Yarbrough, Executive Director of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau. In it he discusses the Bureau's first decade of progress (1955-1965); the present status; and plans for the future.

We have just passed our 10th anniversary.

You sheriffs got together recognizing the fact that we needed a clearing house in Florida to swap information and to gather facts, and you came up with the idea of the creation of a state agency known as the Florida Sheriffs Bureau. It was designed by you sheriffs of Florida. So, in the 1955 session of the Florida Legislature, this Bureau was created. On October 1, 1955, it opened its doors with two employees in a small, dilapidated brick building with no appropriation. Since that time, in the short ten years that have passed, our authorized strength has increased to 78 employees, we have a budget of a million and a half, and we have two specially designed floors in the newest building in the Capitol Center in Tallahassee housing your Bureau.

MANY ACCOMPLISHMENTS HAVE BEEN MADE — many achievements that we are very proud of. We have there the facilities to serve all law enforcement agencies throughout Florida, and many in the Southeast. We have the finest crime lab in the Nation. We have the Bureau staffed with the most competent people in the Nation. We have a fingerprint file there consisting of over 700,000 fingerprints, and the well known Crime Bulletin that all of us use.

Those are just some of the things that we offer in addition to the small, but very efficient, field force of very able men who assist sheriffs when called upon.

Many people have referred to the Bureau as the Scotland Yard of Florida, which is a proper name because we have been as successful, although on a smaller scale, and too, like Scotland Yard, we only go when requested. You could call the Bureau "the silent service," because no matter how much effort is put into closing out a case, we stand back and do not take any credit. We give it to the requesting authorities.

SO, ACTUALLY YOU SEE, THERE ARE MANY FINE ASPECTS of this Bureau, and principally we are talking about the anniversary and the services offered. I think it is proper to recognize some of the people who have pioneered this fine organization. You know, an organization is nothing but people. The organization has been able to achieve much success over the years. While looking back through the records there, I find that out of the first seven people employed by the Bureau, five are still there and have passed the ten-year mark. I would like to announce those people publicly.

First we have the assistant director, Ross Anderson. He was there the day the door opened — he and the director. Ross resigned a job as chief deputy of the criminal department of Hillsborough County and placed his faith in the success of the Sheriffs Bureau, not even knowing whether or not we would have a permanent payroll. He has done a fine job in helping steer this Bureau through the years, and he still does a good job. He is a very able man.

THE NEXT AGENT, THE NUMBER TWO MAN, was Berwin Williams, whom all of you know and all of you like. A very capable self-made man who I think is primarily responsible for the success of our Law Enforcement Academy.

And number three, this lovable lady, Mrs. Bertha Catts, who already had retired from Western Union and came into the Bureau as supervisor of publications and communications. She attacks her job with the vim and vigor of a young person, and is still doing a fine job. Not only is she such a fine administrator for her department, but her retentive memory is one that is recognized throughout the South.

And number four, another fine lady, Mrs. Vera Teston, who is the secretary to the assistant director. She has been there ten years. This lady continues to smile even though her desk might be

covered up in work. She is a very efficient, fine lady.

NOW FIFTH, IN THIS ORDER, BUT FIRST IN THE ORDER OF THE BUREAU is that veteran of over ten years, a man who resigned his elected office as sheriff of Marion County and went to Tallahassee and opened the doors of this Bureau in that small brick building, without any appropriation and has achieved many accomplishments in the short ten years he has been there. In fact, we could base this whole talk on the accomplishments this man has made. He was the first and only director of the Sheriffs Bureau until my appointment.

After getting to the Bureau, I find that I have to appreciate this man even more than I did before I got there, because I found out so many things that he has accomplished — how well he had screened his employees, how well he had established the chain of command, and all the service this man had put into action in your Bureau. I find that he has to be a man, not only a politician, but a diplomat, an ad-



ministrator, a great statesman, but most of all, what I hope I will be, what he has already been and still is, a sheriff's kind of sheriff.

THERE ARE NOT WORDS APPROPRIATE TO TELL how I feel about Don McLeod, and I know that I speak for all of you fellows when I say, Don, that these men appreciate all that you have done, and I wish there was some better way of expressing it. Here is a man who has cut his mark deep into the history of Florida. And I don't know, Don, of anything that you could have done that would be of more benefit to the State of Florida than what you have done for law enforcement.

There is not anything or anybody that the Sheriffs Association is more indebted to than Don McLeod for his untiring efforts. And your mark will be there long after all of us have passed on, and the people of Florida will always be glad that Don McLeod lived here one time.

NOW THAT WE HAVE PASSED THE TEN-YEAR MARK, I want you to know how happy I am that you sheriffs had confidence enough in me to recommend me to the Governor of Florida and to the Board of Directors of the Sheriffs Bureau to bring about my appointment as Executive Director of the Bureau.

I realize that I have a very important job, and I have a very big task to keep up the pace that has been set by Don. I fully realize that although we have a wonderful agency in the Bureau, that no organization is ever perfected to the degree that we can't grow, and I intend to do as Director McLeod has in the past, and by that I mean build the Bureau constantly each year, and try to increase its service. I want to stay in close touch with you sheriffs and fellow

law enforcement agents, and other state officials, so that I will know your needs and try to perfect the services that we render.

I HAVE NUMEROUS PROJECTS IN MIND, and I would like to mention just one at this time. You have probably read about it in the newspaper. This is something that I think all of us should be deeply concerned about, and that is a computer—data processing equipment.

I have made a proposal and it is in the form now to be presented to the Auditing Department, which is the committee that has been established for this, asking them to consider placing a computer system in the Sheriffs Bureau, one that would handle the processing of stolen property by serial numbers and the processing of identification of known criminals by name. We would be able to furnish this information to all law enforcement agencies in Florida, and in addition to these two items, we could put our accounting and administrative office into the machine. and I would welcome and call on other agencies of government in Tallahassee such as the Beverage Department, Conservation Department, and the Highway Patrol to put their portion of law enforcement into this computer.

Incriminating Evidence From the Tiniest Clue


The things they do with evidence in the Florida Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory are enough to make a tough criminal cry. Aided by the latest scientific equipment, skilled technicians can turn the faintest clue — a strand of hair, flakes of paint, charred ashes — into a piece of incriminating evidence. Much of this vital work comes under the heading of "criminalistics" and it involves chemistry, ballistics and microanalysis (see photos on this page). During 1965 the "criminalistics" section of the crime laboratory examined.


3,200 exhibits in 665 crime cases.

The total for all sections of the laboratory was

7,405 exhibits in 2,272 crime cases.

Spectrographic analysis (photo at right) is used to identify and compare materials such as paint, soil, etc. The evidence to be tested is burned at a high temperature and the scientific results are recorded on film.





The Gas Chromatograph (photo at right) is used to determine the composition of evidence. It will detect the presence of insecticides, alcohol, gasoline, kerosene and many other substances.



"Microanalysis" is the word used to describe what's going on in the picture at left. It involves chemical analysis as well as microscopic examination of evidence—anything from a piece of human hair to an auto fender.

Don't Call Them "Handwriting Experts"

The men who work in the Document Examination Unit of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau are more than mere "handwriting experts." Their correct title is Document Examiners and they can track a criminal not only by his handwriting, but also by his typewriter, his paper, the ink he uses and even by the fingerprints left on the paper. Using scientific means, they can decipher writing and printing from charred pieces of paper and determine the age of documents. In 1965 they produced

1,542 exhibits used in 1,042 criminal cases.



Is it a forged document? The picture above shows one way Document Examiners find out—by photographing printing or handwriting under infra-red luminescence. This will show whether a document contains the same ink throughout, or different inks.

Comparing samples of handwriting, as the Document Examiners at left are doing, is only one way of "putting the finger" on worthless check writers, forgers and other varieties of "white collar criminals."

The Polygraph Unit of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau operates primarily in the field, conducting examinations anywhere in the state with the use of portable equipment. Trained polygraph (lie detector) examiners use scientific means to test the veracity of witnesses and suspects; and the effectiveness of their work has prompted numerous Sheriffs to add polygraph examiners to their staffs. In 1965 the Polygraph Unit conducted

622 examinations in 422 criminal cases in 60 Florida counties*

319 persons were cleared in these examinations

298 showed guilt responses

191 admitted guilt, and there were

5 inconclusive examinations. *Plus 3 in Georgia

Words are Weapons

Words are weapons in the war against crime and the Florida Sheriffs Bureau uses them effectively through its Communications and Publications Unit. A steady flow of information is received from Sheriffs, police departments, constables and state agencies within Florida, as well as from the FBI and other agencies outside the state about wanted and missing persons, stolen property, etc. Vital information also flows out from the Bureau through a state-wide teletype network, the National Police TWX network and the Sheriffs Crime Bulletin, a handy periodical that has established a wide reputation as a catcher of criminals. In 1965 the Communications and Publications unit sent, received and processed:

38,283 teletype and TWX messages

It also published:

94 issues of the Crime Bulletin containing

2,293 items from

2.164 Florida agencies and

129 Out-of-state agencies.

The Crime Bulletin was mailed to: 1,102 subscribers in Florida and elsewhere.

This is where a criminal's past catches up with him — in the files of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau's Records and Indentification Section. Vital, crime-solving fingerprints are classified, filed, compared and searched here day after day in the never-ending task of finding the guilty and clearing the innocent. At the end of 1965 there were 562,271 fingerprint cards in the files. During the year—

95,816 cards were added to the files 559,103 comparisons of fingerprints were made from

1,662 latent fingerprints lifted in 399 crime cases.

This unit also checks and files fingerprints of state employees. During 1965 a total of

> 14,684 fingerprint cards were received in this category, and there were 80,263 in the files at the end of the

year.



Field Service Section Gives On-the-Scene Help

Although much of the important work of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau is performed in Tallahassee, on-the-scene help is also given to Sheriffs through the Field Service Section currently headed by Special Agent Emory Williams. Although the staff is small, trained investigators and polygraph (lie detector) examiners are located at strategic points throughout the state so they can be on the scene in a short time after a sheriff requests assistance. During 1965 this Section gave assistance in

269 crime cases in
41 counties; and logged
15,216 hours on the job with only
5 agents.
This made an average of
3,043 hours per agent.

Evidence brought to the Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory by the Field Section so metimes comes in large packages — like this safe that is being inspected for tool marks and fingerprints.

The Mobile Crime Unit is assigned to the Field Service Section of the Sheriffs Bureau and it is used in cases where it is more practical to take the crime laboratory to the evidence than to take the evidence to the crime laboratory. The Mobile Unit is loaded with equipment needed to process a crime scene scientifically — from camera equipment, special vacuum cleaners and metal detectors to floodlights, power tools and moulage supplies to make impressions of all kinds. During 1965 the Mobile Unit was responsible for 275 exhibits used in 53 crime cases.




Good Photo is Worth 1,000 Words of Testimony

The photographic unit at the Florida Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory is fully equipped to produce top quality pictures in black and white or color. Its competent staff can handle a wide variety of assignments ranging from an aerial photo of a crime scene to enlargements of microscopic bits of evidence. During 1965 the photographic unit processed

18,360 photographic prints, and prepared

2,663 photo exhibits in 565 crime cases.





A photographer in the Florida Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory never knows what his camera lens will be focusing on next. The only thing he can be sure of is that his day-to-day routine will bring him a wide assortment of subjects. In the picture above Photographer Jim Moore is zeroing in on a stolen saddle in an attempt to find identifying marks. His next photo subject could be the body of a crime victim, tool marks on a stolen safe, the handwriting of a check forger, a fingerprint from a stolen car, or a bullet fired from a holdup man's gun.

Getting the correct color balance is very important in producing color photographs to be used in crime cases: and Jim Moore shows how it's done in the Florida Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory. He is using a color enlarger coupled with a Color Densi-Meter.

The Highway Patrol could use the same computer for license tag and operator's license information. And we could tie this computer into a statewide teletype service direct from every Sheriff's Office in the 67 counties of Florida — each county having a direct contact with the Bureau and this computer. Every deputy sheriff, highway patrolman or city policeman or any law enforcement agent could stop a car, and before he made an arrest he could immediately radio his dispatcher and he could ask the computer in Tallahassee if this man was wanted or if this car was stolen. If there was a gun, television set or a kicker off a motor boat we could find if it was stolen.

THIS INFORMATION WOULD BE AVAILA-**BLE** for all sheriffs, constables, highway patrolmen and everyone. That's what we are, a service department. On the other hand, another phase of it is we would not be usurping any of the powers of local government but we would be giving you something to work with so that you can better serve and please your people.

Now those are some of the ideas that I have, and we are working continuously on them. I have assigned one agent the job of accumulating all the information, and we have met with the computer people, and the various committees of state government, and we are going ahead with this thing. I would appreciate any help you can give me.

There is one other phase that we are bothered with, of course, and that is the budget problem, and that can only be solved by the Legislature and you.

Thank you for letting me come here today, and I hope that I can meet with you for many more years. Thank you.

Enrollment Reached 100 in 1965 but We Had to Tell 30 Boys: "Sorry, We Don't Have Room for You"

A large sign at the main entrance of the Boys Ranch tells visitors how many boys we have enrolled.

But, it neglects to show an equally important figure — how many boys are on the waiting list and can't get in because our facilities are filled to capacity.

During 1965 the population of the Boys Ranch increased at an unprecedented rate, from 60 at the beginning of the year to 100 at the end of the year.

New facilities allowed us to admit more boys in just one year than we were able to handle in the first three years the Ranch was in operation; and yet we ended the year with 30 boys who had to be told: "Sorry, we can't take you now. We don't have room for you."

This waiting list is an important factor in the progress of the Boys Ranch because as long as there are boys "outside the gate" Sheriffs and Ranch officials will not be able to sit back and say "we have reached our goal." Consequently the need for funds, the need for public support, the need for new facilities never lets up. In fact, with each passing year the needs of the Ranch become more urgent.

To grow too fast would be disastrous. It could adversely effect the quality of care we are giving our present boys and it could overtax the efficiency of our capable, professional staff. But grow we must in response to the unseen waiting line outside the gate, and officials frankly hesitate to predict exactly how large the Ranch will become.

They know there is a practical limit somewhere in the future, but what it is and when they will reach it they do not know.

All they know is that they intend to continue to expand and improve the Ranch as fast as funds become available.






Boys Ranch Bequests

"I am including a bequest to the Boys Ranch in my will. How should I designate the legatee?"

This question is asked frequently and the answer is: "The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Fund."

Bequests are a major source of income. Some are designated for specific uses such as scholarships or new facilities. Others not earmarked go into our endowment trust fund which is administered by a large Florida bank, under supervision of the Ranch trustees.

The bequest you include in your will now will help to give future security to the boys presently enrolled at the Ranch, as well as to others who will follow in their footsteps.

Record Keeping Is a Big Job

Record keeping is a big job at the Boys Ranch.

It involves inventory control of all property, a strict accounting of all cash and non-cash gifts, and detailed records of all purchases—from shoe laces to fertilizer.

Treasurer J. L. McMullen, a Live Oak food processor, had much to do with setting up the system originally; and in recent years our internal auditor, Joe Henry, a former assistant state auditor, has refined it and made it more comprehensive. Both are non-salaried officials of the Ranch.

Once each year our accounts and records undergo an independent audit and a report is filed with Florida's Secretary of State and with the Clerk of the Circuit Court in Suwannee County.

We also make a report each year to the U. S. Internal Revenue Service to maintain our tax exempt status; and we are proud of the fact that all donations have been ruled deductible for income tax purposes ever since the early days of the Ranch.

We are proud too that the Ranch is now debt-free. Mortgages that were negotiated with Live Oak banks to purchase a major portion of the 737-acre site in 1957 were paid off in 1964.

One rule we rigidly follow in our record keeping is that every donation, no matter how large or how small, must be acknowledged with a letter and an official receipt.

Physical Fitness More Than a Phrase

Physical fitness is more than a phrase at the Boys Ranch—and more than just building strength and stamina, although there's plenty of that too.

Each boy receives a complete physical at least once a year, and special check-ups in between whenever necessary, under the experienced eye of Dr. J. W. Hayes, Jacksonville pediatrician who is the Ranch's non-salaried Chief Medical Officer.

The Jacksonville Dental Society does its bit too. Members donate thousands of dollars worth of routine and specialized dental care each year.

Some glasses and eye care are also provided free of charge through Lions Clubs; and the local public health nurse assists with the operation of the small medical clinic established at the Ranch.

Without the help of all these generous people, our medical and dental bills would be staggering.



It doesn't really hurt that much, but some boys see a dentist's drill for the first time after they come to the Ranch. In just a short while they become accustomed to the new experience of regular dental and medical care.

It May Be Easier Than You Realize

Many of our supporters indicate they would like to make a large contribution to the Boys Ranch but they just can't afford it.

If this is your problem, here is a

suggestion:

Go see your favorite insurance agent and tell him you want to take out a life insurance policy with the Boys Ranch as the irrevocable beneficiary. Then you pay just a few dollars a month on the insurance premium, and the Boys Ranch holds the policy as a guarantee of your "deferred gift."

For example, a loyal supporter in his

late forties took out a life insurance policy that will give the Boys Ranch \$4,000 when he dies, and it is costing him less than \$18 a month.

But there is a lasting way to preserve the memory of deceased relatives and friends.


We call it our "Memorial Fund."







FACTS

About the Ranch

LOCATION—11 miles north of Live Oak, Florida, on the Suwannee River and about midway between Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

MAILING ADDRESS—Route 3, Live Oak, Florida

FOUNDED—in 1957 by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

BEGAN OPERATION—in February, 1959, when the first boys were admitted.

FINANCING—supported entirely by public donations. (They are deductible for income tax purposes.)

SIŽE—737 acres of rolling farmlands.

ENROLLMENT—100 boys. Eventual goal: 400 boys.

PURPOSE — to provide a good home and a secure future for Florida's needy and worthy boys—to give them love, security, discipline and all of the essential advantages that are every American boy's birthright. The Ranch is not a "reform school" or a "correctional institution." Boys enrolled at the Ranch are there simply because they need a good home—because they are the innocent victims of neglect or lack of opportunity.

AGE LIMITS—To be admitted a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 16. Once he is admitted, the Ranch becomes his home and he remains there through high school and college unless his home situation improves or another good home develops.

ELIGIBILITY — Each boy who meets the mental and physical requirements must also be approved by the Sheriff and the Juvenile Court Judge of the county in which he resides.

SOURCE OF BOYS—Applicants
are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by
school and juvenile court officials.

1965 Was Year of "Growing Pains"

The youngsters at the Boys Ranch aren't the only ones who suffer from "growing pains."

The Ranch itself had a lively case during 1965 as staff members and trustees struggled to meet the problems and adjustments arising from a "population explosion" that boosted the enrollment from 60 at the beginning of the year to 100 at the end of the year.

In terms of community growth this may seem insignificant, but the Ranch is not a community, it is a family and any of our readers who are parents know what it means to add just one child to a family.

The expense of enrolling 40 additional boys caused plenty of worries, but it was only one of many problems.

There was also the impact on the local community and school system, because we always strive to keep our boys involved in the community, not isolated from it.

There were new staff members to be hired and new lines of responsibility to be established within the staff organization.

But, just like boys usually do, the Ranch emerged from its case of growing pains as a stronger, healthier and more professionally mature institution.

That's the kind of a year it was.

Fire Station

Youngsters at the Boys Ranch are looking forward to the day when they will have their own fire department. It will be housed in a \$25,000 fire station and repair shop paid for by the Florida State Firemen's Association.

Major Improvements During 1965

WATER SYSTEM - Completion of a water system capable of meeting the current needs of the Boys Ranch was one of the major improvements during 1965. It includes a 15,000gallon ground reservoir, a 4,000-gallon pressure tank, two deep wells and equipment to chlorinate and aerate the water. The 1965 expansion and improvement of the system was made possible through the generosity of J. T. Crawford, of Lake Wales. He donated two new houses to the Ranch and they were sold at auction for almost \$40,000. The balance of the money is earmarked for a proposed laundry and storage building.

SEWER SYSTEM — Preliminary engineering work was completed for a much-needed sewer and fire protection system. It will include sewage lines, water mains for fire hydrants, a sewage treatment plant and storm sewers. The first phase of the work, including the building of a treatment plant, is expected to cost around

\$45,000.

NEW COTTAGE — Construction of Merrill Memorial Cottage and conversion of Lewis Memorial Cottage from a temporary dining hall to a residence building were completed; boosting the Ranch capacity to 100 boys.

Adventure in Faith

Supported entirely by voluntary donations, the Boys Ranch has sometimes been called "an adventure in faith" because its future security is based upon our faith in the kindness and generosity of the American people.

We receive our support in two ways:

- (1) Honorary Members of the Florida Sheriffs Association pay dues of \$10 a year and this money is used for the benefit of the Ranch as well as other worthy Association projects.
- Many persons make direct donations which are used exclusively for the Ranch — and which are deductible for income tax purposes.

BOYS RANCH MOVIE

Clubs, fraternal groups, churches and other organizations throughout Florida will have an opportunity to see a new movie about the Boys Ranch during 1966.

Produced by Beckley Films Incorporated, of Bradenton, the 14½-minute film is entitled "One More Boy." It is a 16-millimeter sound film in color.

Filmed during the closing weeks of 1965, it shows the latest improvements at the Ranch and the day-to-day life of the boys.

Anyone wishing to arrange to have the film shown before a group should contact his local Sheriff or write to the Boys Ranch.

Stature of Staff Better and Better

We're proud of the fact that the professional stature of our staff is constantly improving.

Just before this issue of THE RANCHER went to press the entire staff participated in a week of in-service training under the guidance of Sam Fudge, Group Child Care Consultant from the University of North Carolina School of Social Welfare.

The training consisted of a series of group meetings and individual interviews. It gave staff members an opportunity to evaluate their own work and to receive suggestions from a man with outstanding credentials in the field of child care.

Last summer our house parents attended a one-week group child care workshop at Stetson University. Several of them also attended a Child-Parent Relations meeting in Jacksonville.

Takes More Than Food & Clothes

Frugal management makes it possible for us to feed a boy for \$1 a day, including snacks and school lunches; and to clothe him for \$75 a year.

But food and clothing are only a small part of the total expense of raising a boy.

A larger chunk of our budget goes for housing, laundry, education, medical care, dental care and other personal needs.

Then there's also the expense of paid parental care — the countless acts of kindness and guidance our dedicated

house parents provide — from helping with homework to bandaging a skinned knee.

We could never pay them adequately for the work they do, but we do have to pay them and this is an expense most families don't have to consider. Parents don't normally get paid for being parents.

On top of all this we have to provide water service, electricity, telephone service fire protection, garbage service, sewage service and all of the other modern advantages normally supplied by a small municipality.

Sheriffs' Choice:

Win the War (Against Crime)

Or Open the Door

(To Federal Intervention)

"If we fail to make gains against the crushing wave of crime which is upon us," State Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson, Jr., told Sheriffs, "we will awaken one day to the startling reality that we have left the door wide open for federal intervention in state law enforcement far beyond our wildest dreams."

ST. AUGUSTINE — "Our nation desperately needs a three-pronged advance to turn back the rising tide of crime which threatens our very way of life," State Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson, Jr., told Sheriffs and guests attending the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Addressing a luncheon meeting in the Hotel Ponce de Leon, on January 20, 1966, he said we first need to "shore up the sagging sides of our code of ethics and recognize that our police work for good and criminals are enemies of everything decent in society."

"Secondly," he said, "society must scream its savage scorn at the all-too-prevalent, but mis-guided notion of today which mollycoddles the hoodlum, indulges the sadistic caprices of the arrogant and law-breaking juvenile, and which all too frequently seems to think that the duty of society is to protect the criminal from being punished for his deeds."

"Thirdly," he added, "lawmen must not wrap themselves in the pride of their past accomplishments, forgetting that today is a new era, demanding more effort, more advanced equipment and even greater skills and techniques in combatting crime."

"Today," he continued, "America is undergoing what tomorrow's historians will label the greatest revolutionary change in our history. Much of this change is for the good of society—toward a better life with more recreational and work advantages, more leisure for constructive purposes and a better hope for tomorrow. Yet paralleling this fantastic advancement are the changes which are gnawing at the foundation of our society, undermining the pillars of morality which give our life its direction and purpose.

"No segment of this deterioration is more alarming than the utter disregard for law enforcement which we see evidenced by youth of today who are on the brink of adulthood. Some of this blatant attitude of scorn certainly has to be laid at the doorstep of the parents who have failed to exercise their parental control. Psychologists give us other reasons, too, but regardless of the reason, the fact remains that it is the duty of the Sheriff and other lawmen to daily face the criminal and the hoodlum.

"Every day the criminal is improving his techniques for wrongdoing. Just as lawmen employ fancy, new electronic gimmicks, the hoodlum adapts this same equipment to his own bag of tricks designed to thwart your efforts.

"The only way to meet and to subdue this natural enemy is to be smarter than your adversary. The educational level of sheriffs' forces has increased sharply over recent years, but it must be raised even more. Your equipment to fight crime must be the best.

"If we fail in Florida to fix these goals for our Sheriffs' offices, and if we fail to make gains against the crushing wave of crime which is upon us, we will awaken one day to the startling reality that we have left the door wide open for federal intervention in state law enforcement far beyond our wildest dreams. Your authority as a state constitutional officer will be stripped, and you will find yourself relegated solely to that symbol of the big hat, pistol and no authority.

"You have my promise of support of any effort designed to strengthen law enforcement, which is aimed at giving the lawman a better whip hand over

Bureau Identifies Two Unknown Accident Victims

Identifying unknown dead persons is a time consuming and frustrating task but Sheriffs frequently get valuable and fast assistance from the Florida Sheriffs Bureau.

Here are two examples reported within a period of three days by Tom Boen, Special Agent in Charge of the Bureau's Identification section:

On January 18, 1966, Deputy Sheriff John W. Harrison teletyped to the Bureau a general description and fingerprint classification of an unknown man who had been killed in an auto accident.

The Bureau fingerprint files were searched and Harrison was notified that the subject had been tentatively identified as Jim Lee Harris.

Harrison then sent the dead man's fingerprints to the Bureau and the tentative identification was confirmed on January 20.

On the same date the Bureau received from the Broward County Sheriff's Department the fingerprints and description of an unidentified man killed in a hit-and-run accident case.

In a short time he was identified as Elijah Robinson, whose fingerprints had originally been sent to the Bureau by the Orange County Sheriff's Department after he had been arrested for public drunkenness.

Boen pointed to this as a good argument in favor of fingerprinting all arrested persons regardless of the seriousness of the crime.

Only Four Counties Under Fee System

The antiquated fee system of operating Sheriff's Departments is dying out faster than the editor of THE SHER-IFF'S STAR realized.

An article he printed in the November issue said there were five small counties still operating under this system with its traditional evils, when actually there were only four.

Jefferson County was listed as a fee

system county, but Sheriff J. B. Thomas later set the record straight by explaining that he had been operating under the modern budget-salary system since October 1, 1964.

This leaves only Franklin, Gadsden, Hamilton and Sumter Counties on the fee system; and the Sheriffs Association is one step nearer to victory in its long battle against the "arrests for profit" approach to law enforcement.

the criminal. That promise comes from no Johnnycome-lately. I co-introduced the bill creating the Sheriffs Bureau and introduced the bill standardizing the color of sheriffs' official cars. I authored the bill on budgets which removed sheriffs of Florida from the unhealthy fee system of operation.

"I see three principal aims for sheriffs, and they are the same three aims which can be applied to State Cabinet members. They are: Education, administration and service to people.

"As I leave you here today, I would leave this

final thought: Pride of our accomplishments in government in the past 10 years is insufficient for use as a springboard to the next decade. We face greater challenges for tomorrow than we dreamed of yes-

"Through conscientious application of the aims and goals which you already have set for yourself, and from the knowledge that if we fail in handling our governmental work chores at the state level they will be usurped by federal intervention, we should have the strength and zeal and ambition to cope with the responsibilities of tomorrow."

Six New Schools --- Greater Training Opportunities

That's the Outlook at Florida Law Enforcement Academy for 1966

A greatly expanded curriculum will allow Florida Law Enforcement Academy to offer 21 training schools with a total of 28 weeks of instruction during 1966.


This represents an increase of almost 65 per cent over the 15 schools and 17 weeks of instruction offered in 1965.

There will be six new schools in the 1966 line-up. One of them will be Police Administration III — a series of seminars on specialized subjects such as budgets. Police Administration I, an introductory course for supervisory personnel; and Police Administration II, for command level personnel; will be offered again to round out the Administrative Training portion of the curriculum.

The other new schools, all in the area of Specialized Training, will cover Patrol Procedures, Training for Firearms Instructors; Traffic Accident Investigations; General Training for Instructors; and Training for Water Safety Instructors.

There will be 10 additional sessions of Specialized Training covering Burglary-Larceny-Robbery; Civil Disturbances-Prevention & Control; Civil Process Procedures; Death Investigations & Sex Crimes; Fingerprint Classification-Identification; Jail Management-Security; Photography; Vice Investigations; and a Polygraph (lie detector) Workshop.

General Training I, II and III will be offered again, with a total of 360 hours of instruction.

Created in 1964 through the combined efforts of The Florida Sheriffs Association and the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, Florida Law Enforcement Academy is Florida's first state-wide in-service training facility for city, county, state and federal law enforcement officers.

The Florida Sheriffs Association, a non-profit corporation with all of the state's 67 Sheriffs as dues paying members, built the facilities.

The Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created by the 1955 Legislature to assist Sheriffs with their crime fighting activities, is responsible for all training programs.

In addition to its training activities, the Bureau provides a wide variety of services for Sheriffs such as a crime lab; a records and identification section; and highly trained investigators.

THE FUNDAMENTAL OBJECTIVES OF THE FLORIDA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY ARE:

- 1. To establish the most effective and the most complete in-service training program possible.
- 2. To make all Academy training programs available to all enforcement officers and to all enforcement agencies at every governmental level in Florida at minimum cost.
- 3. In so doing, to seek and receive the guidance.

assistance and cooperation of Florida's enforcement executives, as well as other interested individuals, in order to provide the type and the range of in-service law enforcement training that is most needed.

THE ADMINISTRATION AND FISCAL MANAGEMENT OF THE ACADEMY IS ACCOMPLISHED IN THE FOLLOWING MANNER:

- 1. All financial affairs of the Academy are managed entirely by the Florida Sheriffs Association . . . strictly on a non-profit basis . . . with the entire operating budget being derived from the tuition fees which are paid by the agency by which the student is employed.
- 2. The Academy is located on a ten-acre site adjacent to the Tallahassee Municipal Airport; and presently consists of three major buildings: a two-story dormitory with 18 two-man private rooms; a two-story classroom and combination dining and recreation building; and a one-story administration building. The entire facility is year 'round conditioned to insure maximum student comfort. All meals are served in the Academy dining room.

The property, buildings and furnishings are owned by the Florida Sheriffs Association but the entire complex has been made available to the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, at absolutely no cost.

 The administration of all Academy training programs is the responsibility of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, and is accomplished through the Bureau's Training and Research Section.


THE ACADEMY CURRICULUM, DEVELOPED BY A COMMITTEE OF EIGHTEEN MEN SELECTED BY THE GOVERNOR, CONSISTS OF THREE MAJOR DIVISIONS:

- 1. **GENERAL TRAINING** . . . offered in: one-week basic training (60 hours); and two-week advanced training (100 hours).
- 2. SPECIALIZED TRAINING . . . offered in one and two-week schools . . . with a selection of 12 different, highly specialized subjects (50 to 100 hours).
- 3. ADMINISTRATIVE TRAINING . . . offered in: one-week Police Administration courses (available at 3 levels) (50 hours); unlimited number of subjects (20-30 hours).





ACADEMY INSTRUCTORS ARE SELECTED FROM AN EVER-LENGTHENING LIST OF PERSONS WHO SERVE WITHOUT COMPENSATION:

 In order to maintain the highest possible standards at the lowest possible cost, the majority of the instruction at the Academy is provided by a host of guest instructors. A cadre of Florida Sheriffs Bureau personnel provides the remainder.

2. All guest instructors are selected on the basis of their particular education, training and experience, and their potential contribution to

a given course of instruction.

3. All guest instructors donate their time and effort to the Academy. Instructors are not paid to teach and no Academy funds are available to pay their travel costs. Meals and a room at the Academy are offered.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS:

- 1. Applicant must be a duly constituted law enforcement officer employed by a city, county, state or federal enforcement agency; or functioning in an official capacity generally construed to be investigative, and specifically related to enforcement activity.
- 2. An applicant must be sponsored by the executive officer of the agency by which he is employed; and recommended by the Sheriff of the county in which he resides.
- A statement of applicant's medical condition is required. This serves as a safeguard for all students.
- An application form, furnished by the Academy, must be completed.

THE SPONSORING DEPARTMENT IS REQUIRED TO PAY A TUITION FEE FOR EACH STUDENT:


The tuition fee is \$75.00 per student per week. It includes housing, meals and all required training materials.

GENERAL OPERATING PROCEDURES:

- 1. All students must reside in Academy housing.
- 2. General rules of good conduct are applicable.
- 3. Gross infractions of the rules subject students to possible dismissal.
- 4. Class hours are not less than 10 hours per day.


CHARLOTTE COUNTY FIRST TO HIT 100% MARK

WATER SAFETY COURSE

Courses to Be Offered to Young Boatmen

Start 'em young—this is the new approach Florida's Sheriffs are going to take in their efforts to make the state's waterways safer.

In cooperation with the Florida Boating Council, Sheriffs will sponsor short courses in basic water safety for youngsters 10-14 years of age throughout the state during the months ahead.

The first step was taken in February when 20 Deputy Sheriffs and State Board of Conservation officers took a three-day course for water safety instructors at Florida Law Enforcement Academy. (see photo above)

These men, together with other qualified instructors, will conduct the initial courses; and the Florida Boating Council will provide instructional materials.

The Boating Council consists of the Director of Conservation, as chairman; the Governor, the Attorney General, the Director of the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission and the President of the Florida Sheriffs Association or their appointees. The Florida Sheriffs Bureau and the U.S. Coast Guard are advisory members.

S. J. Gefen, of Jacksonville, the Governor's representative on the Boating Council, presented certificates to the graduating class of water safety instructors.

"Teaching youngsters safe boating will pay big dividends in the future," he told them.





Hon. Haydon Burns became Florida's 35th Governor on January 5, 1965, to mark the crowning achievement of a highly successful 15-year career in politics.

A public relations and business consultant for many years, Gov. Burns first entered politics in 1949 when he was elected overwhelmingly as Mayor of Jacksonville.

Re-elected four times as Mayor-Commissioner, he always achieved first primary victories and every time polled more votes than any other candidate on the entire ballot. He was the first Mayor of Jacksonville to be elected for five consecutive terms to that office.

During his administration the City of Jacksonville enjoyed the greatest period of progress in its history. The "Jacksonville Story" became known throughout the United States and many groups of community and political leaders visited the city to see its remarkable re-development program at first hand, and to learn how it had been accomplished.

Working closely with other public officials, chamber of commerce groups and private enterprise he provided drive and leadership for the community to bring about some \$250,000,000 in redevelopment and renewal—all accomplished without any federal funds.

At the same time he helped to modernize and streamline Jacksonville's city government in an effort to give taxpayers their full money's worth from 4,500 city employees, an annual budget of \$85,000,000 and a yearly profit of \$15,000,000 from the municipally-owned electric utility system.

Coordinating his efforts with the Committee of 100, he aggressively sought and obtained many new payrolls for his city. The 22-story Prudential Insurance Building, the 17-story Atlantic Coast Line Building, the St. Regis



Paper Plant and innumerable other businesses stand as visual evidence of this.

Gov. Burns' achievements have been widely recognized far beyond the limits of Jacksonville and he has received many honors as a result. He is a past president of the Florida League of Municipalities and a past president of the United States Conference of Mayors.

He was formerly a member of the Executive Committee of the American Municipal Association, and in 1961 that organization presented him with a Distinguished Service Award.

On nine occasions Gov. Burns has officially represented the United States abroad. In 1957 he was one of eight official delegates to the International Municipal Congress at the Hague. Earlier, he was one of 11 American Mayors selected by the Christian Palestine Committee to conduct a political and economic study tour of the Middle East Arab countries and Israel.

He served as official spokesman for the Crusade for Freedom when a large group of American Mayors and heads of national organizations visited Radio Free Europe installations several years ago.

In 1961 he headed a United States Mayors' mission to West Berlin, bringing encouragement and expressions of support to the people of West Berlin in their fight against communist aggression.

In 1962 Mayor Burns was one of only three of the nation's mayors named by President Kennedy to serve three-year terms on the National Civil Defense Advisory Council.

His many honors include the Good Government Service Award and appointment to the board of directors of innumerable civic and community groups.

A native of Louisville, Kentucky, Gov. Burns was born March 17, 1912, and became a resident of Jacksonville in his early childhood. He was educated in the Duval County Public Schools and later attended Babson College, at Babson Park, Massachusetts.

He is a member of the University of Florida Alumni Association; and an honorary member of the Florida chapters of Phi Sigma Kappa, Sigma Phi Epsilon and Alpha Kappa Psi. He has served as a steward in the Methodist Church for 28 years.

The "first family" includes the Governor's attractive, blonde wife, Mildred; his daughter Eleanor, who is the wife of Lloyd Watkins; his son, Bill, who attends the University of Florida; and his two grandsons, Clay and Wade Watkins.

Mrs. Burns is a past president of Jacksonville's large Southside Woman's Club and a past president of the Jacksonville chapter of Lambda Tau Delta. She has also served as State Director, District 4, of the Florida Federation of Woman's Clubs but she is primarily a homemaker whose main interest is her family.

THE HON. DOYLE CONNER. Florida's 7th Commissioner of Agriculture, was born in Starke, Florida, December 17, 1928; was graduated from Bradford High School in 1947; received a B.S. degree in Agriculture from the University of Florida in 1952. While at the University he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives from Bradford County, at 21, and served five terms. In the 1957 session he was Speaker of the House, at 28, Florida's youngest. Honors include National President of Future Farmers of America, 1948-49; selection by the State

Jaycees in 1950 as one of the five outstanding men in Florida; and selection as "One of the 10 Outstanding Young Men in the Nation" by the U.S. Jaycees in 1961. At 23 he became Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the House, a post held for two terms. He was elected Commissioner of Agriculture in 1960 and reelected in 1964. During his first year as Commissioner he was elected to the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, representing the 13 Southern States. He is presently serving as President of the Southern Association of Commissioners of Agriculture. He is a member of the Baptist Church and the following organizations: Florida Farm Bureau, Florida Cattlemen's Association, Masons, Shrine, Elks, Jaycees and civic luncheon groups. He is married to the former Johnnie Bennett of Marianna, and they have three children.

University of Florida, Mr. Faircloth practiced law in St. Petersburg, Tallahassee and Miami. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1962; and was voted by his colleagues in the 1963 Legislature as "the Most Outstanding First Termer." 

THE HON, E. HARRIS DREW. was appointed a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court, August 18, 1952. Served as Chief Justice 1955-56; 1963-65. THE HON. STEPHEN C. O'-CONNELL has been a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court since October 21, 1955. THE HON. B. K. ROBERTS has been a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court since July 7, 1949, and served as Chief Justice 1953-54 and July 1, 1961-July 1, 1963. He practiced law in Tallahassee from 1928 to 1949, except for three years in the armed services. He is a past president of the Tallahassee Bar Association, Past Vice President of the Florida Bar Association; member of the Florida, American and Inter-American Bar Associations, American Law Institute, American Judicature Society, Chairman of the Judicial Council of Florida; also a patron of the



International Bar Association; also official court representative at ABA meeting in London 1957, including dedication of Runnymede Memorial; and member ABA team at International Bar Association meeting in Salzburg, Austria, 1960, and in Edinburgh, Scotland 1962. He belongs to the Presbyterian Church and the following organizations: Masons, Shrine, Elks, Odd Fellows, Kiwanis Club, American Legion and Newcomen Society of England. He was born in Sopchoppy, Florida, February 5, 1907. He is married and his wife's name is Mary Newman Roberts. They have two children. He was educated in the public schools of Wakulla County and received an LL.B. degree from the University of Florida in 1928.

THE HON. MILLARD F. CALDWELL was appointed a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court by Gov. Farris Bryant in February, 1962, to fill a va-cancy created by the retire-ment of Justice T. Frank Hobson; and was elected without opposition in November, 1962. Other public offices he has held include: member Florida House of Representatives from Santa Rosa County, 1929-31; Member of U. S. Congress, House of Representatives, from Florida's Third District; Governor of Florida, 1945-49; Administra-tor of U. S. Civilian Defense Administration, 1950 - 52. He



was practicing law in Milton at the time he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives and was a practicing attorney in Tallahassee at the time of his appointment to the Supreme Court. Military Service: World War I Lieutenant, Field Artillery. He was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, February 6, 1897. He is married and his wife's name is Mary Rebecca Caldwell. They have two children. He attended Carson-Newman College, the University of Mississippi and the University of Virginia.

THE HON, RICHARD W. ER-VIN was appointed a justice of The Florida Supreme Court by Gov. Farris Bryant, January 15, 1964, to fill a vacancy created by the retirement of the late Justice Glenn Terrell; and he was sworn in January 17, 1964. At the time of his appointment he was serving his fourth four-year term as Florida's Attorney General, having taken that office on January 4, 1949. Justice Ervin was born January 26, 1905, at Carrabelle, Florida: and was educated in the public schools of Citrus, DeSoto, Leon, Orange and Marion Counties, He was grad-



uated from the College of Law at the University of Florida in 1928 and practiced law in Pinellas, Lee and Putnam Counties. His career of public service includes positions as attorney for the State Road Department, Assistant Attorney General, Secretary of the Florida Railroad Com-mission, attorney for the Overseas Road and Toll Bridge District and attorney for the Department of Public Safety. In 1951 he was selected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as the outstanding public official in the state. He is a past president of the National Association of Attorneys General, and previously served as vice president and chairman of the Southern Regional Group of Attorneys General. He is married to the former Frances Baker, of Jacksonville, and they have two children.
