The 10th Anniversary celebration will begin at 12:30 p.m. with a ranch-style barbeque; and the dedication program will begin at 1:30 p.m.

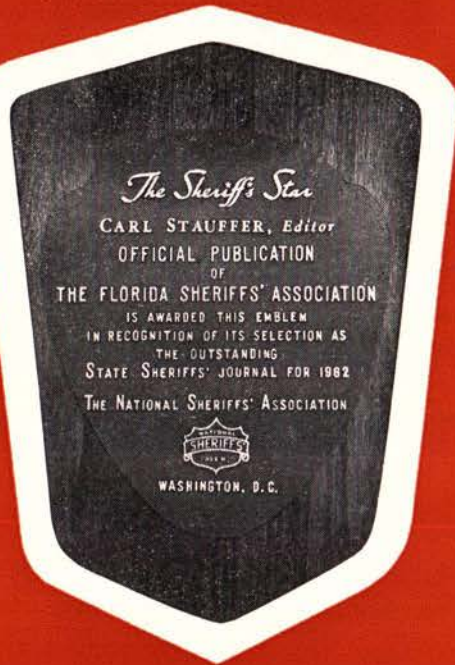
The public—especially friends and supporters of the Boys Ranch—is cordially invited to attend both events.

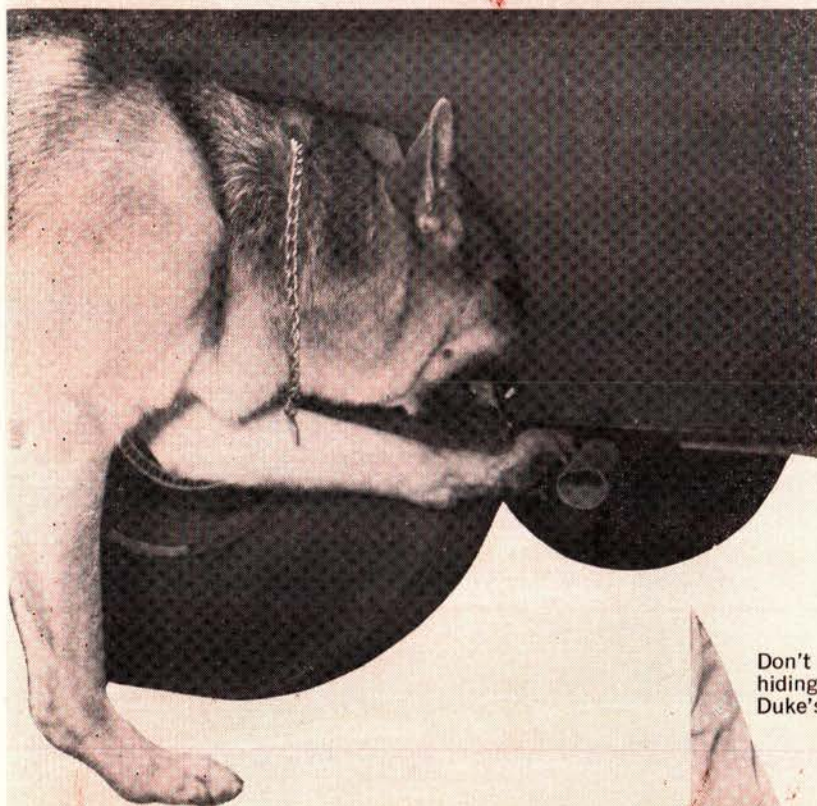
Unlike most Hippies, Duke doesn't use dope, but man, he sure can smell it.

He has a number of narcotics arrests credited to his keenly trained schnozzola; and he has shown under actual crime war battlefront conditions that it's practically impossible to hide dope from him.

Duke's law enforcement career began months ago when Brevard County Sheriff Leigh Wilson decided to add a canine division to his department.

Two dogs were selected; Duke and King. The two dogs along with their handlers, Deputies E. R. (Sonny) Brannon and Ray Phelps were sent to basic K-9 training school and Duke showed such amazing ability it was decided he could also be taught to detect drugs and various narcotics.

Deputy Brannon and Duke received special instruction during a ten-day course in Miami where they worked with two Miami police officers, Jay Rapp and Homer Kimbrell. The in-

NEW SHERIFF, OLD PROBLEMS

ARCADIA—One of the first problems faced by DeSoto County Sheriff Frank Cline when he took office Jan. 3, 1967, was an old problem of working space. So he began to seek ways and means to expand office facilities at the County jail.

For years the jail had been sub-standard according to State requirements. There was no private office for clients and lawyers to use for consultations, and there was barely room for the radio operator and the files.

With a go-ahead from the Board of County Commissioners, Sheriff Cline converted the lower floor of the jail, formerly used by the Sheriff and his family, to office space. He left the kitchen and dining room facilities alone and concentrated on a private office for himself and the expansion of the radio and file room. He did this by knocking out a wall and vault and joining the old living room with the former radio room.

The DeSoto jail was built back in 1893, but it was built out of substantial material as Sheriff Cline found out when the construction men had to cut through steel reinforcement to combine the rooms.

After remodeling to suit his needs Sheriff Cline turned his attention to the feeding and care of prisoners. In DeSoto the County Jail houses county and city prisoners since the city of Arcadia has no jail.

The cost of feeding the prisoners was \$1.36 per head when Sheriff Cline went into office. By careful selection, and by buying canned vegetables from the State Division of Corrections in carload lots, Sheriff Cline reduced the cost to a mere .64 cents per head, at a considerable saving to the County.

In the first six months of his administration, Sheriff Cline turned in \$29,147.85 in fines and forfeitures and handled a total of 820 cases.

Sheriff Cline, a native son of Arcadia and DeSoto County, was born in 1930 and graduated in 1948 from high school with a yen to be a law enforcement officer. He attended the Florida Highway Patrol training school and went to work for that agency in 1950. Later he left the Highway Patrol to take a job with the Ft. Myers City Police because the job brought him in closer contact with criminal procedures in cases that were more varied than those experienced by Highway Troopers.

He continued working as a policeman in several areas until he went to work for the late DeSoto County Sheriff Lloyd Holton as a deputy. That was in 1957 and he continued until Sheriff Holton's untimely death in 1965. He then worked under Sheriff Holton's wife, Inez, who was appointed to fill the office until the nearest election date.

When election time rolled around, he filed against a field of seven candidates and won.

While serving as a deputy under Mrs. Holton, he joined hands with the DeSoto Cattleman's Association to put a stop to cattle rustling in the county. DeSoto is mainly a citrus-cattle area and, in the remote loneliness of vast prairie, cattle rustling had become a nuisance.

On a tip he caught several rustlers red-handed as they hauled away 11 cattle from Bright Hour Ranch on Highway 70 east of Arcadia.

He also bird-dogged a trio of men who had allegedly made off with over \$7000 from an Arcadia motor company.

Sheriff Cline employs three full-time outside deputies who put in over 340 hours each per month . . . at a pay that averages out to about \$1.22 per hour. They patrol about 7,593 miles per month. But Sheriff Cline matches their pace. He works about 16 hours a day and travels about 2000 miles a month.

There are three full-time inside men and four part-time or weekend deputies. In an emergency the sheriff can call on members of the Sheriff's Posse, a unit of about 50 men which has been revitalized.

The Sheriff's wife Donna Jo, and Mrs. Floy Shelfer handle the Courthouse office work; and Alma Murphy is the full time cook at the jail.

From 70 to 90 per cent of the calls to Sheriff Cline are in the City of Arcadia although the city force has a full quota of seven men on patrol.

Sheriff Cline is an efficient, close-mouthed lawman, who believes that efficient deputies and close co-operation with other law enforcement agencies is the answer to growing crime rates. He also thinks that crime prevention is a step in the right direction and is a firm supporter of Boys Ranch. He and his wife serve as youth counselors at Calvary Baptist Church. He is also Worthy Patron, and his wife Worthy Matron, of the Arcadia Order of Eastern Star.

For the Sheriff there isn't enough time in each day to indulge in a hobby . . . or even such necessary things as enough sleep and meals on time. But he loves his job and he says he'll be Sheriff just as long as the people of DeSoto County will it.

You can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear, but Dr. W. W. Matthews, Veterinarian, did make a tattle-tale out of a cow's ear with the use of tattoo marks. The tattoo marks held the key to the identity of cattle rustlers who made off with the cow; and after months of tracking them, Sheriff Cline finally solved the case with the aid of the tattle-tale ear.

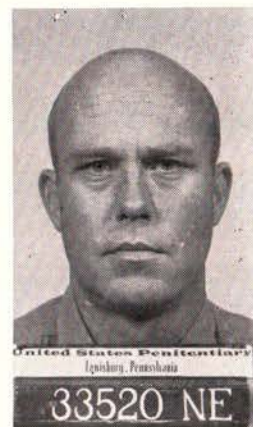
