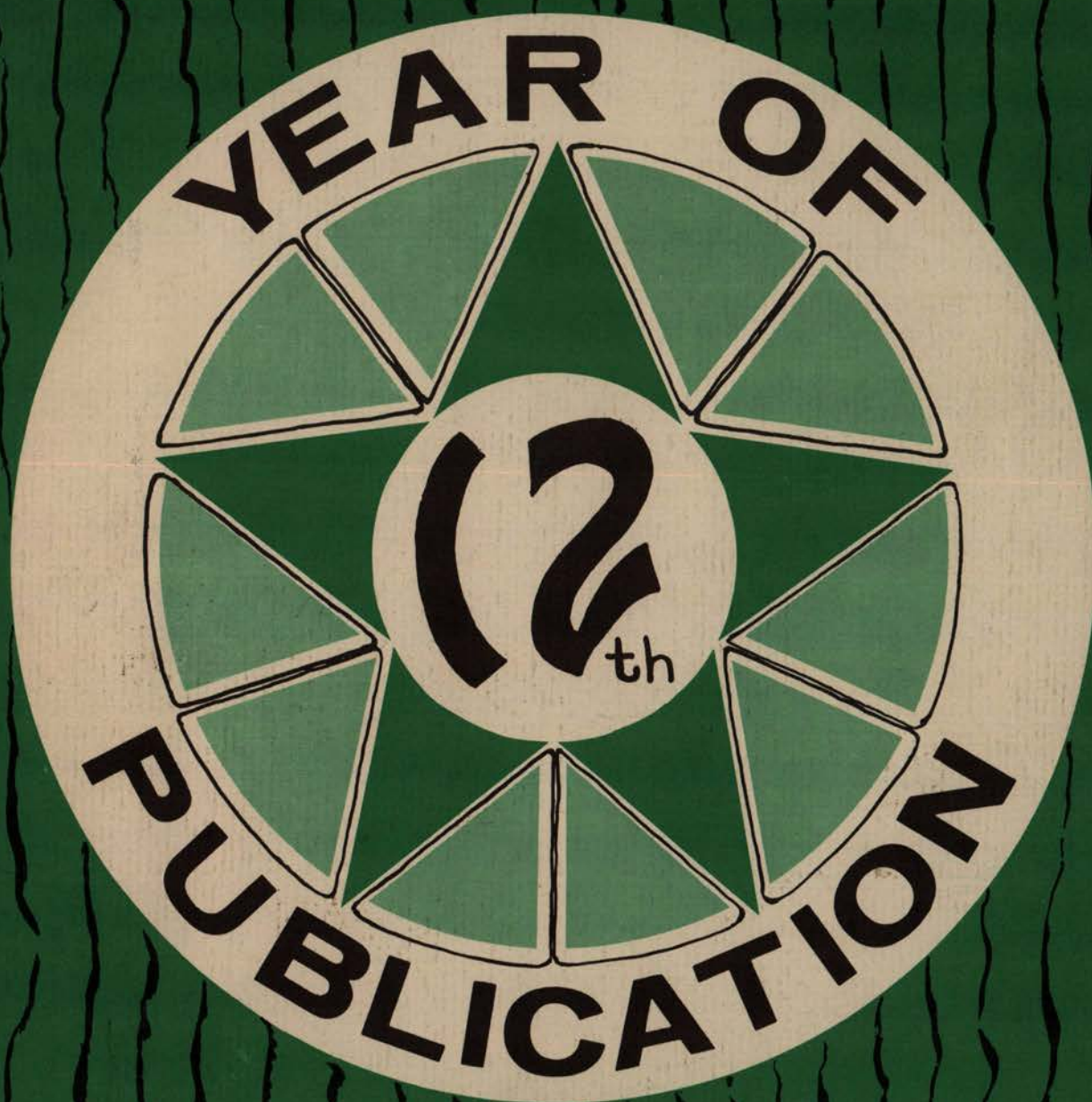

THE SHERIFF'S STAR begins its 12th year of publication with this issue, and like most adolescents the tendency is to brag a little.

The first STAR, a tabloid newspaper on slick paper, was printed in March, 1957, and had a circulation of 7,000.

We changed to a magazine format in 1962; and, with our circulation steadily increasing, we have reached a record high of 33,000 copies.

This makes the STAR the largest and most widely read law enforcement magazine in Florida — and possibly in the South.

The STAR also claims to be the "most honored" (to borrow a famous watchmaker's phrase) law enforcement magazine in Dixie, with a clutch of state and national awards for editing, typography and general excellence.

When we talk about our "world-wide audience of readers" we're not spoofin'. Each month we mail copies to 47 states, Canada, the Canal Zone, Guam, Pakistan, Belgium, Japan, Italy, Mexico, England, Chile, Australia and Monaco.

We have a many-faceted mission, but nothing we do gives us more satisfaction than being the promotional "voice" of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

There's no way of knowing how much money the STAR has raised for the Ranch, but the phrase "I read about it in the SHERIFF'S STAR" keeps showing up in letters from contributors.

Tracking down lawbreakers is also one of our roles and we do it through the "Wanted Persons" page. If you are unlucky enough to have your picture and an account of your misdeeds appear on that page, almost 100,000 persons will see it and your chances of getting caught will go up like crazy.

In 11 years we've been responsible for the apprehension of quite a few criminals — enough to make us feel we're doing something worthwhile.

We have other roles too, like helping to locate missing persons; but none more important than our efforts to communicate to the public a better understanding of law enforcement's day-to-day problems, its triumphs, its limitations and its desperate need of solid public support.

TRAINING IS MY TARGET

My many years in law enforcement have taught me one thing—that the “war on crime” is like any other war and it will be won or lost in the final analysis by the rank and file out on the firing line.

Modern weapons, computers, high speed tele-types, crime laboratories and trained technicians are all essential but in reality they will not win the war. They will simply help the “man on the beat”—law enforcement’s infantryman—to win the war.

The war we fight against the criminal element here in Florida is much like the war in Viet Nam. We need our multi-million-dollar bombers, our helicopters, our tanks and our artillery to successfully fight the Vietnamese conflict, but in the long run the outcome will be determined by the troops in the field battling toe-to-toe, hand-to-hand with the enemy.



My point is this: We are spending millions on modern weapons in the war on crime, and to do so is certainly essential; but, at the same time, we must not overlook the importance of our front line troops.

They must be thoroughly and adequately trained if our anti-crime weapons are to be effective. The expensive computer in Tallahassee that can flash crime information to any section of the state in split seconds will be a poor investment if the men on the receiving end of this electronic miracle aren't trained to follow through effectively.

Good, practical training is absolutely essential; and during my term as President of the Sheriffs Association I intend to do everything possible to improve the quantity and quality of training available to law enforcement officers in Florida.

Much has already been done. The Florida Legislature took a giant step in 1967 when—with encouragement from the Sheriffs Association—it created the Florida Police Standards Council, an agency that will set minimum standards for police officers and minimum standards for police training.

I intend to assist the Council in every way possible and to encourage my fellow sheriffs to do likewise.

I am also going to support any other agency or project aimed at enhancing the training opportunities available to Florida lawmen; and I am going to encourage the Sheriffs Association to organize seminars on specialized law enforcement subjects.

In other words, although I hope to provide intelligent leadership in all areas of the Sheriffs Association's activities, my primary target will be training.

And, although I will attempt to become involved in all areas of law enforcement, my attention will be focused primarily on the men out on the firing line. Their skill and their effectiveness will determine whether we win or lose the war on crime. Certainly they need, and deserve, every bit of support we can give them.

Other New Laws Contributing to New Look

The 1967 Legislature passed other new laws that are contributing to the "new look" in law enforcement. These laws will:

1. PERMIT INVOLUNTARY HOSPITALIZATION of persons believed to be mentally ill for the purpose of emergency observation, diagnosis and treatment.
2. REQUIRE MOTORCYCLE RIDERS to wear crash helmets and protective safety masks or safety goggles.
3. ALLOW PRISONERS to be furloughed to work at paid employment, participate in educational or training programs, or voluntarily serve a public or non-profit agency.
4. PROVIDE FOR THE FINGERPRINTING of Juvenile Delinquents guilty of serious crimes, with use of fingerprints restricted to identification purposes only; and with provisions for the fingerprint records to be destroyed when the delinquent becomes 21.
5. PERMIT THE STATE TO APPEAL from a pre-trial order quashing a search warrant or suppressing evidence obtained by search and seizure, or suppressing a confession made by a defendant.
6. MAKE IT UNLAWFUL for any person knowingly to abandon or discard iceboxes, refrigerators or deep-freeze lockers without removing the doors.
7. PROVIDE STIFF PENALTIES for anyone who knowingly distributes obscene, lewd, lascivious, filthy, indecent, immoral, sadistic or masochistic publications to persons under 18 years of age.
8. PERMIT NON-PROFIT OR VETERANS' organizations engaged in charitable, civic, community, benevolent, religious or scholastic works or similar activities to conduct Bingo or Guest games, provided the organization has been in existence for three years; and provided that the entire proceeds are donated to the endeavors listed above.
9. REQUIRE SEMIANNUAL SAFETY INSPECTION of motor vehicles starting in 1968.
10. PROVIDE FOR SUSPENSION OF drivers' licenses of persons who refuse to submit to chemical tests to determine intoxication.
11. PROVIDE FOR ISSUING of a new type of driver's license which will include a color photograph of the driver and the driver's signature.
12. PERMIT THE ISSUING OF SEARCH WARRANTS for private dwellings believed to contain weapons or any instrumentality or means by which a felony has been committed.
13. PUNISH PERSONS GUILTY of a riot or inciting a riot by imprisonment not exceeding two years in the state penitentiary, or by imprisonment not exceeding 12 months in the county jail; or by a fine not exceeding \$500; or by both fine and imprisonment.
14. REQUIRE JUNK DEALERS to keep detailed records of transactions involving copper wire. (This was prompted by widespread thefts of copper wire from utility companies.)
15. PROVIDE FOR PERIODIC re-examination of all persons holding drivers' licenses.

Crime Cure is up to the People

Law enforcement officials across the nation have definite ideas about the causes of crime and the cures that are needed. They appear well aware of the depth of the problem.

Failure to solve the crime problem can't be blamed on any one thing, they say. The list ranges from a lack of adequately trained policemen to "permissiveness" in dealing with youngsters.

Public treatment of police makes it difficult to recruit policemen in the numbers needed. And when policemen are found, the equipment they are given is inadequate.

Where court decisions haven't actually hampered police in their work, there has been an attitude created in the policeman's mind that is not helpful.

Other items listed by the officials include leniency of courts in punishment of criminals and unrestrained racial agitation.

It all adds up to a lack of real concern by the American people over the rising crime rate. The fact that crimes have increased 88 per cent in the last seven years hasn't upset the public to the point gen-

erally where it insists on doing something.

Time after time law enforcement officials comment that the real answer to the crime problem is simply public attitude. When the public becomes fed up with crime, there will be a demand for public officials to take action.

Some cities already have shown what can be done when law enforcement gets the backing of the community. Strong, vigorous law enforcement cuts the crime rate significantly.

President Johnson's Crime Commission took the position that crime automatically would be eliminated after the Great Society eliminated poverty, illiteracy, and unemployment.

Few thoughtful Americans are under any such illusion today. They know from experience that crime flourishes in a permissive atmosphere. The answer is vigorous enforcement.

To have such enforcement, however, requires trained men, adequately equipped. So it is obvious, then, that we must give law enforcement both public and financial support if we hope to reduce crime.

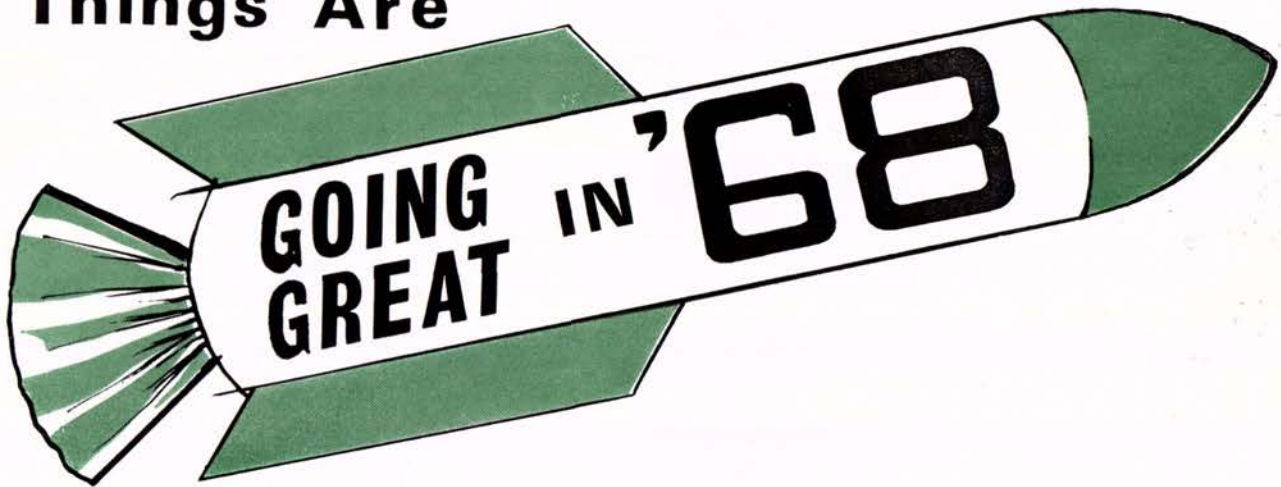

Things Are



A boy's high pitched laughter . . . the throbbing beat of rock and roll music from a transistor radio . . . the rattle of dishes in the cafetorium . . . vesper chimes from the chapel steeple . . . the sharp crack of hickory on horsehide on the baseball diamond . . . the whinny of an impatient pony . . . these are some of the typical sounds at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

But, there will be many times this year when they will be drowned out by the whine of an electric saw, the pounding of hammers, the clatter of a cement mixer and the rumble of heavy construction equipment.

The name of the game is progress and it's a sign that "Things are Going Great in '68."

By the end of this year Ranch officials expect to have new facilities valued at over \$425,000 completed or under construction to set a new expansion record.

The \$35,000 fire house built by the Florida State Firemen's Association is expected to be completed before the end of the year. It is already in use, but a small apartment for the 'round the clock fire chief is not completed; and the repair shop in the rear is not fully equipped.

Also due for completion this year is the James P. Towey Foundation Memorial Medical and Dental Clinic, at a cost of \$50,000. Exterior construction is almost completed.

One of the least apparent but most important improvements coming up this year is the first section of a sewer system to replace the present inadequate septic tanks. This will include sewer lines, water lines to service the system, a pumping station and a treatment plant at a cost of \$50,000.

The Suzannah and Carleton Tweed Gymnasium, largest single project in the history of the Ranch, will be under construction this year at an estimated cost of \$170,000.

The Joe and Frances Diaz Administration Building is also scheduled to become a reality in 1968 at an estimated cost of \$100,000. It will replace the present overcrowded offices located in the cafetorium.

A guest house for returning Boys Ranch "alumni," doctors, dentists and other professional people is out of the planning stage and is slated to become a new feature of the landscape this year. The estimated cost is \$20,000.

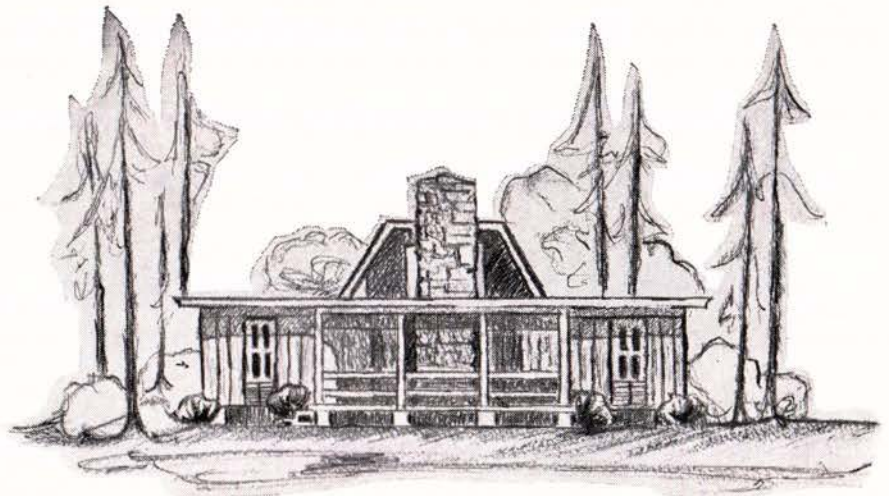

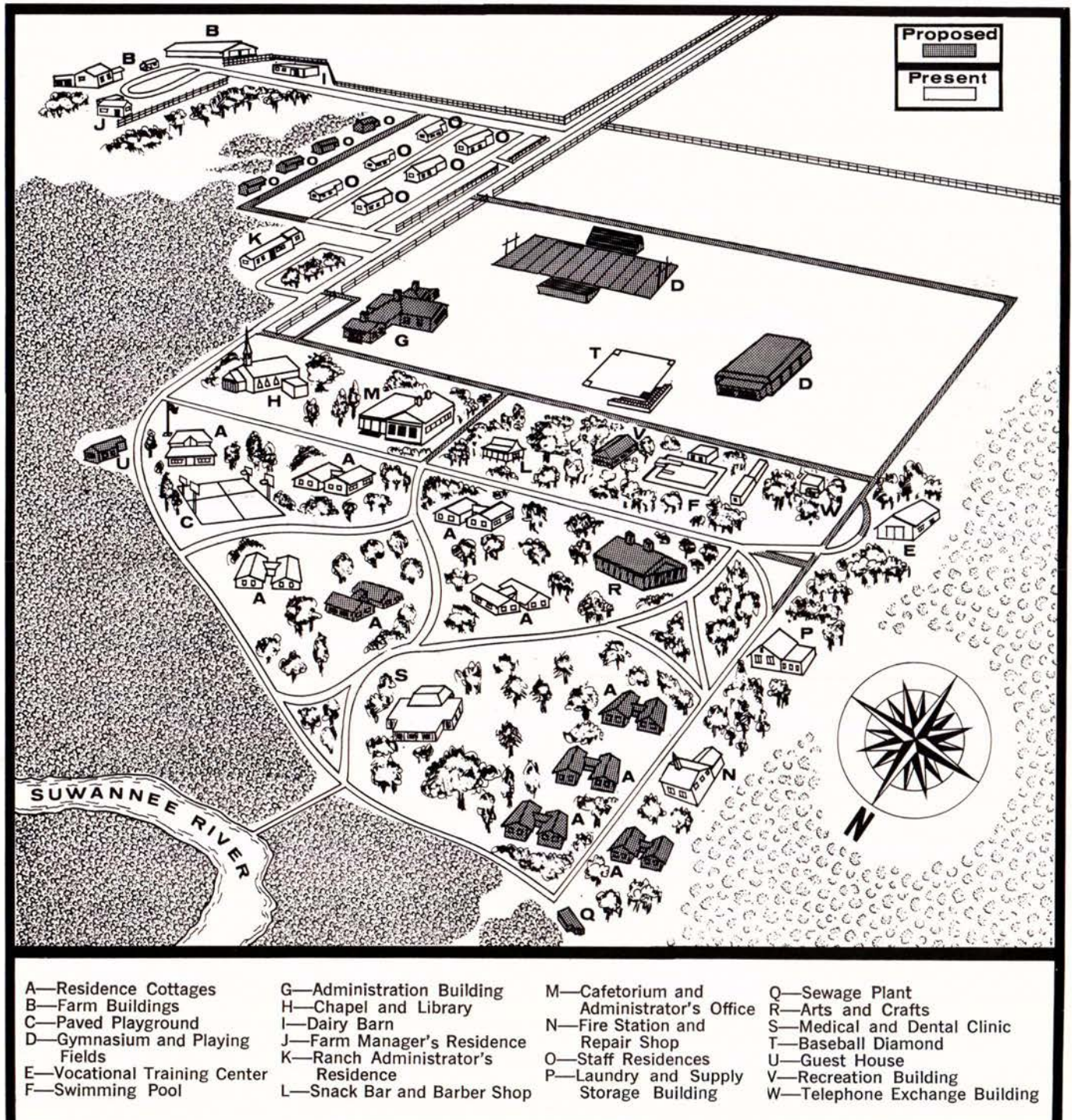


The \$35,000 Fire House and Repair Shop built by the Florida State Firemen's Association is already in use although the interior is not completed.

Residence cottages like this have a high priority among the future needs of the Boys Ranch. Each cottage costs \$75,000 and provides facilities for 16 to 20 boys plus a married couple employed as house parents. The current master plan (see map below) calls for five additional cottages, approximately doubling the present enrollment of 100 boys. Meanwhile, there is an immediate need for two cottages to take care of the waiting list of eligible boys who can't get in because of the "no vacancy" situation.



FACTS

About the Ranch

LOCATION—11 miles north of Live Oak, Florida, on the Suwannee River and about midway between Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

MAILING ADDRESS—P. O. Box 520, Live Oak, Florida.

FOUNDED—in 1957 by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

BEGAN OPERATION—in February, 1959, when the first boys were admitted.

FINANCING—supported entirely by public donations. (They are deductible for income tax purposes.)

SIZE—737 acres of rolling farmlands.

ENROLLMENT—100 boys.
Eventual goal: 400 boys.

PURPOSE—to provide a good home and a secure future for Florida's needy and worthy boys—to give them love, security, discipline and all of the essential advantages that are every American boy's birthright. The Ranch is not a "reform school" or a correctional institution." Boys enrolled at the Ranch are there simply because they need a good home—because they are the innocent victims of neglect or lack of opportunity.

AGE LIMITS—To be admitted a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 16. Once he is admitted, the Ranch becomes his home and he remains there through high school and college unless his home situation improves or another good home develops.

ELIGIBILITY—Each boy who meets the mental and physical requirements must also be approved by the Sheriff and the Juvenile Court Judge of the county in which he resides.

SOURCE OF BOYS—Applicants are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by welfare, school and juvenile court officials.

Boys Ranch Problem Smaller Now

Purchasing equipment for the new \$50,000 medical and dental clinic at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch was a big problem until Allstate Insurance Companies and The Allstate Foundation came along with a large cash contribution to be used for this purpose. A Little Bit Now; A Lot at the End

Many of our supporters indicate they would like to make a large contribution to the Boys Ranch but they just can't afford it.

If this is your problem, here is a suggestion:

Go see your favorite insurance agent and tell him you want to take out a life insurance policy with the Boys Ranch as the irrevocable beneficiary. Then you pay just a few dollars a month on the insurance premium, and the Boys Ranch holds the policy as a guarantee of your "deferred gift."

For example, a loyal supporter in his late forties took out a life insurance policy that will give the Boys Ranch \$4,000 when he dies, and it is costing him less than \$18 a month.

Furthermore, since the Ranch is the irrevocable beneficiary (this means the beneficiary can't be changed), his premium payments are deductible for income tax purposes—just the same as any donation to the Ranch.

Others have done the same thing and the Ranch now holds insurance policies with a total value of over \$50,000.

Boys Ranch Bequests

"I am including a bequest to the Boys Ranch in my will. How should I designate the legatee?"

This question is asked frequently and the answer is: "The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Fund."

Bequests are a major source of income. Some are designated for specific uses such as scholarships or new facilities. Others not earmarked go into our endowment trust fund which is administered by a large Florida bank, under supervision of the Ranch trustees.

The bequest you include in your will now will help to give future security to the boys presently enrolled at the Ranch, as well as to others who will follow in their footsteps.

Four Ranches Now

The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch was the first institution of its kind in the nation when it was founded in 1957.

Since then the Sheriffs of Georgia, Alabama and Minnesota have followed Florida's lead by establishing similar Boys Ranches for needy and worthy youngsters.

It's Called "Criswell House" and It's A "Give a Boy a Break" Kind of Place

TALLAHASSEE—The signs still say "Florida Law Enforcement Academy," but inside the white buildings owned by the Florida Sheriffs Association an experiment is going on that promises a bright ray of hope for Florida's teen-age lawbreakers.

When the sign painters get around to it,

the signs will be changed to "Criswell House"—and to any passerby who knows the history of Juvenile Courts in Florida this will provide a clue.

The new name honors the memory of the late Walter Scott Criswell, of Jacksonville—a "give a boy a break" kind of Juve-

nile Judge whose devotion to wayward boys was so great that the facts read like a legend.

And, appropriately, "Criswell House" is a "give a boy a break" kind of place under the guiding hand of a latter day "give a boy a break" kind of guy named Oliver J. Keller, Jr., director of Florida's new Division of Youth Services.

HE WAS CONCERNED

Keller's job is to supervise Florida's training schools for juvenile delinquents; and "Criswell House" is an outgrowth of his concern over the fact that many youngsters leaving the training schools have no home to go to—or are returning to the unsatisfactory environment that started them on the road to juvenile delinquency in the first place.

Criswell House will provide special guidance, education and training for boys facing this plight in an effort to help them become law abiding citizens instead of career criminals.

It is Florida's first state-wide "halfway house" for juvenile delinquents; and hopefully it will be the pioneering forerunner of similar establishments in all sections of the state.

FIRST BOYS ENROLLED

The first boys were enrolled in February and Mr. and Mrs. John J. McNess, top-rated house parents, were hired as the first staff members.

Director Keller said the enrollment will be increased gradually to 30 boys; and the staff will be expanded to include a superintendent, cook, maintenance superintendent and four house parents.

Facilities include an office, dormitory rooms, a classroom and a combination dining room and recreation room. A seven-acre site will provide space for outdoor sports and recreation.

Criswell House is now open for business and the first boys were enrolled in February. This picture, taken on the front lawn, shows Oliver J. Boys living at Criswell House will be involved in local activities. Those who can attend public schools in Tallahassee will do so. Those with severe academic problems will receive special instruction in the Criswell House classroom.

The boys will have access to local recreational facilities and it is anticipated they will be active in community service programs.

ACADEMY FADED

Many factors contributed to the establishment of Criswell House.

One of them was the demise of Florida Law Enforcement Academy, Florida's first state-wide in-service training facility for all levels of law enforcement.

The Academy was based near Tallahassee Municipal Airport in facilities constructed and owned by the Florida Sheriffs Association. It was staffed and operated by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created 12 years ago to give technical assistance to local law enforcement agencies.

When the Sheriffs Bureau became the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement by action of the 1967 Legislature, one of the resulting changes was a decision to take the

Bureau out of the law enforcement training business.

This left the Sheriffs Association without a staff to operate the Academy; and since no funds were available to staff it the Association had no choice but to cancel further Academy classes.

SAW POSSIBILITIES

Youth Services Director Keller learned about this and immediately saw the possibilities of converting the Academy facilities into Florida's first "halfway house." He had formerly been involved in "halfway house" projects outside Florida and was familiar with the theory as well as the practical details of their operation.

The Sheriffs Association responded enthusiastically to Director Keller's proposal and immediately visualized it as a continuation of the Association's crime prevention activities.

The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch for over 10 years had been serving the needs of dependent (but not delinquent) boys.

The Sheriffs Association Scholarship Program had financed college educations for many outstanding boys from state training schools.

Girls' Villa, a Pinellas County project

endorsed and aided by the Sheriffs Association, was developing as a successful haven for needy and worthy girls.

IT WAS "A NATURAL"

And so, the proposed "halfway house" was "a natural" for Sheriffs. They not only endorsed it, but agreed to become involved in planning, development and financing.

Finally, in January, 1968, Criswell House emerged as a joint venture of the Sheriffs Association and the Division of Youth Services.

It is being operated by the Division of Youth Services and the facilities are being leased by the State under a lease-purchase agreement.

\$50,000 PLEDGED

If the state eventually decides to exercise its option and purchase the facilities, the Association will contribute \$50,000 toward the purchase price of \$150,000.

The Association has also agreed to assist the Division of Youth Services in working out a program which will enable Sheriffs, deputy sheriffs and other law enforcement officers to "intern" at Criswell House to acquire a better understanding of delinquency problems and more proficiency in the handling of juveniles.

Legislators, judges and top state officials are watching developments with interest.

It is logical to suppose that Judge Criswell too is an interested spectator from some spiritual vantage point. He was once described as the leader who helped to bring Florida's treatment of troubled children out of the dark ages; and certainly, if he were present today, he would be vitally interested in what's going on in Criswell House.

New Anti-Crime Weapon Scores 500 "Hits" a Week

CLEARWATER—The National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C.,—newest "heavy artillery" in the nation's war against crime—is scoring an average of 500 "hits" a week even though it has only been in operation for one year, according to Jerome J. Daunt, head of the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Section.

Speaking to a luncheon audience here on January 25, during the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, Mr. Daunt explained that the NCIC (law enforcement abbreviation for

National Crime Information Center) is a computerized unit that stores information about crimes, criminals and stolen property; then flashes this information to law enforcement agencies all over the nation in response to teletyped inquiries.

A "hit" means that an arrest has been made, stolen property has been recovered or a crime has been solved as a result of information supplied by the NCIC.

Mr. Daunt said the system was placed in operation in January, 1967, with about 150,000 records.

one. This comparative picture of just how well off we are as a nation, and as a whole, certainly would indicate some of the reasons why we need to do whatever is necessary to maintain our American system of government.

The American system of government is a system built on a bedrock of respect for, enforcement of, and compliance with law and order by **all** the people—not just some of them! Our laws are a set of rules, if you will, based on mutual respect, and regard for the feelings, needs and rights of others, not just the wishes, whims, or needs of the individual concerned.

Local Government Most Effective

The American Governmental system is based on the principle, or at least it was in the beginning, of the concept of government of the people by the people. And, we believe that the most effective type of government is **local** government, at the grass-roots level—by the people on a local level. Now the basic local level of government is the community, or the municipality, or the city government. As we expand in area and take in more territory, and more people, it becomes necessary to step up to the next level, or the county—then to the state, and finally to the Federal level.

And so it is, you see, that responsibility for maintenance of law and order in our country and under our system of government follows the same principle or concept as all our governmental functions, first with the citizen himself — with his responsibility to comply with the laws and rules of conduct, set up by all of the people for the assurance of an orderly society. Every citizen has the responsibility, too, to participate in his government, by reporting violations and cooperating with properly constituted law enforcement agencies. The major responsibility though, for active law enforcement, lies with the duly constituted law enforcement agencies of the community, county, state and nation.

There Comes A Time . . .

Each echelon is responsible for maintaining law and order, and taking care of these emergencies within its jurisdiction, the town marshal or city police within the municipalities or cities, the sheriff within the county—the Governor within the state—and finally, the President within the nation.

Each echelon, if it does its full duty, will employ its full resources, including auxiliaries, before asking for help from the next echelon of government. It will be realistic, in its evaluation, and when it can-

not hope to cope with a particular situation, it has the responsibility to ask for help from the next echelon of government, i.e. the police to the sheriff, the sheriff to the Governor and the Governor to the President.

Decisions must be made at each level, in view of the actual and the potential situation, and the capabilities of the force available at that level. This should be a matter for careful consideration at the outset of any problem, to keep the situation from getting out of control. Any tendency to cry "wolf" or to prematurely or unnecessarily ask for help should be avoided, but experience in recent times has proved, time and time again, that the earlier any disorder is met with the proper application of force, the less serious it will be at its maximum.

Forces Available To Governor

When and if a disorder, riot or disturbance grows, or threatens to grow to proportions where it cannot be handled by local and county law enforcement agencies, it is the responsibility of the Governor of this state to assist, with those forces available to him.

Now, what forces are available to the Governor for this purpose? Several agencies of the state have a capability in this regard—the Highway Patrol, Beverage Department, Fish and Game Commission, etc., but the major, and the ultimate force available to the Governor is the Army of the State—the National Guard.

The National Guard is a reserve component of the Army and Air Force. The Federal government organizes, uniforms, equips, pays for and supervises the training of, the National Guard. Approximately 95% of the total costs of the National Guard are borne by the Federal government. The Federal Government organizes, equips and trains this force, basically and primarily for use as combat units, to be mobilized into the Federal service as combat troops—but the Federal government agrees to let the state use these National Guard units—on state duty, for any proper state mission. The Federal government says in effect—"This is my Army—I will organize, equip and train, but we will let you use it for any proper state need as long as it is not mobilized into the Federal service." Of course, when they are so used, the state must pay for such duty.

When to Call Out the Guard

There are two principal basic concepts in our constitution, and in our laws, under which the Gov-

ernor would usually mobilize the National Guard into state service. One—the Governor may declare martial law in a situation where the local governmental structure is completely unable or unwilling, to function, and to carry out the processes of orderly government. In this case the military commander would, in effect, enforce the processes of government until the local governmental structure is able to again function effectively.

The other method, and the one must normally used, is for the Governor to mobilize the National Guard and instruct the commander thereof to go to the aid of local authority. Under this concept, the National Guard is normally employed by being given a mission type assignment by the local authority, and the National Guard commander makes the actual determination as to the size of the force to be used and the method of accomplishing that mission. It is normal for the commander of troops to be given a statement in writing by the local authority designated by the Governor, such statement outlining the mission to be performed by the National Guard. Also, at the conclusion of the mission, or missions, the local authority normally gives to the commander of troops a written release from active state duty. In any event, the matter of the actual employment of elements of military forces is coordinated very closely with, and in cooperation with local police and local authority. This does not mean that the police **command** the troops—nor does the military **command** the police — each **commands** his own — but working together. It has long since been proven that the team effort is best.

Teams Most Effective

I think it goes without saying too, that National Guardsmen are not as well trained as individual policemen in the area of police work, and it has been found that teams composed of guardsmen and police officers are able to do the most effective work. The matter of command relationships and team effort requires very close liaison between all elements of the military forces employed and local police officials.

In Florida, our National Guard units are dispersed throughout the state, from Pensacola on the west, to Jacksonville on the east, to Fort Myers on the lower gulf coast, to Homestead on the lower east coast, and all in between. Altogether, we have 61 army guard and 6 air guard units, in 51 armories and one air base in the state. We have a total strength, including army and air of 9,000.

We have, and we maintain, up-to-date plans for alert and assembly of our troops, in their armories, and their movement to any part of our state, either for civil disturbances or for natural disasters. We have, as you sheriffs know, operational plans for every area of the state, with designated commanders and liaison officers, with assigned areas of responsibility. We have also included plans for dispatch

of special equipment and weapons, and have prescribed the preparation of detailed plans at the local level, in coordination with you, and with your staffs.

We Are Better Prepared

Through the help and cooperation of the sheriffs and chiefs of police of our principal cities, I feel that we, today, are better prepared to respond rapidly and effectively to any required mission, whether it be man-made or natural disaster.

Our Governor maintains a 24-hour-a-day operation, and he can be contacted in a matter of minutes around the clock. I also maintain a 24-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week duty officer operation at my Headquarters in St. Augustine. The Duty Officer knows where I am at all times, as well as other key people.

This provision of the law, was put there to cover situations where, a natural disaster, for instance, destroys communication facilities.

Reflects Credit Upon Sheriffs

As you all know, under the laws of Florida, the Governor has the authority to mobilize any part of the National Guard, for aid to civil authorities. The law also authorizes the Adjutant General to do so, **in the name of the Governor, when the Governor cannot be contacted.** Normally and traditionally in Florida, the sheriff, as the chief law enforcement officer of the county, is the authority who calls the Governor and requests troops. This procedure has worked well during the 40 years that I have been in the National Guard, and it, I think, reflects credit upon the stature of the sheriffs of our state. Of course, this is not specified by law, and indeed the Governor is not bound by it in any way whatsoever. In fact, in some counties and cities the sheriff and police authorities have agreements and arrangements of their own as to who will handle the combined forces, and there is certainly no inference meant here that such is not your prerogative, and entirely proper. As a matter of fact, of course, the Governor may use such means as he deems proper in determining possible need for use of forces on the state level.

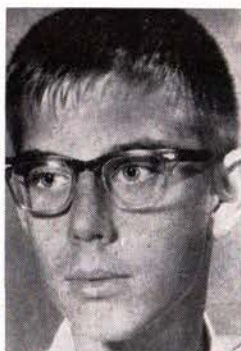
We Are Better Coordinated

It is my candid opinion that we in Florida now—local police, sheriffs' forces—National Guard and other state agencies—are better coordinated—and better prepared, than we have ever been, for joint, coordinated action, in the discharge of our duties, and joint responsibilities, in the performance of any mission which may be necessary.

The National Guard is composed of citizen-soldiers—it is not an instant, full-time army—it takes some time to alert, assemble and move our forces. Neither do we pretend perfection. We are working very hard however, and will continue to work very hard, to produce for the Governor of Florida, the kind of force he needs, as the necessary elements, for success in this vital area—that is—When the gong sounds—Rapid response—With sufficient force at the time and place needed—to prevent the situation getting out of hand—or to restore it to local control as quickly as possible.

Thursby Gets the Kind of Audit Report Public Officials Dream About

DELAND—It's the State Legislative Auditor's job to be critical of sloppy record keeping, deficits and improper procedures.

He doesn't ordinarily throw bouquets, and the most a public official can hope for is an absence of brickbats.

That's what makes Sheriff Rodney Thursby's latest audit report one of the most favorable ever received by a Florida Sheriff—the comments bordered on enthusiastic praise and there were no brickbats.

Prepared by Legislative Auditor Ernest Ellison, the report covers an audit of the Volusia County Sheriff's Department accounts and records for the period from October 1, 1964, through June 30, 1967.

It was dated January 3, 1968, and it stated that "Financial Records were accurate and well kept . . . on forms prescribed for the Sheriff's Finance System.

Property records were in compliance with Chapter 274, Florida Statutes."

The Sheriff's budgets were described as "well prepared, properly amended and closely followed."

"Expenses of the office appeared reasonable and necessary," the report continued, "and were supported by itemized invoices certified as to receipt of goods and services.

"Expenditures were kept within the amounts budgeted . . . unexpended budget receipts . . . were promptly refunded to the Board of County Commissioners as required by law."

With reference to the Sheriff's "balance sheet" the report stated that "assets were adequate to cover all liabilities of record . . ."

"All collections of record were properly accounted for," the report added.

That's Not the Way They Do it on Television

BUNNELL—When you come right down to it, they don't do things in real life the way they do them in novels or on television.

This fact was brought home with a thud November 29 when a few of us here at the News-Journal found ourselves swept up in a murder investigation of nationwide proportions.

For me, at least, the opportunity to view a murder probe from the inside gave a new perspective of how it's done and a growing respect for the law enforcement men who daily work to apprehend those who do violence to their fellow men.

It's a tiring, unpleasant, dirty business and those men—and women—who work in law enforcement are, quite frankly, welcome to it.

DURING THE investigation into the murders of two teenagers, those of us who became deeply involved learned that TV detectives don't know what it's all about.

On TV, it's all very neat. A body is found and Our Hero mutters something like: "I know him. That's so and so."

No problem.

Then, Our Hero saunters back to his office and decides who committed the crime. The culprit is arrested, breaks down and confesses, and the set fades to black with an urging to stay tuned following the deodorant commercial for some scenes from next week's adventure.

Poppycock!

SHERIFF P. A. EDMONSON of Flagler County went without sleep

for three days and nights, working to identify the two youths whose bodies had been dumped in a ditch.

Edmonson spent endless hours on the telephone tracking down the slightest clue that might lead to the identity of the pair.

He searched the woods and swamps for the murder car. He conferred with other law enforcement agents from Indiana to California.

He spoke by telephone with the parents of the murdered boy from Indiana—an unpleasant and nerve wrenching task at best.

But Edmonson did it because someone had to do it.

* * *

STATE ATTY. WARREN had two investigators on the job.

Ray Cass spent most of the murder night on the telephone and at the scene. He spent the next night—and until 3 a.m. the following morning—in Edmonson's office sifting through clues.

As the investigation progressed, Cass' yellow legal pad became stuffed with information, details, theories, false leads, and the sum total of all the work being done by all law enforcement agents.

No detail was overlooked. Direct quotes from telephone conversations were noted. Even items which appeared insignificant were written down because, who knew when the insignificant detail would burst into the vital clue?

Cass traveled the road between Daytona Beach and Bunnell countless times. Then a quick flight to New Orleans at 1 a.m. and a drive from New Orleans to Baton Rouge that same morning.

SPECIAL INVESTIGATOR Harvey Altes didn't get much sleep either. He was up most of two nights and grabbed a plane for New Orleans after napping for about four hours.

Back in Daytona Beach, Altes plunged back into the murder investigation. Two days later he was back in New Orleans with Cass and on his way to Baton Rouge to question a suspect.

Altes' administrative assistant, Mrs. Alice Benson, wasn't idle either. She was assigned the gruesome task of carrying pictures of the dead boys back and forth between her office and The News-Journal where wirephoto transmissions were going on to all parts of the nation.

Mrs. Benson spent more than one night to near midnight doing her part. She drove Cass and Altes to the airport, went to Bunnell to keep notes on the investigation, and on one occasion, was at her job until 3 a.m.

THOSE ARE some of the people who deserve special mention. Others who spent countless hours on the job were policemen from Daytona Beach and the surrounding area, and from such widely scattered places as Bloomfield and Bloomington, Ind., San Rafael and San Francisco, Calif., New Orleans, Baton Rouge, Tallahassee, Nashville, the Louisiana State Police, Volusia Sheriff's Dept., and Deputies from Louisiana, Florida, California, and many other states.

THE ANSWERS were pieced together bit by bit. The identity of one victim was traced through a class ring. The other victim's identity was

traced from a name scrawled on a bloody sleeping bag.

Nothing more. A ring and a name and law enforcement agents learned their identities in two days and at the end of the third day had named two suspects.

On the fourth day after the murders, one suspect was in jail.

Edmonson, Cass, Altes, and the others didn't sit down and dream up a theory.

They worked—day and night and another day—to put the puzzle together.

IT ISN'T FINISHED quite yet, but some day it will be and the file on this case will be closed.

And by that time, there will be other cases to sift through and lose sleep over and worry about.

Having seen them at work, it's a comforting thought to realize the Edmonsons, the Casses and the Alteses of this world are on our side.

CLAUDE ROY KIRK, JR.

36th GOVERNOR

OF FLORIDA

Claude R. Kirk, Jr. was elected Governor of the State of Florida at the age of 40 on November 8, 1966, and became the State's first Republican chief executive in 94 years. His rise to the highest office in state government followed a successful career in the fields of insurance and investment banking.

Governor Kirk was born January 7, 1926, in San Bernardino, California, the first child of Claude R. Kirk, Sr., a native of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Kirk, a native of Athens, Arkansas. The family also includes a daughter, Mrs. Richard Morton.

The family moved from California to Oak Park, Illinois, in 1936 and the senior Kirk entered the manufacturing business producing weighing scales.

Governor Kirk attended grammar schools in the Chicago suburban communities of Oak Park and River Forest.

The family moved to Montgomery, Alabama, when World War II caused the curtailment of non-essential manufacturing concerns.

Governor Kirk entered the U. S. Marine Corps at the completion of his high school education at Lanier High, in Montgomery, in 1943. He was accepted for officer training and met rigid academic standards at Emory and Duke Universities, receiving his commission as a second lieutenant at the age of 19.

His three-year tour of duty with the Marines ended in 1946 without overseas duty.

Claude, Jr. entered the University of Alabama in 1947 and received his law degree in 1949. He also holds an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from Rollins College. He married a University of Alabama schoolmate, Miss Sarah Stokes, of Montgomery.

During his college career he taught jiu-jitsu to the Alabama State Patrol, and sold insurance.

Following graduation from Law School, Governor Kirk went to Birmingham, Alabama, where he continued selling insurance.

He was recalled to service during the Korean Conflict and served both as an infantry first lieutenant and as a naval fire control spotter. He completed this tour of service in 1952 and returned as holder of the Air Medal.

At the time he returned to civilian life in 1952—with a wife, 2 children, no car and just \$408 in assets—he joined forces with two other men to form American Heritage Life Insurance Company with headquarters in Jacksonville, Florida.

Governor Kirk's rise in the business world started with the formation of this company. It began with a stock subscription of \$500,000 and just 10 years later had grown to a successful venture with business in force totaling \$847,082,495.



Governor Kirk directed the activities of American Heritage until he moved to a partnership in Hayden, Stone, Inc., Wall Street investment bankers.

His first venture in politics came in 1960 when he served as Florida Chairman of the Democrats for Nixon Campaign. He changed his registration from Democrat to Republican as a result of that campaign and made his first bid for public office as a candidate for U. S. Senator against Spessard Holland in 1964.

Following the Senatorial campaign, Governor Kirk formed his own firm, Kirk Investment Company, and continued actively in this endeavor until he made his successful bid for the Governorship in 1966.

Governor Kirk is a Lay Reader in the Episcopal Church and for 3 years while in Jacksonville served missions at New Berlin and Fort George which he helped to found. During this service he would leave Jacksonville on Sunday and conduct prayer service at New Berlin at 9:00 a.m. and then move on to Fort George to hold another prayer service. As Lay Reader, he served the missions until a pastor was assigned.

Governor Kirk was divorced from his first wife in 1966. Four children were born to this marriage. They are: Sarah Stokes Kirk, 19; Katherine Gilmer Kirk, 18; and twin sons, Frank and Will, 13, who reside with their mother in New York.

A few weeks after he was inaugurated, Governor Kirk announced his engagement to Erika Mattfeld, German-born beauty from Brazil, and they were married in West Palm Beach, February 18, 1967. He has a stepdaughter, Adriana Mattfeld Dolabella, 6, who is his wife's daughter by a former marriage.

Governor Kirk has moved into an active role in national Republican affairs since his election. He is serving on the Executive Committee of the Republican Governors' Association; and he played an important role in bringing the Republican Convention to Florida. It will be held in Miami Beach in August, 1968.

MEMBERS of the STATE CABINET

The Executive Branch of Florida's government administers and enforces laws. Florida's constitution invests the "supreme executive power" of the state in the Governor and provides for a six-man cabinet to assist him. Each cabinet member is elected state-wide and given specific duties by the constitution. Many of the major administrative functions of the State government are exercised through "ex officio" boards on which the Governor and cabinet members serve by virtue of their office. The Governor and all six cabinet members serve on boards such as the Budget Commission, Board of Commissioners of State Institutions and Department of Public Safety. Other "ex officio" boards have as few as three members.

THE HON. DOYLE CONNER, Florida's 7th Commissioner of Agriculture, was born in Starke, Florida, December 17, 1928; was graduated from Bradford High School in 1947; received a B.S. degree in Agriculture from the University of Florida in 1952. While at the University he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives from Bradford County, at 21, and served five terms. 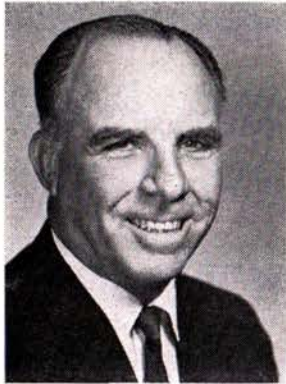

Created in 1887 as The Florida Railroad Commission, it became The Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission in 1947 and the name was changed to Florida Public Utilities Commission in 1963. The present title was established by the 1965 Legislature. Each commissioner is elected for a four-year term.

In the latter part of 1946 he was appointed an assistant to the U.S. Attorney in Miami, and resigned this post to successfully run for Justice of the Peace. He served in that capacity for two terms. He was elected County Commissioner in Dade County and served from January, 1957 until November, 1959, when he was appointed to the Florida Public Service Commission. In 1960 he was elected to this office for a four-year term and reelected in 1964. Served as Chairman of the Commission from January, 1963 until January, 1967.



THE HON. JERRY W. CARTER was born in Barbour County, Alabama, August 11, 1887. He was a salesman and store manager for the Singer Sewing Machine Company, coming to Florida in 1907, where he continued his connection with the company. 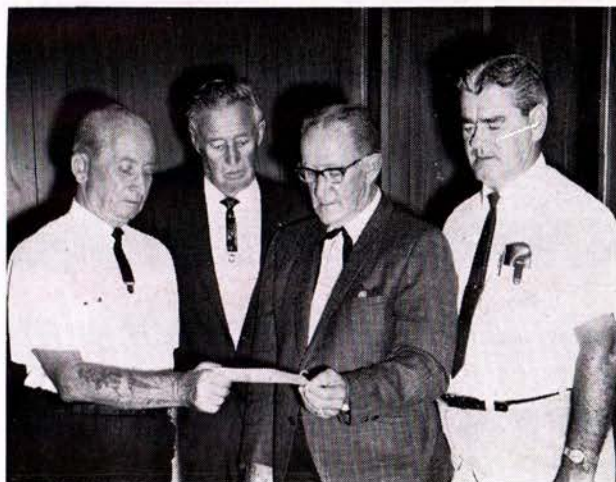

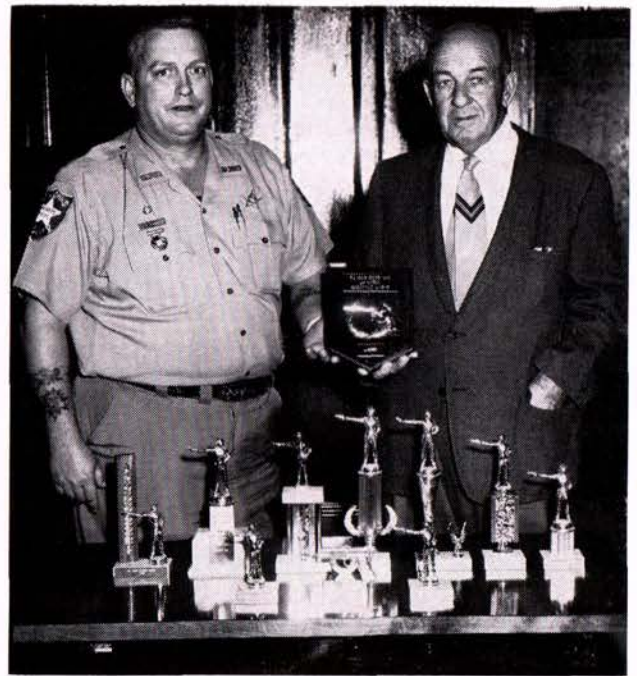

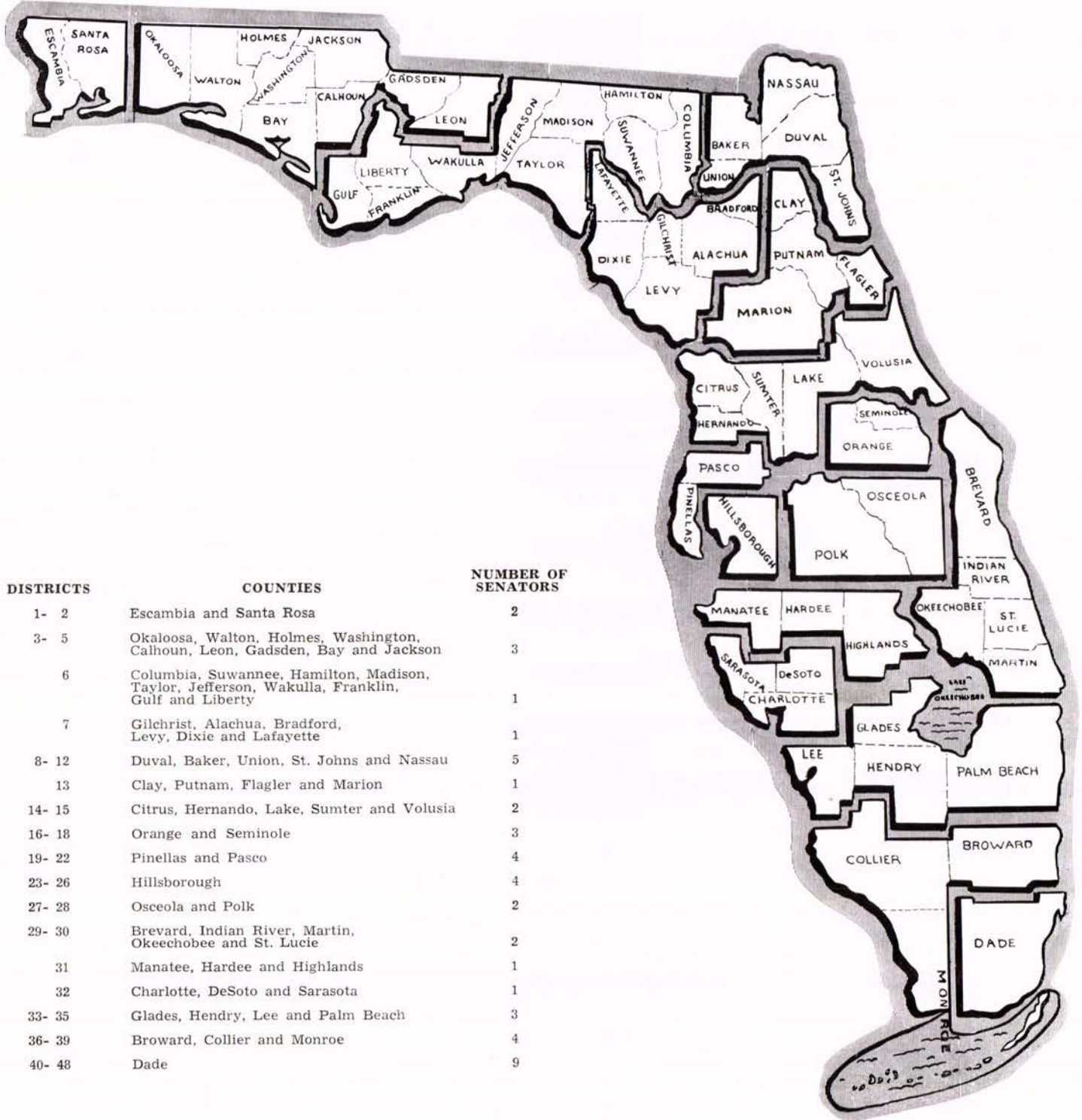
The Lawmakers

The Florida Legislature, composed of the Senate and House of Representatives, is the lawmaking branch of our government. It meets regularly in the Capitol, in Tallahassee, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in April of odd-numbered years. Thus the next regular session is scheduled to convene on April 8, 1969. The Legislature also holds extraordinary or special sessions. The Governor can call one of these sessions; or if three-fifths of the members vote affirmatively, the Legislature can call itself into one of these sessions. Senators are elected for four-year terms. Representatives for two years. The Governor, Cabinet, Justices of the Supreme Court, Judges of Appeal Courts and Circuit Court Judges can only be removed from office by impeachment, a function of the Legislature. The House of Representatives votes articles (or charges) of impeachment and the accused official goes on trial before the Senate. A two-thirds vote of the Senators present is required to convict the accused.

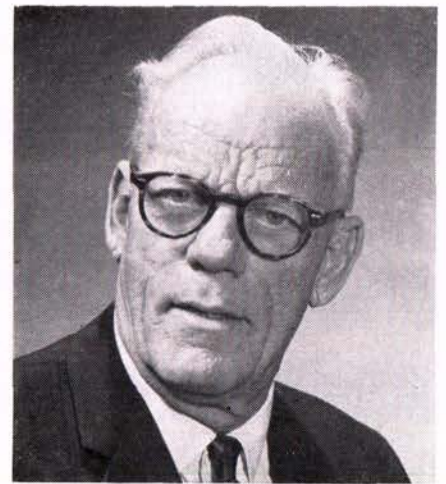

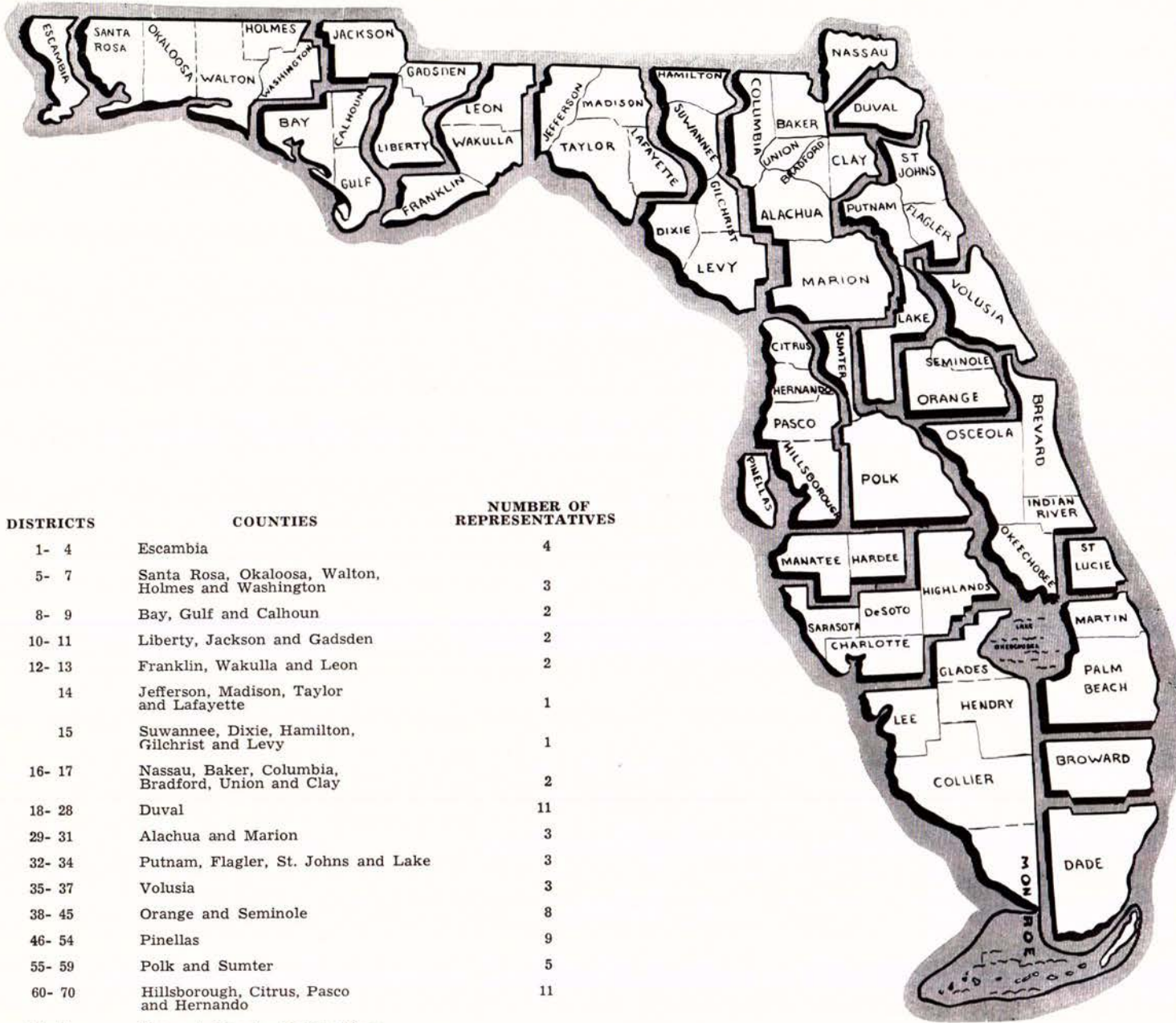

FLORIDA'S GOVERNMENT

SUPREME COURT



CHIEF JUSTICE
THE HON. MILLARD F. CALDWELL was appointed a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court by Gov. Farris Bryant in February, 1962, to fill a vacancy created by the retirement of Justice T. Frank Hobson; and was elected without opposition in November, 1962. He became Chief Justice on July 1, 1967. Other public offices he has held include: member Florida House of Representatives from Santa Rosa County, 1929-31; Member of U. S. Congress, House of Representatives, from Florida's Third District, 1933-41; Governor of Florida, 1945-49; Administrator of U. S. Civilian Defense Administration, 1950-52. He was practicing law in Milton at the time he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives and was a practicing attorney in Tallahassee at the time of his appointment to the Supreme Court. Military Service: World War I Lieutenant, Field Artillery. He was born in Knoxville, Tennessee, February 6, 1897. He is married and his wife's name is Mary Rebecca Caldwell. They have two children. He attended Carson-Newman College, the University of Mississippi and the University of Virginia.



THE HON. CAMPBELL THORNAL has been a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court since May 1955. He was Chief Justice of the Supreme Court from July 1, 1965 to July 1, 1967. Other public offices he has held include City Attorney of Orlando; Florida State Road Board; Florida Turnpike Authority; County Attorney for Orange County. He was a practicing attorney for 25 years in Orlando before becoming a Supreme Court Justice. Military service: Lieut. USNR World War II. Honors: Alpha Kappa Psi, Florida Blue Key, Order of the Coif, Phi Delta Phi Legal Fraternity. He is a member of the Methodist Church and the following organizations: The Florida Bar; American Bar Association; American Law Institute; American Judicature Society. He was born in Charleston, South Carolina, October 15, 1908. He is married and his wife's name is Alyce L. Thornal. They have two children. He attended the public schools of Orlando, Florida; and received an LL.B. degree from the University of Florida. He is vice chairman of the Board of Trustees of Florida Southern College.



THE HON. RICHARD W. ERVIN was appointed a Justice of The Florida Supreme Court by Gov. Farris Bryant, January 15, 1964, to fill a vacancy created by the retirement of the late Justice Glenn Terrell; and he was sworn in January 17, 1964. At the time of his appointment he was serving his fourth four-year term as Florida's Attorney General, having taken that office on January 4, 1949. Justice Ervin was born January 26, 1905, at Carrabelle, Florida; and was educated in the public schools of Citrus, DeSoto, Leon, Orange and Marion Counties. He was graduated from the College of Law at the University of Florida

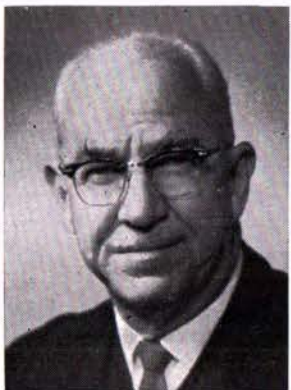
uated from the College of Law at the University of Florida

in 1928 and practiced law in Pinellas, Lee and Putnam Counties. His career of public service includes positions as attorney for the State Road Department, Assistant Attorney General, Secretary of the Florida Railroad Commission, attorney for the Overseas Road and Toll Bridge District and attorney for the Department of Public Safety. In 1951 he was selected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as the outstanding public official in the state. He is a past president of the National Association of Attorneys General, and previously served as vice president and chairman of the Southern Regional Group of Attorneys General. He is married to the former Frances Baker, of Jacksonville, and they have two children.



THE HON. ALTO ADAMS was originally appointed to the Supreme Court in 1940; resigned to devote his time to business interests in 1952 after serving two years as Chief Justice; and was appointed to the high court again in November, 1967, by Gov. Claude R. Kirk, Jr., to fill a vacancy created when Justice Stephen C. O'Connell resigned to become President of the University of Florida. He practiced law in Fort Pierce from 1924 to 1938, at which time he was appointed a Circuit Judge (9th circuit). At one time Justice Adams owned and operated the Okeechobee Live-

stock Market and for many years he was in partnership with his son, Alto Lee Adams, Jr., in the cattle business. They raised cattle in St. Lucie and Osceola Counties. Justice Adams is a Director of the National Life Insurance Co. of Florida; a Director of the University of Florida Foundation; and a member of the Episcopal Church. He was born in Walton County, Florida, January 31, 1899; attended high school in DeFuniak Springs and Gainesville; was graduated from the University of Florida with an LL.B. Degree in 1921; and began practicing law in Pensacola. He is married to the former Carra Williams and they have a son and a daughter.



THE HON. E. HARRIS DREW, was appointed a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court, August 18, 1952. Served as Chief Justice 1955-56; 1963-65. Other public offices he has held include Town Attorney, Town of Palm Beach; Attorney for Jupiter Inlet District; Attorney for Everglades Drainage District; Member and Secretary, Board of Pilot Commissioners for the Port of Palm Beach; Member, Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission of the State of Florida. He is a member of Holy Trinity Church of West Palm Beach, Florida, and the following organizations:

Masons; American Law Institute; American Judicature Society; Chevalier Legion of Honor of DeMolay; Phi Alpha Delta Legal Fraternity; Delta Sigma Phi Social Fraternity. Honors: President, Florida State Bar Association; 1962 Recipient of honorary membership in Gold Key, Florida State University, for outstanding public service; 1962 Recipient of award of Friends of 440 for outstanding contributions in the field of workmen's compensation; Member Awards Jury Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge, 1956-1964. Recipient Ben C. Willard Award from Stetson College of Law, 1967-68. He was born in Fargo, Georgia, October 28, 1903. He is married and his wife's name is Edith Turner Drew. They have one daughter. He attended the public schools of Florida. He received an LL.B. degree and also an honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, from Stetson University.



THE HON. B. K. ROBERTS

has been a Justice of the Florida Supreme Court since July 7, 1949, and served as Chief Justice 1953-54 and July 1, 1961-July 1, 1963.
