



The 70's Will Be Exciting

**PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE
BY
SHERIFF DALE CARSON**



As we step into the 70's, law enforcement in Florida has more going for it than at any other time in its history. We took great steps forward in the 60's and laid important cornerstones for the years ahead. The current evolution of state government has given us a law enforcement oriented legislature, responsive to our needs, and the pendulum has begun to swing back to our side. There were more laws passed in the 1969 session of the legislature to strengthen our position and weaken that of the criminals than in any other session.

One of the cornerstones laid in the sixties on which we can build was the establishment of the Police Standards Council. The minimum training standards set by this council guarantee trained officers for all of the counties and cities of our great state. The junior college system of our state also offers degrees in Police Administration, and this may well prove to be an important key to true police professionalization.

The Omnibus Crime Bill passed by the United States Congress has already begun to strengthen local law enforcement. Thousands of dollars are being spent to develop new techniques and new weapons for our fight against crime. Seven regional councils have been formed to coordinate the sheriff's departments and police departments.

For the first time the 67 sheriff's offices and the 293 police departments are effectively uniting to protect the lives and property of our citizens.

The 10,000 full-time law enforcement officers in the state are now being trained, united and coordinated for the first time. More effective laws, better trained men and modern equipment give the average citizen a feeling of confidence in his government he could not possibly have had before. We laid a firm foundation in the sixties, and we will realize the rewards in the seventies.

The first year of this decade will see the installation of a communications network for our departments that will revolutionize our work. The computer will become a "cop" and furnish the man in the patrol car with instant information. With his police radio the officer will be able to check a name or a license number through his department's files, the state's files and the National Crime Information Center in Washington in a matter of seconds.

Wanted persons will be apprehended and innocent persons will be released; stolen property will be identified and bad check artists will be stopped; all as a result of information stored in computers. The man in the car will have communications tools he has never had before.

Truly, the seventies will be successful and exciting because of the groundwork laid by dedicated sheriffs and police administrators in the sixties.

Looking at Law Enforcement in Tallahassee
Is Like Trying to Find Your Way Through

THE ALPHABET JUNGLE

To the outsider it helps to know that you go to the FDLE to file a fingerprint, to the DOB to check on the owner of "Joe's Bar"; or to the FCIC to talk about a computer terminal. If you're interested in a quick safari, read on . . . and good hunting!

The initials look like an abbreviation of "fiddle", but reports from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement indicate this state agency cannot be accused of "just fiddling around" during 1969.

The score board shows:

But these figures tell only a partial story of the activities of a department that plays a big role in law enforcement. FDLE is an outgrowth of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, and the Bureau's successor, the Florida Bureau of Law Enforcement. It functions under the Governor and Cabinet, but day-to-day operations are under the supervision of an Executive Director. He is appointed by the Governor, subject to approval by three members of the Cabinet and confirmation by the Senate. Bill Reed, former police officer-attorney, is presently the Executive Director.

The many duties of FDLE include investigating criminal law violations, organized crime, vice racketeering and narcotics traffic. When directed by the Governor in writing, it also investigates public officials and public employees. During 1969 its division of administrative intelligence received and processed 57 complaints of official misconduct.

The FDLE serves as a clearing house for fingerprints and information about criminals. It also operates a crime laboratory. A 1969 law requires it to supervise the Florida Police Academy, a school for recruit and in-service training financed by a \$1.00 court cost assessment levied on each person convicted of a criminal offense other than a parking violation. A court challenge questioning the legality of this assessment has slowed the academy project temporarily.

One of the FDLE's biggest missions is to establish an intrastate system for storing and transmitting crime information. This function will be carried out by the Florida Crime Information Center (FCIC) which is described under a separate heading.

FDLE also plays an important role in Florida's new "Mutual Aid Plan" which provides for an exchange of men and equipment between municipalities and counties in the event of riots or other emergencies. The Executive Director of the FDLE serves on a new state Mutual Aid Council with the Governor and Attorney General.

1969 figures further emphasize the "cooperation and assistance" role of the FDLE. They show that 235 of the 425 crime cases handled by the Division of Operations were originated by other police agencies.

They also show that 2,164 (or 68 per cent) of the cases logged by the crime laboratory came from Sheriff's Departments; while only 659 (or 20 per cent) came from police departments.

Significant to criminals and law abiding citizens alike is the FDLE score of 277 "hits" scored (wanted persons identified) through processing of fingerprints and other requests.

The Florida Crime Information Center (FCIC) is not a state law enforcement agency. Actually it is merely a project ramrodded by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, but its impact on the crime war will be so great that we are giving it separate billing in this trek through the "alphabet jungle."

The basic function of the FCIC is to store crime information in computers in Tallahassee, and flash it by wire to all parts of the state.

Terminals directly connected to the computers will be installed in Sheriff's offices, Police Departments and other enforcement agencies all over Florida. Messages sent from these terminals will enable officers out in the field to get within seconds vital information about crimes and criminals.

A deputy sheriff following a suspicious looking car will be able to determine — by radioing his headquarters and having a message flashed by wire to the computer — whether the car is stolen before he stops it. Sometimes the message will also warn him that the occupants of the car are armed and dangerous — a matter of life or death when you're dealing with desperate criminals.

Planning and research have been going on for several years, and now the FCIC is in the final stages of development. Installation of terminals in the field will begin in May, and the system is expected to start operating in July. At that time there will be 55 terminals in Sheriff's Offices, 9 in police departments, 39 in Highway Patrol stations, and 5 in other agencies to make a total of 108.

Installation of terminals will continue at a rate of about 13 per month until September, 1971, when the total of terminals is expected to reach 300.

Starting in July, 1970, FCIC terminals are expected to replace the present teletype equipment linking together Sheriff's offices, FDLE and the FHP under FLEX (Florida Law Enforcement Communications System). Thus the FCIC network will function as a state-wide communications system as well as an "instant information" system for retrieving data from the Tallahassee computers.

FCIC will be linked directly to the FBI's National Crime Information Center, in Washington, D. C., giving Florida enforcement officials instant access to the nation-wide crime data stored there.

From FCIC local law enforcement officers will be able to obtain information about wanted persons, auto registrations, driver's licenses, stolen property, criminal history of individuals and criminal identification. They will in turn continually feed similar information to the FCIC computers.

To enhance the effectiveness of FCIC the Florida Department of Law Enforcement has been increasing its capacity in the processing of fingerprint cards by employing computers and microfilm. When fully implemented, this system will enable the department to process 100% of the fingerprint cards generated by arrests in Florida, rather than 34% previously processed.

The Division of Beverage in the Department of Business Regulation (formerly the State Beverage Department) claims to be the largest investigative agency in state government.

Its Director, Raymond E. Beary, was appointed by Governor Claude Kirk in July, 1969. He is a professional law enforcement administrator with an extensive police background, and is a graduate of the FBI's National Academy.

The Division's functions include: enforcement of the beverage and cigarette laws; making arrests for other violations occurring on licensed premises; regulating the beverage and cigarette industries (including more than 19,000 licensed premises); and collecting taxes amounting to more than \$112,000,000 annually.

The Division has 14 district offices around the state and maintains a staff of approximately 270, including 130 enforcement agents and supervisors.

For the year 1969 the Division of Beverage reported: 1,914 persons arrested for violating the beverage and cigarette laws, and for other violations such as prostitution and gambling; 115 moonshine stills and 3,235 gallons of non-tax-paid whiskey destroyed; 46 vehicles and 48,516 packs of "bootleg" cigarettes confiscated.

During the same period Agents conducted 5,004 licensed premises inspections, issued 1,958 citations and made 866 administrative cases against liquor license holders.

In administrative hearings the Director suspended 71 licenses, revoked 33, and collected \$112,200 in civil penalties.

Finding the Florida Highway Patrol on the highways and byways is a lot easier than tracking it down within the state's governmental structure.

Prior to reorganization, it was the traffic law enforcing arm of the Department of Public Safety.

Reorganization combined the Department of Public Safety with the Department of Motor Vehicles to form a new agency known as the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles.

The FHP is one of three divisions within this new agency. The others are Division of Driver Licenses and Division of Motor Vehicles.

Along with this change of status, there was a change of command. Col. H. N. Kirkman, who had held the spot of "No. 1 Trooper" ever since the founding of the Patrol, was boosted upstairs from Director of the Department of Public Safety, to Executive Director of the new Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles in 1969. However, he retired on February 19, 1970, his 78th birthday; and Ralph Davis, former Executive Director of the State Road Department, succeeded him.

The FHP division head under Davis is Col. Reid Clifton, who was formerly the No. 2 man in the FHP.

Col. Kirkman's retirement marks the end of an era that began in 1936 when he was selected by Gov. Dave Sholtz to set up a road patrol division within the State Road Department.

This was the beginning of the Florida Highway Patrol, but a "false start" in a sense because Gov. Fred Cone abolished the State Road Patrol a short time later.

The Highway Patrol in its present form was created by the 1939 legislature, and it has continued to grow and to play a vital role in law enforcement ever since that time.

Col. Kirkman was the first commander of Highway Patrol troopers. He served under W. F. Reid, of Lakeland, the first Director of the Department of Public Safety; and later returned from World War II military service to become the Director, a position he held until governmental reorganization went into effect in 1969.

A new era is now beginning, with the authorized strength of the FHP standing at 902 uniformed patrolmen. And, every possible effort is being made, a spokesman said, to utilize technological advances as a means of reducing the death toll, injuries and property damage caused by traffic accidents.




One of the technological advances coming into constant use is the Breathalyzer, an instrument which determines the alcohol content of the blood by chemical analysis of the breath. Under Florida's "implied consent" law, drivers arrested for driving while under the influence of intoxicating beverages are required to submit to chemical tests or face a six-month license suspension.

The FHP said it was obvious the driver had been drinking or was intoxicated in 15,683 of the 205,012 traffic accidents reported in Florida in 1968.

Another technological advance utilized by the FHP is VASCAR, a speed calculator described in detail under a special heading.

All future Florida Highway Patrol Troopers learn how to use tear gas as part of their riot training; and they also learn what it's like to be on the receiving end of a tear gas attack. VASCAR

VISUAL AVERAGE SPEED COMPUTER AND RECORDER

To speak the lingo of law enforcement, you need to know the meaning of alphabetical abbreviations. Some of them are used to identify enforcement agencies, others, like VASCAR, are coming into common usage to identify new types of equipment.

VASCAR is the code name for Visual Average Speed Computer and Recorder, a relatively new speed calculator that operates on the principle that speed equals distance divided by time.

The Florida Highway Patrol recently obtained a federal grant to purchase 200 of these devices as a means of making troopers more effective in apprehending speeders.

VASCAR is also being used by a number of Sheriffs' Departments in Florida.

It enables officers on patrol to clock vehicles moving in any direction, day or night, without "pacing" the vehicle with a patrol car. The VASCAR operator can clock vehicles moving toward him, approaching from the rear, or crossing the highway; and he can operate the equipment while his patrol car is moving or standing still.

The electronic "speed cop" utilizes integrated circuits and a digital computer to clock speeders, and it calculates the speed promptly. Users say it is accurate within 1/10 of a mile per hour.


According to the Florida Highway Patrol, VASCAR is expected to reduce operational costs because patrol cars

will be doing less "pacing" of suspected speeders. It is also expected to increase the "productivity" of troopers by enabling them to apprehend habitual violators and thereby reduce the accident rate.

During 1968, speeding and "speed too great for existing conditions" were cited as contributing factors in 64,648 of the 205,012 accidents in Florida; and in 877 of the 1,767 fatal accidents.

INTER-AGENCY LAW ENFORCEMENT PLANNING COUNCIL

It's the newest and smallest state law enforcement agency.

It occupies a small office suite in the Tallahassee Bank and Trust Co. Building.

None of its staff members wear a uniform or visibly carry a gun.

And yet, if the Inter-Agency Law Enforcement Planning Council continues to progress at its present rate, it will pack a tremendous wallop in the war on crime.

It's primary role is to accept crime fighting funds appropriated by the federal government under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act; match them with state or local funds; and distribute them state-wide to beef up the entire criminal justice system.

Money is its weapon — not manpower or sophisticated scientific equipment — and federal law requires that 75 per cent of the action funds it distributes must go to the local level.

Created by Gov. Claude Kirk on August 20, 1968, the IALEPC received a federal grant of \$503,650 for planning purposes. Next came a federal grant of \$737,035 in "action money" to implement some of the proposed projects; and the Florida Legislature voted \$400,000 for matching funds.

Currently the planning council is putting the finishing touches on a comprehensive plan for the next fiscal year which will have a price tag of approximately \$9.7 million. It is expected that \$5.8 million of this total will come from the federal government, and the balance from local and state matching funds.

A Planning Council spokesman pointed out that although this is a sharp increase in spending, it amounts to only about two per cent of the total amount spent annually on Florida's Criminal Justice System. Estimates put Florida's annual crime fighting bill (for courts, law enforcement, corrections, parole, probation — the whole works) at about \$500 million.

To make a real impact, funds poured into the justice system will therefore have to continue to increase at a spectacular rate, and that's one reason why the IALEPC looms as a future "giant" in the law enforcement picture.

But, the Planning Council is more than just a "big spender." Equally important are its roles in planning and research; or in monitoring and evaluating funded projects.

The Council is the small visible portion of a veritable "iceberg" of law enforcement "know how" that embraces all facets of the criminal justice system and reaches down into the "grass roots" of local law enforcement.

Gov. Claude Kirk is the chairman. Membership includes five Sheriffs: Dale Carson, Duval County; William Heidtman, Palm Beach County; Wilson Purdy, Dade County; Edward J. Stack, Broward County; and Richard W. Weitzenfeld, Manatee County.

A full-time staff under Administrator Allan C. Hubanks carries out the decisions and directives of the 30-member Council.


Projects considered by the Council come from two sources:

- (1) Task forces dealing with state-wide areas of concern such as juvenile delinquency; law enforcement training, organized crime; research and review of the criminal justice system; the police; narcotics, drugs and alcohol abuse; corrections, probation and parole; public information and community involvement.
- (2) Regional Planning Councils which will identify local needs and guide local planning efforts.

There are seven regional planning councils, and each one is composed of four Sheriffs and four police chiefs. Six of the councils are headed by Sheriffs. They are: Raymond Hamlin, Leon County; Doug Willis, Marion County; Dale Carson, Duval County; Jack Bent, Charlotte County; Sam Joyce, Indian River County; and Wilson Purdy, Dade County. The remaining council (Region 4) is headed by Police Chief Don Adams, of Kissimmee.

Projects originating within the task forces and Regional Councils are channeled through the Planning Council staff in Tallahassee. The staff evaluates them; coordinates them; and makes recommendations to the Planning Council.

This "rescue mission" was only a practice drill, but it emphasizes the important role the Florida Marine Patrol plays in boating safety. Patrol officers are trained to assist boatmen in distress. They also enforce safety regulations to protect the boating public against needless risks.



It is the function of the Planning Council to accept, reject or amend the various proposals; and to blend them into a comprehensive state-wide plan.

Action projects funded by IALEPC during 1969 added up to a total cost of \$1,925,635. They included a treatment center for parolees and probationers; an adult offender rehabilitation complex; residential group home care for juvenile delinquents; a drug abuser rehabilitation program; and a law enforcement training program.


Additional projects are designed to make an impact on many areas of the criminal justice system. Those of particular interest to local law enforcement would: provide a mobile training unit; assist sheriffs and police chiefs in recruiting officers; establish small satellite crime labs; set up regional equipment pools to provide expensive items small departments cannot afford; produce training films on video tape; and establish a regional computerized law enforcement crime information center.

Assisting a beached whale or tracking down violators of conservation laws . . . so go the day-to-day duties of the Marine Patrol.

Under governmental reorganization, the former State Board of Conservation became the Division of Marine Resources within the Department of Natural Resources. Its law enforcement arm is the Florida Marine Patrol.

The Marine Patrol officer's prime responsibility is to enforce the laws enacted by the Legislature for the preservation of Florida's vast marine resources.

Officers patrol rivers, creeks, bays, the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico checking for violations of the conservation laws protecting our salt water fish, shellfish crustacea, turtles and marine mammals.

There are over 1,000 licensed wholesale seafood dealers and some 6,000 retail seafood dealers who must be checked periodically to see if they are properly licensed; and if their products are of legal size and in legal season.

Checks must also be made of the over 20,000 commercial fishing boats and other vehicles used to transport seafood to see if their products are freshly iced and free from contamination. The vehicles must conform to the Florida Seafood Quality Control Code.

The Division of Marine Resources has also been charged with several additional law enforcement duties it did not inherit from the Board of Conservation such as reporting to (Continued)

the Internal Improvement Fund all dredging and filling of state-owned water bottoms; and notifying the Bureau of Beaches and Shores when illegal shoreline construction is found.

Fish kills must be checked out for evidence of pollution and all such information reported to the Division's research laboratory and the Department of Air and Water Pollution.

The Patrol maintains close liason with the State's civil defense units in cases of hurricanes, tornadoes or floods and Marine Patrol officers are often called upon to join search and rescue operations.

A 40-man squad of Marine Patrol officers is especially trained and equipped for riot control duty.

To cover Florida's vast coastal areas the Patrol utilizes 100 small radio-equipped boats, 12 larger vessels ranging from 25 to 80 feet in length and a small plane.

Enforcement of boat registration and safety laws has become an increasingly important part of the Patrol's work. Officers are empowered to issue warnings and citations for unsafe conditions and for lack of registration.

The Florida Boating Council, formerly composed of representatives of the Board of Conservation; Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission; Governor's office; Attorney General's office; Florida Sheriffs Association; and the Coast Guard, was abolished by governmental reorganization and its functions taken over by the Division of Marine Resources.

One of the most important of the Council's projects, the Junior Boatman's Safety Course for youngsters 10-14, is now carried out by the Marine Patrol.

The Patrol has 12 men assigned permanently to teaching boating safety and inspecting pleasure craft.

The increased emphasis on safety instruction has paid big dividends, according to the Patrol's statistics. In 1963 some 79 persons lost their lives in boating accidents in Florida waters; while in 1968 only 39 such deaths were reported. This decrease occurred in spite of a 20 per cent increase in boat registrations during the same period.

Although it is only two years old, the Florida Police Standards Council has made great forward strides by establishing three levels of training for law enforcement officers.

These levels range from the 200-hour basic training course (which every newly-hired officer must take before he can go to work) to a four-year college course culminating in a Police Science Degree.

In between are Junior College Programs offering Associate Degrees in law enforcement following completion of two years of college level work.

Executive Director Jack Ledden said the Police Standards Council placed primary emphasis on basic training after it was established by the Florida Legislature in 1967; and it has since created and served 43 schools and academies state-wide.

To date these schools have produced 3,047 graduates, he added.

The PSC has also certified more than 800 instructors who are qualified to teach in the basic training schools, and it has held seminars to create uniformity in teaching techniques.

The Associate Degree Program in Florida's Junior Colleges was established with the help of a \$15,000 grant from the Office of Law Enforcement Assistance, in Washington, D. C. This grant financed an eight-month study which produced a "common body of knowledge" dealing with law enforcement subjects that could be used to supplement the general education curriculum.

All 27 Junior Colleges accepted the "common body of knowledge" and 21 of them are now offering Associate Law Enforcement Degrees of two types. One is an Associate Degree in Science which is terminal; the other is an Associate Degree in Arts which is transferrable to a four-year institution.

Ledden said enrollment of police officers in Associate Degree Programs has been heavy since the project began in September, 1969. He said several Junior Colleges had Associate Degree Programs prior to the PSC study, but there was no consistency in curriculums.

The top level of training — a four-year Baccalaureate Degree in Police Science — was developed at Florida Atlantic University, Boca Raton. Ledden said PSC staff members worked closely with FAU officials and the Florida Board of Regents in bringing this about.

As it moves toward its third birthday, the PSC is setting its sights on many other training goals.

Ledden said staff members have filed proposals seeking federal funds to help finance a mobile training unit; a closed television circuit training network; and a consultant to assist law enforcement agencies in budgeting and organizational problems.

He added that a bill has also been filed in the Legislature to give Police Standards Council control over private diploma-granting law enforcement schools. This bill, he explained, is designed to regulate "diploma mills" that have little or no validity.

A 1967 law supported by the Florida Sheriffs Association established minimum standards for law enforcement officers and created the PSC.

This law stipulated that a newly-hired police officer must be at least 21 years of age; a citizen of the United States; a high school graduate (or equivalent); must not have been convicted of a felony, or of a misdemeanor involving "moral turpitude"; must not have a dishonorable military discharge; must have fingerprints on file; and must have a good moral character, as determined by investigation.

These qualifications do not apply to elected law enforcement officers, or to police officers who were employed prior to the effective date of the law (June 21, 1967.)

The 200-hour curriculum for basic training was adopted on June 9, 1968, and since that date all newly-hired officers have been required to complete the 200 hours of training.

In this, its 27th year of operation, the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission's law enforcement duties range from the historic role of protecting wildlife, to a new job of guarding human life and property in emergency situations.

The modern concept of the Commission was described by W. B. Copeland (Commission Chairman from 1965 to 1967) when he said: "Hunting, fishing, boating and other associated outdoor activities are big business for Florida. These forms of recreation must be managed as a business and the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission serves as a board of directors to determine that the business of hunting and fishing is managed for the mutual benefit of all concerned."

When the Commission came into being in 1943 there were 166 local hunting and fishing laws on the statute books making for confusion and misunderstanding among the state's hunters.

During the past quarter-century many of the early laws and regulations of the Commission have been repealed as unnecessary. The modern trend has been away from restrictions.

And, while the laws have been simplified for the hunters and fishermen, the work of the wildlife officer has become more complicated.

The first officers were concerned with enforcement of regulations dealing with birds, game, fur-bearing animals, fresh water fishes, reptiles and amphibians.

But with better training and more experience, wildlife officers have become engaged in many phases of wildlife conservation.

And in 1963 boating safety and registration laws were passed which charged wildlife officers with the duty to enforce these laws.

Today there are approximately 140 wildlife officers and 20 supervisors serving in five regions under the direct control of the Commission's chief of law enforcement in Tallahassee.

With specialized equipment such as airplanes, helicopters, swamp buggies and air boats, wildlife officers are often asked to join search and rescue operations. A riot squad also trains regularly and can be called out by the Governor in an emergency.

It Was A Very Good Year

An address by Sheriff Don Genung presented at the closing luncheon of the Florida Sheriffs Association's Annual Mid-Winter Conference, January 27, 1970.

Our Mid-Winter Conference is drawing to a close. It is almost time for me to relinquish the gavel and step into the precarious role of past president.

So I would like to spend the last few minutes of my administration reflecting upon the solid accomplishments of the Sheriffs Association during 1969.

From any point of view, it was a very good year. We grew and prospered in many ways. And, more important than that, we added new dimensions to our image as "the organization that gives needy youngsters a new start in life."

1969 will long be remembered as the year in which the Florida Sheriffs Association voted to embark upon a new humanitarian venture — The Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa.

And, since Sheriffs are men of action, we did more than just talk about a home for needy and worthy girls. We began a careful search for a suitable building site; we laid the groundwork for long range planning; we chartered the proposed new institution as a non-profit corporation; and we accepted thousands of dollars in contributions — dollars that came to us spontaneously as an expression of public confidence, even though we made no fund raising efforts.

At the same time the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch continued to grow and develop at an accelerating rate under the inspired guidance of Administrator Harry Weaver. We added some 1,800 acres of valuable farmland to our holdings; built new facilities valued at over \$320,000; and increased our capacity to a new high of 120 boys.

1969 was also the year that the Florida Sheriffs Association stepped into "the age of the computer." Our hard working staff in Tallahassee, under the leadership of Executive Director Carl Stauffer, converted our record keeping to electronic data processing; and the new system is now in operation.

This conversion required six months of concentrated, exacting work, and placed a heavy burden on the staff; but it will pay off for many years to come by increasing our efficiency and our capacity to handle an ever-growing work load without a proportionate increase in operating expenditures.

In 1969 our fund raising broke all previous records.

So did the circulation of our award-winning magazine, THE SHERIFF'S STAR, with the press run topping 34,000 copies for the first time.

It was a banner year in the halls of the Florida Legislature too.

The Florida Sheriffs Association, ably represented by our attorney, Jack Madigan, played a leading role in putting many important new laws on the books — laws that have already been instrumental in making our crime fighting efforts more effective.

1969 will also be remembered as the year in which steps were finally taken to put into print the much discussed, and vitally important, revision of THE SHERIFF'S MANUAL.

This project is well under way, and the capable editor, Mr. Iven Lamb, will soon release the first section to Sheriffs, government officials, attorneys and other interested individuals.

The Florida Sheriffs Association is obviously "on the move" — not only with new projects but with the routine day-to-day business that continues to add respect and prestige to the historic title of "Sheriff."

Our executive director informed me that our headquarters office in Tallahassee moved some 650,000 pieces of mail in 1969. These included some 360,000 copies of THE SHERIFF'S STAR, plus conference invitations, memorandums, form letters, credentials, Boys Ranch Seals and Christmas Greetings, lifetime membership plaques, and Sheriffs Association campaign letters.

The poor old postman, and millions of other people in all walks of life, were constantly reminded that the Sheriffs of Florida are very much "in business." In many ways, including our conferences and seminars, we made it clear that Sheriffs are exerting strong leadership in law enforcement.

Yes, 1969 was a very good year for the Florida Sheriffs Association, and it has been a rare privilege to serve as your president during this important period.

Perhaps I should have just retired quietly, but I felt it was important for us to reflect upon our accomplishments. They have been substantial, and I hope they will prompt you to face the coming year with a strong resolve to make even greater gains.

To my fellow Sheriffs I want to express my deep appreciation for all they have done to make my term as president successful. I am indebted to all of you for one of the greatest gifts any man can receive — the warm feeling of pride and fulfillment that comes with a job well done — a job well done by all of us working together to attain worthy goals.

There is a place . . .

Yes, there is a place for needy boys, homeless boys, abused boys, confused boys, orphaned boys, abandoned boys, underprivileged boys and boys who are the victims of broken homes.

It's a place of refuge for good boys who have had some bad breaks.

It's a place where the dropout and the drifter can get a new start, adopt worthwhile goals, build a secure future.

It's a place where time-tested values are carefully preserved — where boys learn to work and play, study and pray in the traditional American way.

We call it The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, a nationally-famous home for needy and worthy youngsters sponsored by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

. . . and now girls will have a place too.

Late in 1969 the Sheriffs Association took the first steps toward establishing a similar home for girls to be known as the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa. A building site is expected to be selected in 1970; and construction of facilities will move ahead at a pace determined by the flow of funds from generous donors.

Both institutions are supported entirely by voluntary contributions.



Future Needs of Boys Ranch are

The Boys Ranch continues to be "a needy home for needy boys" simply because present and future needs are practically unlimited.

Just to build and equip one new residence cottage will cost over \$90,000. A new cottage will allow us to admit 16 more boys, but we already have some 40 qualified applicants on our waiting list. So it goes.

We have outgrown our water system and we will have to spend a large sum of money this year for an


elevated water tank designed to fill anticipated requirements for many years to come.

Replacing a small, rustic "canteen" with a modern activity center for the Ranch "family" and visitors will cost about \$75,000. Funds are not available now, but when they are we will include in this new facility a barber shop, a variety store, a snack bar and a patio.

As the Ranch grows and boys become more involved in team sports

such as football, track and soccer, the need for a well lighted athletic field becomes more urgent. We have the spot picked out, and a tentative price tag of \$25,000, but no funds are available at the present time.

A remedial education unit with an estimated cost of \$50,000 ranks high on our list of future needs. We expect to continue to send our boys to public schools, but many of them come to us with their educational needs sadly neglected, and we want to

be able to give them special tutoring to help them catch up with other boys in their age group.

Our primary goal will be to broaden the educational opportunities and attainments of all of our boys. This is especially true in the area of vocational education.

For many years we have been talking about a \$100,000 Arts and Crafts building to enrich the lives of our boys and encourage special aptitudes, but plans have remained on the shelf because other projects have taken priority. It's still a future need, however.

Because of the remote location of the Ranch, staff homes are an absolute necessity. We have six at the present time, and we will have to add at least five more as the Ranch grows. We hope to be able to build them for \$15,000 each, for a total investment of \$75,000.

Future needs include a larger social service staff to deal with the emotional problems of boys, work with the families from which the boys came, and to help the boys plan their futures.

As the Boys Ranch and the Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa develop, it is likely that boys and girls will be offered for adoption. When this happens, the social service staff will play a vital role in arranging the adoptions and helping the adopted child and his new parents to make adjustments.

Group homes are another possibility on the not too distant horizon. These homes could be located in population centers to accommodate groups of 8 to 12 boys with special needs and potentialities.

The Ranch is not a "bare subsistence" type of institution. When we enroll a boy we try to do everything possible to help him realize his full potential in life. Therefore, we are constantly improving our counseling and social services, our recreational facilities, educational opportunities and staff training. All this will continue to increase our future needs.

We have many goals, and, to attain them, we intend to go as far and as fast as our financial resources will permit. The real pacesetters, however, will be our loyal contributors. The Ranch is supported entirely by their voluntary donations, and it cannot progress without their continuing generosity.

Staff Must Have Constant Training

The Boys Ranch is no place for a bungling amateur. It takes skill, intelligence, sincere dedication and a genuine interest in boys to qualify as a staff member.

And it requires constant training, plus experience to develop the necessary professional skills.

Staff members are involved in a continuing program of in-service training which includes professional meetings, workshops and short courses.

They also have frequent opportunities to discuss their problems with professional consultants such as psychiatrists, psychologists and pediatricians.

The Boys Ranch is a member of the University of North Carolina Group Child Care Consultant Service, which provides professional evaluation of staff procedures and policies.

It's a Many Splendored Thing


The total program at the Boys Ranch is a "many splendored thing" that concentrates on the "now" while reaching out into the past and the future.

Administrator Harry Weaver explained that the "now" is called "Ranch Life," and it deals with the current needs of each boy. It involves discipline, chores, schooling, food and shelter, clothing, personal finances, recreation, activities, medical and dental care, fire protection and farming.


The past and the future are dealt with by the social service department. This agency studies a boy's past in order to better understand his current needs. It also tries to help him plan his future.

Then there is the business side of the program that deals with record keeping, receiving and expending funds, maintaining a comprehensive inventory and exercising management over a wide variety of business matters.

Development is another important phase of the program. It involves planning for future improvement in the program, services and facilities. It also involves telling the "Boys Ranch Story" through movies, radio, television, printed materials, speeches, and personal contacts.

Where are They Now? How are They Doing?

During the ten years since the first youngsters were enrolled in 1959, the Boys Ranch has cared for some 230 boys from all sections of Florida.

Of this total, 120 are still under the care of the Boys Ranch, leaving approximately 110 who have "graduated" and become part of an ever-growing "alumni association."

Where are they now? How are they doing?

They are scattered around the globe. Many have been in military service. They have served their country well — and in several cases they have come home with military decorations for valor in action.

Many have been successful in business. One is a restaurant manager. Others are in the printing business, law enforcement, sales, barbering, dairying and auto repair work.

Three boys are now in college, and others are planning to go to college next fall. Eight are in vocational school.

Boys who were enrolled during the early days of the Ranch are now married and some of them have children of their own — a whole new generation of Ranchers is coming along.

Although they are scattered far and wide, graduates do not lose their ties with the Boys Ranch. They continue to correspond with staff members; they visit the Ranch whenever possible; and quite a few have returned to the Ranch chapel to be married.

The most recent marriage in the chapel joined Mike Edwards and Charmel Ann Huddleston in holy wedlock. Their wedding was held on January 10, 1970, and they are now living in Tampa.

For Boys Ranch officials the most important thing about the growing "alumni association" is that it gives them an opportunity to see the results of their labors.

And, the results have been extremely encouraging. Almost without exception the former Ranchers have become law-abiding, self-supporting citizens with a strong sense of individual responsibility.

This is the "pay off" for all the patient effort and the dedicated concern that staff members have invested in the Ranch program. Without these results, all of their labors and heartaches would be in vain.

Boys Ranch Bequests

Girls Villa Searching for a Site

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Sheriffs Girls Villa, a home for needy and worthy girls similar to the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, has been established as a non-profit corporation and donations are being accepted by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Like the Boys Ranch, Girls Villa will be supported entirely by voluntary contributions. Therefore, the project will move ahead at a pace determined by the flow of funds from donors.

Selection of a suitable site has top priority at the present time. After this has been accomplished, plans will be developed for construction of facilities.

The Girls Villa charter names Sheriff Don Genung, Sheriffs Associ-

ation Executive Director Carl Stauffer, and Sheriff Joe Crevasse, Jr., as temporary officers (see photo above). It also authorizes the Board of Directors of the Sheriffs Association to appoint a Villa Board of Trustees, which will then organize and name officers.

A form is provided below for donors who wish to make contributions to the Boys Ranch or the Girls Villa. To make a contribution in memory of a deceased friend or relative, fill out both the top and bottom portions of the form. Both the Boys Ranch and the Girls Villa have memorial funds.

FACTS

About the Ranch

LOCATION—9 miles north of Live Oak, Florida, on the Suwannee River and about midway between Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

MAILING ADDRESS—P. O. Box 520, Live Oak, Florida 32060.

FOUNDED—in 1957 by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

BEGAN OPERATION—in February, 1959, when the first boys were admitted.

FINANCING—supported entirely by public donations. (They are deductible for income tax purposes.)

SIZE—2,500 acres of farm and timberland.

ENROLLMENT — 125 boys under care. Eventual goal: To care for as many boys as operational funds will permit.

PURPOSE—to provide a good home and a secure future for dependent, neglected and homeless boys who might otherwise drift into a life of delinquency or hopeless futility. The Ranch is not an institution for delinquents.

AGE LIMITS—at admission a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 16. Once he is admitted, the Ranch becomes his home and he remains there through high school and college unless his home situation improves or another good home develops.

ELIGIBILITY—each boy must be of average intelligence and in good physical condition. He must be declared a dependent child by the Juvenile Court and approved by the Sheriff of the county in which he resides.

SOURCE OF BOYS—applicants are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by welfare, school and juvenile court officials.

Ranchers "On the Road"

Twenty-four boys accompanied by staff members took a typical week-end trip on January 31 when they attended the "24-hour endurance race" at Daytona Beach International Speedway as guests of Bill France and the Speedway.

Another group of Ranchers formed a big cheering section for the University of Florida when the Gators played the University of Georgia Bulldogs in a basketball thriller. Florida Coach Tommy Bartlett was host to the 22 boys, many of whom play on Boys Ranch basketball teams.

Six Ranchers were guests at the Jaycee Rodeo in Palmetto, and stayed in private homes. They were treated to carnival rides and horseback riding.

NEW TRUSTEES

The Board of Directors of the Florida Sheriffs Association on January 25 appointed five new members to the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Board of Trustees.

WB4PHT IS "ON THE AIR"

Next the Florida Side-Banders Association, an organization of "ham" radio operators, got into the act by offering their assistance — and now youngsters at the Boys Ranch have organized their own amateur radio club and are getting ready to go on the air. The club has been licensed under the sponsorship of the Side-Banders, and has been assigned call letters WB4PHT. Each weekend Side-Banders from various areas of the state visit the Ranch to help the boys put their equipment together. Some of the equipment was donated earlier, but the real impetus for an amateur radio club came from Mr. Lynch's gift.



COOKOUT WAS HOLIDAY CLIMAX

Thanksgiving was not just "turkey 'n' trimmin's" for youngsters at the Boys Ranch. The weekend holiday observance included a special chapel service led by boys, a banquet, and a hot dog cookout on the banks of the Suwannee River.

TRUSTEES REORGANIZE

The Trustees of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch held a reorganization meeting in St. Augustine, January 26, and re-elected Bay County Sheriff M. J. Daffin, of Panama City, as Chairman; Mr. J. L. McMullen, of Live Oak, as Treasurer; and Alachua County Sheriff Joe Crevasse, of Gainesville, as Secretary.

Marion County Sheriff Doug Willis, of Ocala, was named Chairman of the Board's Executive Committee. The other committee members are former Sheriff Duke McCallister, Live Oak; McMullen; former Sheriff John P. Hall, Green Cove Springs; Columbia Sheriff Harry Spradley, of Lake City; Mr. James Towey, St. Petersburg; and Clay Sheriff Jennings Murree, Green Cove Springs.

THERE ARE ALSO OPPORTUNITIES TO "JUST BE A BOY"

The Boys Ranch offers a full schedule of recreational activities — horseback riding, boating, swimming, fishing, baseball, football, basketball, the whole gamut of sports — but it also gives a boy opportunities to "just be a boy" — to wander carefree across the woods and farmlands, or to day-dream on the banks of the peaceful Suwannee River while contemplating God's handiwork unspoiled by human hands.

Experimental "Halfway House" Passes the Test

TALLAHASSEE — When Walter Scott Criswell House was founded here in January, 1968, it was a bold new approach to the rehabilitation of teenage lawbreakers, and therefore its future was somewhat uncertain.

On paper it sounded great.

The idea was that delinquent boys who were either "halfway in or halfway out" of the state's training schools would be sent to this "halfway house" for special guidance, training and education, so that they could make a better adjustment to community living.

But would it work?

Director Oliver J. Keller, Jr., and other officials of the Florida Division of Youth Services, felt that it would.

The Florida Sheriffs Association was optimistic too, and agreed to make available the dormitory, classroom, lunchroom and other facilities formerly used by the Florida Law Enforcement Academy.

As a further expression of support the Sheriffs Association also agreed to enter into a lease-purchase plan that would enable the Division of Youth Services to eventually buy the property at a figure far below the appraised value.

Staff members were hired, the first boys were admitted in February, 1968, and something new was created under the Florida sun — an intensive treatment program to develop major

changes in delinquent attitudes and behavior.

Favorable results were noted as the project developed, and in 1969 the Division of Youth Services opened a second "halfway house" at Fort Clinch State Park, near Fernandina Beach.

Later in the year the Florida Legislature took a look at the "halfway house" concept, liked what it saw and voted sufficient funds for the Division of Youth Services to purchase the Criswell House property.

The climax came January 29, 1970, when Gov. Claude Kirk handed Sheriffs Association President Dale Carson a check for \$82,000 to give Criswell House the more secure status of a state-owned institution.

This check represented only a little over 50 per cent of the appraised value of \$150,000. But, the Sheriffs Association made up the difference by deducting \$50,000 from the purchase price and crediting the state with the full total of rentals paid while the property was under lease.

"We would not be here today if the Florida Sheriffs Association did not have a strong interest in helping young people," DYS Director Keller said at the property purchasing ceremony.

Success in Saint Augustine

ST. AUGUSTINE — The English, the French, the Spanish, carpetbaggers, rum runners, civil rights marchers and assorted buccaneers have walked the narrow streets of this historic city. In over 400 years of existence, St. Augustine has gallantly survived many types of invasions — but none more pleasant or successful for all concerned than the Annual Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, January 25-27. Sheriffs and guests — some 250 conventioners in all — were welcomed warmly and treated royally by Host Sheriff L. O. Davis and his staff; city and county officials; the St. Augustine Chamber of Commerce; and the staff at the Ponce de Leon Motor Lodge. Afterward they went home agreeing that this was one of the most successful meetings in the 70-year history of the Sheriffs Association. FLORIDA'S GOVERNMENT



CLAUDE ROY KIRK, JR. 36th GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA

The Hon. Claude R. Kirk, Jr., was elected Governor of the State of Florida at the age of 40 on November 8, 1966, and became the State's first Republican Chief Executive in 94 years.

With the adoption of a new state constitution in the November, 1968, General Election, he became Florida's first governor with constitutional authority to succeed himself for a second four-year term.

Governor Kirk was born January 7, 1926, in San Bernardino, California, the first child of Claude R. Kirk, Sr., a native of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and Mrs. Kirk, a native of Athens, Arkansas.

The family moved from California to Oak Park, a Chicago suburban community in 1936; and later to Montgomery, Alabama, where Governor Kirk completed his high school education at Lanier High.

THE SHERIFF'S STAR

He entered the U. S. Marine Corps, was accepted for officer training at Emory and Duke Universities, was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant at 19, and ended a three-year tour of duty in 1946.

The following year he entered the University of Alabama, where he received a law degree in 1949. He also holds an Honorary Doctor of Laws Degree from Rollins College. He married a University of Alabama schoolmate, Miss Sarah Stokes, of Montgomery.

During his college career he taught jiu-jitsu to the Alabama State Patrol and sold insurance. After he was graduated from law school, he moved to Birmingham, Alabama, where he continued selling insurance.

He was recalled to military service during the Korean conflict; and served as an infantry 1st Lieutenant, and as a naval fire control spotter. He completed this tour of duty in 1952 and was awarded the Air Medal.

Upon returning to civilian life in 1952 he was one of the founders and the first President of American Heritage Life Insurance Company, with headquarters in Jacksonville, Florida. He directed this business venture until he moved to a partnership in Hayden, Stone, Inc., Wall Street Investment Bankers.

His first venture in politics came in 1960 when he served as Florida Chairman of the "Democrats for Nixon" campaign. He changed his registration from Democrat to Republican as a result of that campaign, and made his first bid for public office as a candidate for U. S. Senator against Spessard Holland in 1964.

Following the Senatorial campaign, Governor Kirk formed his own firm, Kirk Investment Company, and continued actively in this endeavor until he made his successful bid for the Governorship in 1966.

A member of the Episcopal Church, Governor Kirk helped to found missions at New Berlin and Fort George while living in Jacksonville; and he served them as a Lay Reader until a clergyman was assigned to them.

Governor Kirk was divorced from his first wife in 1966. Four children (two daughters and twin sons) were born to this marriage.

A few weeks after he was inaugurated in 1967, Governor Kirk announced his engagement to Erika Mattfeld, German-born beauty from Brazil; and they were married in West Palm Beach, February 18, 1967.


Their first child, Claudia Mattfeld Kirk, was born August 15, 1968. The Governor also has a stepdaughter, Adriana Mattfeld Dolabella, 8, who is his wife's daughter by a former marriage.

Governor Kirk moved into an active role in national Republican affairs after his election. He played an important part in bringing the Republican National Convention to Florida in August, 1968, and actively supported Richard Nixon for President in the subsequent General Election campaign.

Florida's First
Lt. Governor
 In the 20th Century

The State Constitutions of 1865 and 1868 gave Florida an elected Lieutenant Governor who served as presiding officer of the Senate, but the office was abolished with the adoption of the constitution of 1885.

The new Constitution that became effective on January 7, 1969, again provided for the office of Lieutenant Governor, and the position was immediately filled when Governor Kirk appointed the Hon. Ray C. Osborne, St. Petersburg Attorney and former Republican member of the Florida Legislature.

Lt. Gov. Osborne was born September 7, 1933, in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and was graduated from North Carolina State College in 1955 with a BS Degree. He was commissioned a Lieutenant in the U. S. Army, served in Europe with the Third Armored Division until 1957, returned to college and received his law degree from the University of North Carolina in 1961. That same year he married the former Mary Thom White, of Richmond, Va., and they moved to St. Petersburg, where he entered the practice of law.

He served in the Florida House of Representatives from 1964 through 1967, and in 1968 was an unsuccessful Republican candidate for the Public Service Commission.

Lt. Gov. and Mrs. Osborne have a four-year-old daughter, Molly.

THE HON. TOM ADAMS, Florida's 15th Secretary of State, assumed office on January 3, 1961. Born in Jacksonville, March 11, 1917. Attended public schools, Duval County; the Hill School, Pottstown, Pa. Received A.B. degree in Pre-Law, University of Michigan; attended University of Florida Law School. In 1956, elected to State Senate. After opening session, 1957, voted by legislative colleagues as "Outstanding Freshman Senator."

During 1959 session was designated by fellow lawmakers "Most Valuable Member of Legislature." In 1961, 1963 and 1965, Florida Legislature voted him "Most Effective Administrator of a State Agency"; 1965, as three-time consecutive winner, retired the Allen Morris trophy in this category. THE HON. EARL FAIRCLOTH 30th Attorney General of the State of Florida, was elected in 1964 and was reelected in 1968. He was born September 24, 1920, at Chiefland, Florida, and received his A.B. and LL.B. degrees from the University of Florida, where he was president of the student body in 1949-50; and was named to Florida Blue Key and the Hall of Fame. He served for six years with the U. S. Army Engineers in Central and South

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

This commission is composed of 3 commissioners elected state-wide. It regulates railroads; common carriers; canal companies; telegraph companies; telephone companies; motor vehicle common carriers; privately owned electric, natural gas, water and sewer companies; freight forwarders; radio common carriers; transportation brokers and privately owned toll bridges. Created in 1887 as The Florida Railroad Commission, it became The Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission in 1947 and the name was changed to Florida Public Utilities Commission in 1963. The present title was established by the 1965 Legislature. Each commissioner is elected for a four-year term.

THE HON. WILLIAM T. MAYO was appointed a member of the Florida Public Service Commission by Gov. Farris Bryant in 1964, following the death of Commissioner Wilbur King, and was elected to a full four year term in the 1966 Democratic primary. Prior to his present position he served as a State Road Board member; Florida's Interstate Highway Administrator; and City Commissioner and Mayor of Tallahassee. Other business or

professional experience: automobile dealer. Honors: recognized by Kiwanis Clubs of Tallahassee for "Exceptional Achievement in Public Works." He is a member of the Methodist Church and the Elks Club. He is a former member

Reorganization—"The Big Squeeze"

The Reorganization Act of 1969, required by Florida's 1968 Constitution, completely restructured the executive branch of state government by squeezing almost 200 old boards and agencies into 23 new departments. To answer the question "Who Went Where?" we have cross-indexed the old and the new. In Index A the new departments have been given code numbers. In Index B the old boards and agencies are listed in alphabetical order with code numbers designating the new departments to which they were transferred. The Florida Legislature, composed of the Senate and House of Representatives, is the lawmaking branch of our government. It meets annually in the Capitol, in Tallahassee, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in April. Thus, the next regular session is scheduled to convene on April 7, 1970. The Legislature also holds extraordinary or special sessions. The Governor can call one of these sessions; or the Legislature can call itself into one of these sessions. Senators are elected for four-year terms. Representatives for two years.


