

First in Florida

Sheriffs to Build Training Academy

Construction of Florida's first permanent state-wide law enforcement training academy is scheduled to begin in the near future.

Created by the Florida Sheriffs Association, it will be located at Tallahassee and will provide training for city, county and state enforcement officers at all levels — from rookie to top command.

The academy buildings will be built by the Sheriffs Association. They will be known as the FLORIDA SHERIFFS MEMORIAL TRAINING CENTER, and will be dedicated to all law enforcement officers who have sacrificed their lives in the line of duty.

Operated by Bureau

The school itself will be called FLORIDA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY, and will be operated by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created

by the 1955 Legislature at the request of the Sheriffs Association to provide technical assistance to enforcement agencies throughout the state.

Training is part of the Bureau's business, as set forth in the law, and the academy will provide a means of broadening and increasing the effectiveness of this important activity.

The Bureau has been holding training sessions in Tallahassee, and short "itinerant" schools on the road with great success; but this program has had limitations which the permanent academy will overcome.

Site Selected

Many months of study and planning went into the academy project, and final plans were unanimously approved when the Association held its annual Mid-Winter Conference, in Tampa, January 24, 1963. Negotiations were completed a few weeks later to pur-

THE NEED In the olden days all you needed to be a good law enforcement officer was the ability to think fast and shoot straight — but those days are gone. Today law enforcement is a highly specialized profession and the man who wears a badge needs many unique skills and a good background of technical knowledge.

THE ANSWER That is why the Florida Sheriffs Association, in cooperation with the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, recently founded the FLORIDA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY as a permanent training center for Florida's city, county and state officers - from rookie to top command. The academy will answer the ever-increasing demand for well trained officers and it will also do much to upgrade law enforcement in general throughout the state.

chase a 10-acre building site from the City of Tallahassee near the Tallahassee Municipal Airport.

A simplified floor plan printed with this article shows the initial layout of classroom, eating facilities, a two-story dormitory, administration office and recreation room. This represents an investment of almost \$100,000 and anticipated future expansion could more than double this amount.

The City of Tallahassee has constructed a new pistol range a short distance from the academy site and has granted the use of these excellent facilities for firearms training.

Advisory Council

Courses offered by the academy will cover basic techniques of law enforcement as well as specialized fields such as fingerprint identification, photography, operation of a crime laboratory, traffic control, investigations, first aid, jail management and water safety. There will also be courses for instructors, supervisory personnel and officers at the command level.

The broad basic outlines of the curriculum have been approved by the Sheriffs Association, but other law enforcement agencies and organizations will have an opportunity to make recommendations through an advisory council to fit their special needs.

Gov. Farris Bryant has been asked to appoint this council and to include on it representatives from all law enforcement agencies in the state, as well as from Florida State University and the State Department of Education.

Will Not Compete

Sheriffs Association officials explained that the academy is not intended to replace any existing training program or compete with the university and junior college courses now being offered in Florida.


They pointed out that law enforcement education, as offered at institutions of higher learning, and law enforcement training, as offered at the academy, are two distinct fields and are not competitive.

The tuition cost will be nominal, and will be based upon actual operating expenses. Courses will be scheduled in one-week units of 40 hours each, so that officers can attend for one week, or several weeks, depending upon the time they have available and the scope of their interest.

It has been estimated that there are over 10,000 deputy sheriffs, policemen and other enforcement officers in Florida who are potential academy students.

This means that even though the academy operates at full capacity year-'round, there will always be a waiting list of applicants for enrollment.

President's Message

50th Anniversary Year Brings New Challenges

1963 is our Golden Anniversary year.

The state-wide meeting we are planning to hold in Clearwater this summer will be our 50th Annual Conference, and I feel it is an appropriate time not only to look back upon our first half-century of progress, but also to set our sights upon the challenges that lie ahead.

We owe much to the far-sighted sheriffs who in 1913—in the days when crime was still moving at a "horse and buggy" pace—gathered together for the first Sheriffs association conference.

They discussed mutual problems, made plans for closer cooperative efforts in the war against crime, and laid the groundwork which over the past 50 years has made the Florida Sheriffs Association the outstanding organization of its kind in the nation.

Many Accomplishments

They set the pattern that has made us the pacesetters.

Thanks to their start we can now claim many accomplishments such as our state-wide radio-teletype communications system; our budget-salary system of operating our departments (successor to the antiquated fee system); uniformed deputy sheriffs; standardized markings for patrol cars and many others.

Thanks to our association, we now have The Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created under our sponsorship by the 1955 Legislature to give scientific and technical assistance to all Florida law officers.

And we also have the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, a home for needy and homeless boys which has been hailed



"Instant help-just add your problems."

That's a slogan once suggested by an officer to describe the Florida Sheriffs Bureau's invaluable assistance to law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

It became even more fitting during the past year, too, as a beefed-up field force began to hit the road to give more and faster service in the never-ending war on crime.

This rendering of service—the best and fastest possible—isn't just good manners or a habit on the part of the Bureau. It's the law.

Solely for Assistance

Created under the auspices of the Florida Sheriffs Association, the Bureau became a state agency in 1955. It functions solely to provide top-notch investigative assistance on the request of any Florida Sheriff—especially in crimes of an inter-county nature—and to furnish a wide range of other coordinating, consulting and technical services for all law enforcement groups.

Headed by an administrative board composed of the governor, the attorney general and five sheriffs, the Bureau staff now consists of a director and 68 other employees, with all supervisory personnel on the professional level in their fields.

To Every Nook and Cranny

The hard-hitting and fast-traveling field force con-

sists of twelve agents (there were only four the preceding year) and a mobile crime unit technician. They are dispersed to provide ready availability to every nook and cranny of the state.

These are the men people usually visualize when they think of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau—some of the older agents and their accomplishments are already almost legendary, even though a firm policy prohibits their ever releasing news about their accomplishments.

To Meet Local Needs

But theirs are among many other helps available to Florida law enforcement through the Bureau. Just as valuable are the services of the dedicated people who work in the voluminous records and fingerprint files, provide complete identification services, operate a highly-efficient crime laboratory, man a TWX and teletype network, and publish an amazingly successful crime bulletin that catches criminals by the droves.

Bureau Director Don McLeod, a former sheriff of Marion County, says, "Local law enforcement is the first and most important line of defense against criminal activity. Our sole job is to furnish an effective program of assistance to meet the needs of local agencies."

Perhaps the program doesn't meet them all—yet. But it's on the road.

THE NEWEST TRAVELER

Newest addition to the road fleet of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau is the mobile crime unit, operating from the crime laboratory in Tallahassee.

Where a major crime is involved, a sheriff need only lift the phone to start this modern unit, with a skilled technician at the wheel, rolling toward his county.


Every conceivable piece of equipment needed to process the crime scene scientifically is on board and ready for instant use, starting with ropes, posts and signs to keep onlookers from tracking through the area.

The latest camera equipment is available to record permanently the perishable scene for future use; fingerprinting equipment for every type surface; moulage supplies to make impressions of all kinds; special vacuum cleaners, metal detectors, magnets and sifters to recover even the smallest bits of evidence. Ladders, ropes and unique power tools give access to ordinarily inaccessible spots and assist in the collection of evidence.


If darkness is a problem, a portable generator floods the area with light from five 500-watt floodlights.

The array of containers used to collect and preserve evidence would do credit to a drugstore. When an onthe-scene examination cannot be made, evidence is carefully packed and rushed to the laboratory for full examination.

This traveler is one who is always welcome. He comes only when invited—and badly needed.




Many times it's better, faster and more practical to take the crime laboratory to the evidence, rather than to take the evidence to the laboratory. That's where the Florida Sheriffs Bureau's mobile crime unit — a crime laboratory on wheels—fits into the law enforcement picture.



Assistant Sheriffs Bureau Director Ross Anderson (right) and Technician Charles Miller check equipment which will be carried in the mobile crime unit.





THE EXPERT WITNESS

A Florida Sheriffs Bureau crime laboratory analyst discovers that a piece of concrete block found at the home of a suspect matches a block tied to the body of a murder victim found in the Gulf of Mexico. . .

An identification expert determines that a bloody footprint found at a crime scene is made by the foot of a suspect. . .

A firearms expert ascertains that a particular revolver

fired a fatal bullet into the body of a victim. . .

These are findings of great importance to officers during an investigation. But that is only a small part of

the story of technical assistance.

Every analyst and examiner employed by the Bureau is a real authority in his field. Each time he appears in court he must be prepared to qualify as an expert witness through a searching examination of his education, experience and ability. He must be able then to defend his findings under the most vigorous attack and prove them right "beyond a reasonable doubt."

These are the real measures of the value of individuals in this field. And the Bureau takes justifiable pride in the fact that there has never been a successful challenge to the qualifications or conclusions of a single one of its experts.

Expert testimony—at no cost to the local jurisdiction—is available from these men to back every finding they have made and reported in the course of an investigation.

To assist juries, courtroom presentations are made, when possible, with the aid of enlarged photographs, charts, diagrams and other visual aids. The preparation of these is a tedious and time-consuming task, often taking as much time and effort as the original examination.

During 1962, court appearances were made by one or more examiners in 110 cases throughout the state. A total of 180 man-days went into this activity.

This usage is an excellent index to the regard for and need of the Bureau expert witness.

13 Times Around the World

"Hitting the road" is more than just a phrase to Florida Sheriffs Bureau staff members.

During 1962, total miles travelled in carrying out assignments, filling requests and making court appearances was 328,270—equivalent to 13 trips around the world!

It would have taken one man almost the entire

year, 343 man-days to be exact, to complete this travel.

Field agents travel, mostly in their assigned districts, an average of 2,413 miles per month.

Each spends about 60 hours behind the wheel each month—much of this time outside regular work hours.

FUTURE HOME

While the people at G.H.Q. worry their way through mountains of problems, they occasionally have a relaxing moment or two to dream about their new quarters which should be available by mid-1964. Still on the drafting boards but scheduled to be started shortly, a new building is being designed for occupancy by the Sheriffs Bureau, the Game and Freshwater Fish Commission and the Division of Corrections. The one problem of entirely inadequate quarters will be gone when it is com-pleted. But there will always be plenty of others in the fastpaced business of helping local law enforcement fight crime in Florida.



MEANWHILE . . BACK AT G.H.Q.

General headquarters of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau is located in Tallahassee. Here the "top brass" coordinates the activities of field men and supervises the many headquarters services.

Open weekdays until midnight and all day Saturdays—and, if needed, at any other time—this is a veritable

beehive of activity.

A steadily-mounting workload, coupled with an everpresent shortage of manpower and space, provides ample material for head-scratching by supervisory personnel.

But somehow the work gets done, and it is precise and dependable. Requesting agencies get rapid, "one stop" service in response to their requests for crime and criminal information. The voluminous information submitted by agencies throughout the state is carefully processed and indexed to provide instant availability.

Information Coordinated

Much coordination of information is accomplished through the involved statewide teletype and national TWX networks, linking sheriffs' departments and other agencies throughout the country. Day and night, machines clatter on in the strange but highly-effective war of words against crime.

Here can be found the scientists of the crime laboratory, patiently and precisely conducting their examinations of evidence, often with aid from a gleaming array

of the most modern laboratory instruments.

Vital Results Produced

The availability of the laboratory and the willingness to work of its personnel, produce vital results when most needed—in the early stages of an investigation. What is



The Gas Chromatograph is the latest addition to the Sheriffs Bureau Crime Laboratory's arsenal of scientific instruments. It can be used to analyze many different substances gathered as evidence in criminal investigations, including petroleum products, narcotics, blood and alcohol. In arson investigations it helps officers to determine whether gasoline, kerosene or other inflammable materials were used.

not realized by many laymen is that these results not only implicate wrongdoers, but clear as many or more persons who have come under suspicion through circumstances beyond their control.

It is from headquarters that agents are assigned, on request, to conduct schools and seminars for local law enforcement officers and other persons involved in crime prevention and detection. Constant research assures that instruction includes the most up-to-date techniques and procedures.

It is here, too, that the Sheriffs Crime Bulletin, sent to all Florida law enforcement agencies and many elsewhere, is published two to three times a week. This highly-successful publication is the first and only printed medium for the exchange of criminal information in the state.

If there is any one phase of Florida Sheriffs Bureau activities that seems to stand out over others, it is the meticulous care used in personnel selection. No other state agency matches the personnel standards of the Bureau. Thus, taxpayers are assured that they are getting the most for their money and that the 362 years of combined experience now represented by field agents and key headquarters people is the best experience available.

Only one applicant among hundreds can hope to reach a responsible position. Applications are sifted and sorted with painstaking care to eliminate all but the top candidates who appear to meet the stringent requirements

Final selection for a vacancy is made only after ex-

haustive examination of every scrap of information available concerning final competitors.

Professional and personal background must be about as perfect as can be achieved by humans. Special care is taken to bring to light personality quirks. An applicant having what he thinks to be a "bull session" with a friendly agent might be surprised to find that he is undergoing a carefully planned test of his attitudes.

Once employed, an employee remains on strict probation for one year. But this is not the end of close supervision. For the duration of his employment he will be subject to rigid regulations.

When someone has Bureau experience, all of his experience has been the best.



Nothing could have pleased the boys more than this 66-passenger bus which they acquired during 1962 through the fund raising efforts of Volusia County Sheriff Rodney Thursby and Hillsborough County Sheriff Ed Blackburn, Jr. It takes them to church, to school, and on many enjoyable trips.



The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch celebrated the fifth birthday of its founding and the third year of operation in 1962 with many important gains.

A giant step in expansion of facilities was taken with completion of the \$50,000 Annie Barron Pentland Memorial Residence Cottage which was built by Col. Robert Pentland Jr., Miami accountant and member of the Ranch Board of Trustees, in memory of his mother.

This project increased the capacity from 42 boys to 60 and helped to ease the steadily growing waiting list of

needy youngsters seeking admission.

Other large gifts included a bequest of \$28,441 which was made by Mrs. Agnes A. Torrey, a Polish immigrant from Monticello who died childless in 1960. It was applied to urgently needed expansion of the water system which will be designated as a memorial to Mrs. Torrey and her husband.

A bequest of \$7,000 from the estate of the late Max Weintraub, onetime Miami Beach businessman, was applied to the new Dairy Science Building which will also be a memorial to Mr. Weintraub.

Among items of new equipment acquired during 1962, the most popular with the boys was a 66-passenger bus that replaced an old unsafe "heap of junk" and enabled them to take many educational and recreational trips that would otherwise have been cancelled.

Volumes would be required to detail all of the gains items such as the improved professional caliber of the staff, the broadened vocational program, the better accounting procedures, the high morale of the boys-but the important thing is that the Ranch, although only a youngster among Florida institutions, is continuing to show firm, steady progress.

This was a solemn moment in the life of the Ranch — the unveiling of a plaque by Col. Robert Pentland Jr. dedicating a \$50,000 residence cottage in memory of his mother. "My mother was always interested in children's work the same as I", he commented," and I am sure if she was here today she would approve."

G O A L S for 1963

The big goal for 1963 is a \$75,000 cafetorium which will be the biggest single capital outlay project in the entire history of the Ranch. It will give the boys a permanent dining hall and allow the present temporary dining hall to be converted into a residence cottage which will immediately jump the capacity from 60 to 80 boys.

At meal times the building will be used as a cafeteria; and at other times it will be used as an auditorium complete with a stage and visual education facilities.

Thus it will provide a central meeting place large enough to hold the growing Ranch "family" for years to come; and it will also open up new opportunities to expand the vocational and recreational programs in many ways.

The cafetorium will serve the bodies and minds of


our boys in significant ways.

Equally significant is our second 1963 goal of building a non-denominational chapel to serve the spiritual needs.

For many years generous donors have been making contributions to the Memorial Fund in memory of deceased relatives and friends. This fund will enable us to start the chapel building in 1963 and final completion will depend upon how fast the fund grows in future years.

Religious and moral training is already an important part of the Ranch program, but it is felt that a chapel will serve to place greater emphasis upon these important facets of daily living.

It will also remind visitors that the Ranch is motivated by firm religious and moral principles.





THE ROAD TO A BETTER FUTURE—Boys arriving at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch get their first view of the rolling fields and attractive setting on the banks of the Suwannee River as they travel down this road. We like to think of it as the road that leads to a better future for Florida's needy and homeless boys.





This is one of the residence cottages at the Ranch. It provides living quarters for 20 boys and a married couple employed as "cottage parents."

There's no sweeter sound at the Ranch than the clanging of the old dinner bell. It is a rallying call for vigorous young appetites, bringing boys helter-skelter to the dining hall from the remotest corners of the 737-acre Ranch site. It is also a subtle reminder that the Ranch is a haven of security dedicated to building strong bodies and sound minds.

A LONG WAY TO GO

"What is your 10-20?"


In the radio lingo of law enforcement this means "Where are you?"

The present 10-20 of the Boys Ranch could be described like this—we've come a long way and we still have a long way to go.

Just how far we have to go can be seen by studying the map below based upon a target enrollment of 280 boys. It shows the present facilities and the facilities we plan to build as fast as funds permit.

The present facilities represent an investment of over \$300,000 and future facilities could total in the neighborhood of \$800,000.

ORIGIN AND PURPOSE

There were thousands of homeless and neglected boys in Florida who needed a good home to keep them from drifting into a life of crime or aimless futility. The Florida Sheriffs Association saw this need and—with \$5,000 and a prayer—founded the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch in 1957.

A 737-acre site was selected on the Suwannee River, 11 miles north of Live Oak, and construction of facilities began in 1958.

In February 1959 the first boys were admitted.

Today, at the end of four years of operation, the enrollment stands at 60 boys and the Ranch represents an

investment of approximately \$500,000.

The Ranch has been growing steadily, but the waiting list of boys seeking admission has been growing too. Therefore the Sheriffs of Florida have pledged to continue expanding the facilities as fast as funds will permit. Aiming at an eventual goal of 400 boys.

NOT A REFORM SCHOOL

Planned along lines similar to Father Flanagan's famous Boys' Town, the Ranch is not a "reform school" or a "correctional institution." Instead it provides a wholesome, home-like environment for boys who, through neglect or lack of opportunity, need security, love and discipline so they can develop into good citizens.

To enroll at the Ranch, a boy must be recommended by the sheriff of the county in which he resides. He must be between the ages of 8 and 12½ and he must meet certain mental and physical requirements to assure that he can obtain maximum benefit from the program.

The boys are housed in ranch-type cottages under the supervision of married couples employed as "cottage parents." Their daily routine is a careful balance of work, study and healthful recreation.

RELIGION EMPHASIZED

They attend the public schools in Live Oak so they can have the advantage of being part of a normal school group of their own age and interests. They also receive vocational training both in the public schools and at the Ranch.

Emphasis is placed upon religious training and the boys go to the church of their choice in Live Oak every Sunday. A non-denominational chapel which is expected to be under construction in 1963 will further serve to emphasize the importance of religion.

The basic purpose of the Ranch is to give a boy a good home and a secure future. We hope to accomplish this purpose by providing the finest possible facilities, a sound educational program and a well qualified staff.

Who Pays the Bills?

Visitors to the Ranch frequently ask: "Who paid for all this?'

And we could give them thousands of answers.

We could tell them about the widow who takes a few dollars from her meagre monthly income and sends them to the Ranch with clock-like regularity. . .

... or the school children who save their spending

money for the Ranch.

. . or the state prison inmate who has donated over \$100 from an income that must be pitifully small.

. . . or the childless polish refugee who realized her life long ambition to have many "sons" by leaving a large bequest to the Ranch in her will.

. . . or the grieving parents who have made generous gifts in memory of the gallant son they lost in the flaming

wreckage of a jet fighter plane.

. . . or the college boys-long on good intentions and short on cash—who gave hundreds of hours of valuable labor.

. . or the servicemen in lonely foreign outposts who send money to the boys at the Ranch because it gives them a tangible link with the American way of life they are sacrificing to preserve.

WHO PAYS THE BILLS?

People from all walks of life and all levels of income. People of all ages and faiths. People with one thing in common-a strong desire to help underprivileged boys.

The Ranch is a non-profit venture supported entirely by voluntary contributions of citizens and organizations interested in the welfare of our youth.



Persons who donate \$1,000 or more to the Ranch receive a plaque identifying them as lifetime honorary members of the Florida Sheriffs Association

There are two ways in which financial support is received:

- 1. Honorary Members of the Florida Sheriffs Association pay minimum dues of \$10 a year and this money is used for the benefit of the Ranch and other worthy Association projects. Anyone interested in membership should apply to his Sheriff.
- 2. Many persons make direct donations to the Ranch which are deposited in a trust fund and used exclusively for the Ranch. Contributions of this type—which are deductible for income tax purposes—can be sent to The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, P. O. Box 649, Live Oak, Florida, or presented to any Sheriff.

Some supporters prefer to make contributions to the Memorial Fund in memory of deceased relatives and friends. This interest-bearing fund will finance a pro-

posed non-denominational chapel.

Many persons have included bequests to the Boys Ranch in their wills, designating "The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Fund" as the legatee. Gifts of this type bequests, trusts, annuities, stock certificates, etc. - are placed in an endowment fund administered by a large Florida bank to provide future financial security for the Ranch.

Gifts to the Ranch also cover a wide range of noncash items such as clothing for the boys, recreational equipment, furnishings for the cottages, building ma-

terials, machinery and livestock for the farm.

Civic, service and youth organizations have been very generous in their support. Some have held fish-frys, rodeos, ball games and other events to raise money for the Ranch. Others have pledged to donate a generous sum of money each year.

So, you see, the Ranch receives support from thousands of sources and in an untold variety of ways.

Who paid for it?

The complete answer could fill volumes.



THE THREE BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT


Under its Constitution, the powers of the state government of Florida (like those of the United States and of the other American States) are divided among three branches. This division, known as the doctrine of separation of powers, is based on principles intended to protect the rights of every person.

to protect the rights of every person. The Legislative branch is the law-making branch, setting the main policies of the government through the laws it enacts. The Executive branch, headed by the Governor, sees that the laws are enforced and administers the day to day activities of the government. The Judicial branch, composed of the courts, interprets the laws — makes their meaning clear when it is questioned and, on the basis of their meaning, decides disputes between individuals or between the state and an individual.

Although the Constitution provides for these three separate and distinct branches of government, it provides for checks and balances to prevent any one branch from becoming all-powerful; for instance, the Governor is given power to veto acts of the Legislature and the Courts are given power to declare acts unconstitutional. Similarly, by amending a statute, the Legislature may revise a policy of one of the other branches. The three branches are, therefore, not wholly unconnected but are inter-locked in order to give each a constitutional control over the others.

EXECUTIVE BRANCH

The Florida Constitution vests the supreme executive power of the State in the Governor and provides that he shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed. It also provides that the Governor shall be assisted by the following administrative officers: Secretary of State, Attorney General, Comptroller, Treasurer, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Commissioner of Agriculture. These officers are generally referred to as the cabinet.

The Governor and members of the cabinet are elected in presidential election years for terms of four years. They take office on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in January following their election in November. The Governor may not succeed himself in office but is not limited in the number of terms he may serve so long as they are not consecutive. A Governor who has been elected to serve for an unexpired term may succeed himself for a full term. Cabinet officers may succeed themselves and are not limited in the number of terms they may serve. The salary of the Governor is \$22,500 per year, and cabinet officers receive \$17,500 each.

To be eligible for election to the office of Governor, one must be a qualified voter, must have been a citizen of the United States for ten years, and a

citizen of Florida for five years.

Many boards and commissions are composed of the Governor and several or all members of the cabinet. The cabinet usually meets on Tuesdays of each week to transact business of various boards or commissions. These boards include: The Armory Board, Board of Commissioners of State Institutions, Board of Conservation, Board of Pardons, Budget Commission, Civil Defense Council, Department of Public Safety, Merit System Personnel Board, Purchasing Commission, State Board of Education, State Board of Administration, Sheriff's Bureau, Textbook Fund, and the boards of trustees of the state and county officers and employees, and of the teachers' retirement systems.

Powers of the Governor

The Governor is given the power to appoint all state and county officers when no provision is made for choosing them by popular election. In some cases the Senate is required to approve appointments made by the Governor. For causes set forth in the Constitution he may also suspend officers not liable to impeachment. Suspended officers may be removed, however, only with the consent of the Senate.

The Governor has several duties in connection with the Legislature, some of which have been included in the discussion of the Legislative Branch. He calls the Legislature into session on special occasions, stating the purpose for which it is called. He addresses the Legislature at each regular session, furnishing information on the condition of the State and recommending action he feels the Legislature should take. He may adjourn the Legislature when there is disagreement between the Senate and House as to the time of adjournment. He has the power to veto acts of the Legislature.

Biography of Gov. Farris Bryant

Farris Bryant became Florida's 34th Governor on January 3, 1961. For the Ocala attorney the inauguration marked the fulfillment of a long-standing ambition and the acceptance of a challenge for which he had prepared himself most of his life.

Governor Bryant has sought economy through businesslike operation of all facets of state government. He has directed a major program of reinvestment of state funds which has substantially increased the yield to Floridians from monies held in trust by the state. He spearheaded legislation designed to spur industrial development and for reorganization of Florida's important natural resource conservation program, in which he has a continuing interest.

Road reforms, the stimulation of tourism by effective programs within the tourist industry itself and the development of a quality education system at all scholastic levels are programs which have received vigorous gubernatorial attention.

At his inauguration, Bryant pledged to work to heal the "fires of sectionalism" which had split Florida's urban and rural counties. He has followed through on that promise with efforts to provide state aid on a "when and where needed" basis rather than by adhering to the lines of political geography.

The Governor, a vigorous proponent of the rights of the states, has consistently encouraged local governments to solve problems at the local level, rather than bucking them on to state authorities. Similarly, he has pushed for full acceptance by the state of state-level responsibilities and has called on private enterprise to support state programs rather than adopting an attitude of "let the Federal Government do it."

Gov. Bryant was born July 26, 1914, in Marion County, in Central Florida, near the farm his grandfather established there in 1890. His father, Cecil Bryant, maintained a farm during his son's early years although his primary occupation

was as an accountant. Gov. Bryant was one of three children. His parents and sister are deceased. A brother, Eugene W. Bryant, is a Tampa accountant.

The lure of public service was instilled in Gov. Bryant early in his life. His father was one of the first members of the State Board of Accountancy and an uncle, Ion Farris, served two terms as Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives.

Gov. Bryant attended the public schools of Marion County, went to Emory University in 1931-32, but then returned to Florida where he worked his way through the state university at Gainesville, earning a degree in business administration in 1935. From the University of Florida, Gov. Bryant went to Harvard, where, by waiting on tables in his off hours, he earned a degree in law from the highly regarded Harvard Law School in 1938.

From Harvard, Gov. Bryant returned to Florida to work for the State Comptroller at Tallahassee. There he met Julia Burnett, of Madison, also a native Floridian. They were married in September, 1940, and shortly thereafter moved to Ocala where Gov. Bryant began the practice of law.

The Bryants have three children, Julie, born in 1941, a student at Florida State University; Cecelia, born in 1946; and Adair, born in 1950. Both younger girls attend Tallahassee public schools.

The Bryants are Methodists and regular churchgoers. Gov. Bryant has been active in church affairs in posts ranging from Sunday School teacher to chairman of church building committees and to trusteeship of the Florida Methodist Conference.

He was first elected to public office in 1942, when he won a Marion County (Ocala) seat in the Florida House of Representatives. He resigned, however, to serve in World War II with the U. S. Navy. His three-and-a-half years of service included tours of duty as a gunnery officer in the North Atlantic, the Irish Sea, the Gulf of Mexico, the Mediterranean, the Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean, and he was in charge of an anti-submarine unit on Guam. Almost all of his service was under combat conditions, during which he rose in rank from Ensign to Lieutenant.

On return to civilian life, Gov. Bryant was elected in 1946 for the first of five legislative terms which ended with his decision to seek the governorship in 1956. He was never opposed for the House during this period.

He served as Speaker of the 1953 House of Representatives, stressing then, as now, the need for economy at all levels of government. During his legislative career he was generally identified with programs in these areas: Constitutional revision; improved school system (he participated in development of Florida's Minimum Foundation Program); curbs on illegal gambling; flood control (he participated in development of Central and South Florida Flood Control District); junior college development; creation of a full-length Florida Turnpike (he was active in legislation which resulted in the first leg of this turnpike, now in operation); livestock fencing; tax collection consolidation and central purchasing.

Gov. Bryant was an unsuccessful candidate for Governor in 1956, and in 1960 topped a 10-man field in the Democratic primaries and won election handily in the face of the most determined Republican drive for state-wide offices of recent times in the November general election which saw Florida go Republican in the presidential contest.

Gov. Bryant has been active in many projects and received many awards during his career. He is the only Floridian ever to be twice named by the state's Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of Florida's five outstanding young men. He won the Chamber's "Gold Key Distinguished Service Award" in 1948 and 1950. In 1949, '51 and '55 he was named the "Most Outstanding Member of the Florida House of Representatives" by the state's newspaper editors and political writ-

ers. In each of his sessions, he received one of the Allen Morris Cracker Politics Awards voted by members of the Legislature themselves. In 1947, he was "Most Outstanding First Termer." In 1949, '51 and '53, he was "Most Valuable Member of the House;" and in 1955, he was named "Most Valuable Member of the Legislature." Gov. Bryant was also honored for his ability as a debater and is known as one of the most articulate men in Florida public life. His reliance upon television and his ability to communicate through it have been given major credit in assuring his election success.

Gov. Bryant was active in the creation of, and participated in, the Legislative Council, a research arm for the Legislature. He participated in development of the Florida Citizenship Clearing House, an organization designed to encourage students to take an interest in, and play an active role in their government. He is co-author of "Government and Politics in Florida," a text used in political science classes at the state's universities. Gov. Bryant has twice been part of Florida's representation at Democratic National Conventions. In 1952, he served as chairman of the Florida Delegation and in 1960 was an alternate delegate. In non-governmental fields, he has participated in a wide range of civic and charitable activities ranging from community projects to the state-wide chairmanship of drives to raise funds to combat cancer, mental illness, polio and muscular dystrophy.

Following his election, Gov. Bryant withdrew from his Ocala law firm to be free of any encumbrances to the fulfillment of his duties as Governor. He has repeatedly said he has no political ambitions beyond his current service in the State's highest office.

Executive Branch

CABINET MEMBERS

POWERS AND DUTIES — In addition to his cabinet duties, each member of the cabinet has primary duties as head of a division of State Government.

Secretary of State

He keeps records of the official acts of the Legislature and Executive Departments. He is custodian of the Great Seal of the State and he has charge of the Capitol building and grounds. He issues charters and certificates of incorporation to corporations, and certificates of election to successful candidates for public office.



THE HON, TOM ADAMS, Florida's 15th Secretary of State, assumed office on January 3, 1961. He was born in Jacksonville, March 11, 1917. He attended public schools in Duval County, the Hill School at Pottstown, Pennsylvania, and received an AB Degree in pre-law at the University of Michigan. Later he attended the University of Florida Law School. Prior to entering public life, he was successfully engaged in private business, including property management, dairy farming, timber, real estate and insurance. In 1956, he was elected to the State Senate and

was voted by his colleagues as the "Outstanding Freshman Senator." Following the 1959 sesthe "Outstanding Freshman Senator." Following the 1959 session, he was voted the "Most Valuable Member of Legislature." In 1961, his first year as Secretary of State, he was named "Most Effective Administrator of a State Agency." For leadership in higher education, he was awarded an honorary degree as Doctor of Space Education. He is listed in Marquis' "Who's Who" and is a member of the Rotary Club, Navy League, Newcomen Society, Gold Key at Florida State University, Phi Delta Theta social fraternity and Alpha Kappa Psi business fraternity. A Baptist, he is married and has three daughters.

Attorney General

He is the legal advisor to the Governor and other officers in the Executive Department, represents the State in legal proceedings, and is responsible for the continuous revision of the Florida Statutes. He is the constitutional reporter of the Supreme Court.



THE HON. RICHARD WILLIAM ERVIN, 28th Attorney General of ERVIN, 28th Attorney General of the State of Florida, took office on January 4, 1949, and is serving his fourth term. Mr. Ervin was born January 26, 1905, at Carra-belle, Florida; and was educated in the public schools of Citrus, DeSoto, Leon, Orange and Marion Counties. He was graduated from Counties. He was graduated from the College of Law at the University of Florida in 1928 and practiced law in Pinellas, Lee and Putnam Counties. His career of public service includes positions as attorney for the State Road Department, Assistant Attorney General, Secretary of the Florida Railroad Commission, attorney for

Overseas Road and Toll Bridge District and attorney for the Department of Public Safety. In 1951 he was selected by the Junior Chamber of Commerce as the outstanding public official in the state. He is a past president of the National Association of Attorneys General, and previously served as vice president and chairman of the Southern Regional Group of Attorneys General. He is married to the former Frances Baker, of Jacksonville, and they have two children.

Comptroller

He examines requests for the payment of salaries and other obligations of the State and issues warrants to pay them. He is the state bank examiner and also collects a major portion of the taxes levied by the State.



THE HON. RAY EDGAR GREEN, 24th Comptroller of the State of Florida, was appointed Comptroller on April 12, 1955. He was elected to a full four-year term in 1956 and re-elected in 1960. Mr. Green was born on September 1, 1899, in Manatee County, Florida, and his family moved to Pinellas County when he was a small child. After graduating a small child. After graduating from Clearwater High School he attended Max Morris School of Pharmacy, at Macon, Georgia, and for 21 years was actively engaged in the drug business at Clearwater. He served as Mayor of the City of Clearwater from 1935 to 1938; and as Clerk of Circuit Court in Pinellas County from 1938 to 1949. He became Assistant State Comptroller in 1949; and succeeded Clarence M.

Gay as Comptroller in 1955. He is a past president of the Association of Southeastern Tax Administrators and is a National Director of the National Association of Tax Administrators. Members of the 1959 Legislature voted him "The Most Effective Administrator of a State Agency". He is married to the former Reba Crow of West Palm Beach and they have two children. He is active in the Methodist Church.

Treasurer

He keeps the funds and other securities belonging to the State, keeps the general accounts and as Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshall, he enforces laws relating to insurance and fire prevention.



THE HON, JOHN EDWIN LARSON, 16th Treasurer of the State of Florida, took office on January 3, 1941. He is serving his sixth consecutive term. He was born on June 27, 1900, at Brookston, Pennsylvania. Educated at Allegheny College (A.B.) and University of Florida (LL.B.). He served as principal of Keystone Heights High School, Mayor of Keystone Heights and County Commissioner of Clay County. He was a member of the House of Representatives from Clay County in 1929 and 1931, a member of the Florida Senate in 1933 and served as collector of Internal Revenue for Florida, 1933-39. He is a past

Florida, 1933-39. He is a past President of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners; National Association of State Auditors, Comptrollers and Treasurers; and National Association of Securities Administrators. He is Past Grand Master of Masons in Florida; 33rd degree Honorary Member of Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonry; Red Cross of Constantine, and Shrine. He is married to the former Clara Bussard, of Keystone Heights, and they have three daughters. He is a member of the Methodist Church.

Superintendent of Public Instruction

He is the chief administrative officer over the public school system. He is also executive secretary of the State Board of Education. This board is the rule-making body for the public schools, and it has supervision over the Board of Control, which governs the State's institutions of higher learning.



THE HON. THOMAS DAVID BAILEY, 14th Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State of Florida, took office on January 4, 1949, and is serving his fourth term. He was born on October 31, 1897, at Lugoff, South Carolina. He served as President of Thomas Industrial Institute at DeFuniak Springs; supervising principal of schools at DeFuniak Springs, Ocala and Tampa, and Secretary of Public Relations of the Florida Education Association. He was president of the Council of Chief State School Officers of the U.S. and a member of the Legislative Commission of the National Education Association and Education Association and Education Association of the Legislative Commission of the National Education Association and Education Association Association and Education Association A

ation, He is currently serving as a member of the Advisory Committee of New Education Media (NDEA Title VII) spon-

sored by the U.S. Dept. of HEW, Office of Education. He was awarded the Certificate of Merit by the Florida Jaycees in 1960 and an Award of Merit by the National Association of Public School Educators in 1960 for his contribution to adult education. He was selected to serve as state chairman of the 1962 and 1963 New March of Dimes. He is married and has two daughters. He was educated in the public schools of South Carolina and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Wofford College; a Master of Arts degree from the University of Florida; and an Honorary LL.D. degree from Florida Southern.

Commissioner of Agriculture

He has duties related to the protection of the agricultural industry of the State and inspects foods and drugs, weights and measures, and gasoline to see that the required standards are maintained. He keeps all records pertaining to public lands.



THE HON. DOYLE CONNER, Florida's 7th Commissioner of Agriculture, was born in Starke, Florida, December 17, 1928; was graduated from Bradford High School in 1947; received a BS Degree in Agriculture from the University of Florida in 1952. While at the University he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives from Bradford County, at 21, and served five terms. In the 1957 session he was Speaker of the House, at 28, Florida's youngest. Honors include National President of Future Farmers of America, 1948-49; selection by the State Jaycees in 1950 as one of the five outstand-

ing men in Florida; and selection as "One of the five outstanding Young Men in the Nation" by the U.S. Jaycees in 1961. At 23 he became Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the House, a post he held for two terms. During his first year as Commissioner he was elected to the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, representing the 13 Southern States. He is presently serving as secretary of the Southern Association of Commissioners of Agriculture. He is a member of the Baptist Church and the following organizations: Florida Farm Bureau, Florida Cattlemen's Association, Masons, Shrine, Elks, Moose, Jaycees and civic luncheon groups. He is married to the former Johnnie Bennett of Marianna, and they have three children.

Greater Responsibilities

Florida's fast growth places an ever-increasing burden of responsibility on cabinet members. Census Bureau estimates indicate that Florida has moved ahead of Massachusetts to take NINTH PLACE in the U. S. population race. A population increase of 508,000 since 1960, or 10.3 per cent makes Florida the fastest growing state in the southeast, the fastest growing among the larger states and well ahead of the national average of 3.6 per cent. Nevada led growth rate with 17.3 per cent, Arizona was second with 15.9 per cent and Wyoming was third with 10.7 per cent. All others were under 10 per cent. California with 8 per cent lacked 432,000 people to replace New York as the most populous state. The National Planning Association predicts that Florida's July 1 population of 5,459,000 will increase to 8.2 million by 1978. The state is gaining 4,096 new residents per week, including 2,836 from other states and 1,260 in the number of births over deaths.

He was a member of the Florida Senate in 1945. In 1946 he was elected as a member of the Florida Rail-road and Public Utilities Com-mission and has been re-elected for four additional terms. He

resides at Zolfo Springs and is a cattleman and citrus grower. He was president of the Hardee County Citrus Growers Association, president of the Aardee County Citrus Growers Association, president of the Zolfo Springs Strawberry and Tomato Growers Association and is presently serving as a Director of Florida Christian College at Tampa. He is a past President of State Association of County Commissioners. He is married and is a member of the Church of Christ.



THE HON. JERRY W. CARTER was born in Barbour County, Alabama, August 11, 1887. He was a salesman and store manager for the Singer Sewing Machine Company, coming to Florida in 1907, where he continued his connection with the company. In 1917, he was appointed Florida Hotel Commissioner by Governor Sidney Catts and served for three terms. In 1924 he was elected Delegate to the Democratic National Convention and has continued active participation in Democratic Party affairs, serving also as Na-tional Democratic Committeeman and as first Chairman of the Florida Democratic Historical

Foundation. In 1934 he was elected as a member of the Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission and has been re-elected for eight additional terms. He is a member of the Masons, Elks, Odd Fellows, Woodmen of the World, United Commercial Traveler, Moose, Modern Praetorian, Junior Order of American Mechanics and Townsend Plan. In 1936 he was a candidate for Governor. He is married and has seven sons.



EDWIN L. MASON, was born in Portsmouth, Virginia, in 1916 and moved to Miami, Florida, in May, 1925. He attended the public schools of Dade County and was graduated from Edison High School. He received an LLB degree from Stetson University, De-Land, Florida, in August, 1940, and practiced law in Miami, with U.S. Commissioner Roger Edward Davis. He served with the U.S. Navy in the European and Paci-fic Theatres of War and received the Bronze Star Medal. He ended his tour of active duty in 1946, as a Lieutenant, and returned to practicing law in Miami. In the

latter part of 1946 he was appointed an assistant to the U.S. Attorney, in Miami, and resigned this post to successfully run for Justice of the Peace. He served in that capacity for two terms. He was elected County Commissioner in Dade County and served from January, 1957, until November 25, 1959, when he was appointed to the Florida Railroad and Public Utilities Commission. In 1960, he was

elected for a four-year term.

FLORIDA'S "LITTLE CABINET"

The full-time administrative heads of several large state agencies, who are responsible to the Governor, are often referred to as his "little cabinet." Through these administrators, the Governor carries out many of his campaign goals, political objectives and policies of government. These agencies are: the State Road Department, which constructs and maintains the major highways and bridges of the State; the Motor Vehicle Commission, which issues motor vehicle licenses and title registrations; the Industrial Commission, which administers unemployment compensation, workmen's compensation, laws relating to child labor and other matters affecting labor and industry; the Hotel and Restaurant Commission. which is responsible for the inspection and regulation of hotels, motor courts, apartment houses, rooming houses and restaurants in the State; the Conservation Department,* which enforces the laws relating to management of the State's salt water fishing re-

* The Director of the State Board of Conservation is a member of the "Little Cabinet" by tradition, although he is responsible to the Governor and Cabinet. sources; the Beverage Department, which collects cigarette and alcoholic beverage taxes, and enforces the laws relating to the sale of alcoholic beverages; and the Racing Commission, which regulates horse and dog racing in Florida.

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

Composition, Organization, and Powers

Florida has a legislature composed of two houses—the Senate and the House of Representatives. Each house is the sole judge of the qualification and election of its own members and has the power to choose its own officers and to make its own rules of procedure. All sessions of the House of Representatives are open to the public; and sessions of the Senate are open to the public except during executive sessions, when all outsiders are cleared from the chamber and the doors are closed. Either house of the Legislature may initiate legislation on any subject.

A reapportionment act passed during a special session of the Legislature, February 1, 1963, provided for a 43-member Senate and a 112-member House of Representatives.

However, provision was made for members of the Legislature whose offices were abolished or combined by the reapportionment formula to serve out their terms. This means that there will be 45 Senators and 125 Representatives during the regular 1963 session of the Legislature.

The House will drop to 112 members in the 1965 session. The Senate will drop to 44 members in the 1965 session and to 43 in the 1967 session.

Personnel

The President of the Senate presides over the Senate, and the Speaker of the House presides over the House of Representatives. The President Pro Tempore and the Speaker Pro Tempore preside when requested to do so by the President or Speaker, or when either is unable to serve. These presiding officers are elected by their respective bodies and serve for two years. In addition to the presiding officers, each house elects other officers from outside its membership. The most important of these are the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House. They are responsible for keeping clear and accurate records of the proceedings of the body each serves. A Sergeant-at-Arms is elected by each house to assist the presiding officer in maintaining order and in making available necessary equipment, supplies, and services. Each house also selects pages, reading clerks, and a chaplain. In addition to these, attaches are appointed to perform the necessary clerical work.

Compensation

Members of the Legislature receive \$1,200 per year in monthly installments of \$100 each. While the

Legislature is in a regular, special or extraordinary session, members also receive a daily allowance of \$15 and travel expenses of 10¢ per mile for one round trip each week to and from home to Tallahassec.

Election and Terms of Office

The Constitution provides that members of the Legislature be elected at the general election in November of even-numbered years preceding the April meeting of the regular session of the Legislature. Candidates are nominated in party primary elections held prior to the general elections. Members of the Legislature must be qualified electors (21 years of age and a citizen of the United States who has lived in Florida at least one year and has lived in his county at least six months) in the counties or districts from which they are chosen.

Each Senator serves a term of four years, and each House member is elected to serve a term of two years. Half of the members of the Senate and all of the House are elected every two years. Terms of office begin at the end of election day.

Legislative Sessions

Regular sessions of the Legislature begin on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in April of odd-numbered years and are limited to sixty days. A regular session may, by a three-fifths vote of the membership of both houses, be extended for no more than a total of thirty days. The extra days do not have to run without a break, and recesses may be taken by the joint action of both houses. However, a regular session may not be extended beyond the first day of September of the same year. During an extended session, no new legislation may be introduced except by a two-thirds vote of the members of the House seeking its introduction.

The Governor may call extra sessions of not more than twenty days each. When the Governor calls a meeting of the Legislature for a special session, the Legislature may consider no other business than that for which it is called or such other matters as the Governor may call to its attention, except by

a two-thirds vote of each house.

The Legislature may call itself into an extra session for all purposes as if convened in regular session but limited to thirty days in the following manner: twenty percent of its members must file written certificates with the Secretary of State stating that conditions warrant an extra session; when the Secretary of State receives the required number of certificates, it is his duty to poll the members of the Legislature; when he receives an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the members of both houses, he notifies each member by registered mail of the day and hour on which the extra session will convene; the extra session must convene sometime between fourteen and twenty-one days after the Secretary of State has mailed the notices.

Rules

Each session, each house of the Legislature adopts rules of procedure which are printed in booklet form with committee assignments made by the presiding officers.

Committees

Standing committees which serve during a session are listed according to subject matter in the rules of each house. Members are appointed by the presiding officers of their respective houses on the basis of special knowledge and interest in the sub-

ject matter of a particular committee.

Most committees exist for the purpose of considering bills referred to them and recommending action to the house of which they are a part. A committee's work usually begins after a bill has been introduced and referred to it by the presiding officer. Persons desiring to speak for or against matters being considered by a committee may do so in hearings which are open to the public. When a committee completes its work, the bill is returned to the house from which it was referred. House committees may recommend the passage or rejection of a bill, passage of a substitute bill. Senate committees may make any of these recommendations, or they may return a bill without a recommendation. A bill with an unfavorable report cannot be considered further by either house unless two-thirds of the members present vote to consider it.

Committees also exist for the purpose of managing expenditures and employing necessary personnel, and some committees are designed merely to supervise the progress of legislation to make sure the rules are followed. The rules committees are designed to aid the presiding officers in the interpretation and enforcement of rules; and also, late in the session, they determine the order in which legislation shall be considered. There are also special committees which receive assignments not normally handled by standing committees. An important type of special committee is the conference committee. When the two houses cannot agree on a matter, the presiding officer of each appoints an equal number of members to serve as a joint committee for the purpose of trying to adjust the differences. This joint committee is called a conference committee. These special committees are terminated when they complete their assignments.

Interim committees are those which make legislative studies during the period between legislative

sessions.

Legislative Council

The Legislative Council is a permanent committee of the Legislature; it is composed of eighteen members, — the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, and a senator and a representative from each of Florida's eight old congressional districts (new districts were formed in 1961). Through subcommittees composed partly of Council members and partly of other legislators, studies are conducted on selected topics such as appropriations and auditing, education, finance and taxation, governmental organization, health and welfare, judiciary and constitutional revision, roads, state institutions, and traffic safety and insurance.

The Legislative Council employs and supervises a permanent research staff known as the Legislative Reference Bureau; these employees are selected for their research ability and their knowledge in the fields of law, political science, public administration, economics, and governmental accounting. During a session the Bureau assists the entire Legislature and its committees; between sessions, it performs the research for the Council's study committees; and assists interim legislative committees or commissions created by the Legislature. It is also available to answer the request of any legislator for factual information on legislative problems. The Bureau maintains a reference library on legislative subjects as a reservoir of information for all these functions.

The results of the Bureau's research and of the Council's studies and recommendations are made available to each member of the Legislature so that members can act on the subjects with more informa-

tion than they otherwise might have.

Journals and Calendars

Each house publishes a daily journal and a daily calendar. These are placed on members' desks before the session begins each legislative day. The Chief Clerk prepares the information which appears in the journal and calendar of the House, and the Secretary of the Senate prepares the information appearing in the journal and calendar of the Senate.

Senate and House Journals are similar in form, each giving an account of all actions taken during a

legislative day.

The calendars of the Senate and House show what business is scheduled for consideration each day. Bills are placed on the calendar in the order that reports are received from committees. In the House, a bill receiving a favorable committee report may be placed ahead of its regular order on the calendar by a two-thirds vote of the members of the Committee The Legislative Branch

on Rules and Calendar. In the Senate, a bill may be placed ahead of its regular order by a motion from the floor and a majority vote of all members present.

Forms of Legislative Expression

Legislative proposals may be in the form of bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, resolutions and memorials.

A bill is a proposed law. A joint resolution is a proposal to amend the State Constitution. A concurrent resolution is a proposal expressing the opinion or will of both houses of the Legislature, whereas a resolution expresses the opinion or will of only one house. A memorial is a petition or prayer, addressed to the President of the United States, the Congress or some official agency of the United States Government, requesting action or expressing the Legislature's view-point respecting a matter which is within the jurisdiction of the official or agency addressed; it is adopted by both houses in the same manner as that of a concurrent resolution.

Bills

There are several kinds of bills. A general bill contains proposed legislation which would affect the entire state. A local bill contains proposals which would affect a particular county or town named in the bill. A local bill must either be advertised in the area to be affected, prior to its introduction in the Legislature, or it must contain a provision whereby the voters in the area will be allowed to vote to accept or reject the measure should it be passed by the Legislature. A general bill of local application is designed to affect areas within a particular population bracket or other descriptions stated in the bill. The criteria used are usually chosen so that only one particular area is included in the effect of the bill. Bill Drafting Service

The Attorney General provides a bill drafting service which is available to members of the Legislature and other public officials on request. Over half of the bills introduced during recent sessions have been prepared in the office of the Attorney General.


How a Bill Becomes a Law (See Chart)

The Introduction. Bills may be introduced by Senators or members of the House of Representatives in their respective houses of the Legislature. One or more members of either house may introduce a bill. When a bill has been prepared in its proper form, it is delivered to the Secretary of the Senate, if the bill is to be introduced in the Senate, or the Chief Clerk of the House, if the bill is to be introduced in the House. It is checked for compliance with the constitution and the rules of the house in which introduction is sought, and it is given a number.

First Reading. If the bill meets the requirements, it is read for the first time by title only. The presiding officer then refers it to the committee he deems appropriate. The original bill is then delivered to the chairman or Secretary of that committee.

A second copy of the bill is given to the bill clerk, and it is kept by him for the use of the members. The third copy is given to the Sergeant-at-Arms, who makes it available for the use of the general public. The fourth copy is made available to the news reporters, and the sixth copy goes to the other house for its files.

The fifth copy is for the Legislative Reference Bureau's use in preparing the daily legislative service. The Bureau summarizes all bills introduced each day and places a copy of the summaries on each member's desk before the next day's meeting of the Legislature, and it also keeps a record of the progress being made by each bill; this record is known as the progress docket.

The committee of the Legislature to whom the bill was referred meets and considers the bill along with any others which may have been referred to it. When a decision is reached as to what further action should be taken on the bill, the committee prepares a report containing its recommendation. A House committee report is filed with the Chief Clerk of the House, and a Senate committee report is filed with the Secretary

of the Senate.

Second Reading. If the report of the committee is favorable, the bill is placed on the calendar of bills on second reading. When the bill is reached on the calendar, it is the responsibility of the member who introduced it to make the proper motions for its disposition. The second reading of the bill generally is by title only, and it is at this time that it may be changed or amended. If the bill successfully passes the second reading stage, it is sent to the Committee on Engrossing to be examined for correctness as to outward form and to have amendments, if any properly placed in it.

Third Reading. The bill is then returned to the Secretary of the Senate, if it is a Senate Bill, or the

Chief Clerk of the House, if it is a House Bill, to be placed on the calendar for its third reading. The constitutional requirement that the third reading of the bill be in full is usually observed summarily, by an abbreviated reading, because of the large number of bills which must be considered within the short period of two months.

Passage of a Bill. After a bill has had its third reading, it is explained and discussed on the floor. The members then vote upon the question of the passage of the bill. When a bill is passed, the action becomes final unless taken up again under the rule which provides for reconsideration. A bill may be reconsidered only once. If the bill passes, it is then sent to the other house of the Legislature, where it must be processed through each of the above steps, beginning with the first reading on through to final passage on third reading.

A Bill Becomes An Act. If the bill is passed by the other house, it is returned to the house in which it was originally introduced. It is then enrolled, placed in permanent lasting form on special paper, and signed by the President and Secretary of the Senate and by the Speaker and Chief Clerk of the House. The bill is then an Act and is sent to the Governor for his approval or disapproval.

Review by the Governor. Before an act can become a law, it must be presented to the Governor. If the Governor approves the act, he signs it and files it with the Secretary of State, and it becomes a law. If he does not sign or disapprove the act within five days, it becomes a law without his approval. When the Legislature adjourns, an act becomes a law if the Governor takes no action on it within twenty days after the date of final adjournment.

Governor's Veto. If the Governor disapproves, he writes out his objections and returns the act with his objections to the house of the Legislature in which it originated. This disapproval constitutes an exercise of the Governor's veto power. If both houses then pass the measure by a two-thirds vote of the members present, it becomes a law, nothwithstanding the veto. After the final adjournment of the Legislature, the Governor has twenty days in which to veto a pending act by filing it with his objections in the office of the Secretary of State. This officer must present the vetoed act to the Legislature at its next session. If both houses then pass the measure by a two-thirds vote of the members present, it becomes a law.

Appropriations Bills

The most important bill passed during each regular session of the Legislature is the spending or appropriations bill. This bill sets forth the amounts of state funds which will be made available to support the various state agencies during the two-year period beginning July 1 after each regular session of the Legislature.

The procedure for preparing appropriations bills for introduction in the Legislature is quite different from that for other bills. Several months before the Legislature meets, the various agencies of State Government submit to the State Budget Director their requests for funds. The Budget Director compiles these requests and submits them to the Budget Commission, which is composed of the highest ranking executive officers of the State — the Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney General, Treasurer, Comptroller, Commissioner of Agriculture, and the Super-

intendent of Public Instruction. After holding public hearings, the Budget Commission decides what amounts it will recommend that the Legislature make available to the agencies. The requests of the agencies and the recommendations of the Budget Commission are printed and bound in report form and submitted to the Legislature.

Members of the appropriations committees of both the House and Senate meet with the Budget Commission for its hearings. After these hearings, the appropriations committees divide into four independent subcommittees. Each subcommittee is assigned a group of state institutions and agencies. It visits and confers with the officials of these organizations on their respective budgets and reports its findings to the main committee. This procedure enables the committees to secure information regarding agency

requests before the session convenes.

When the Legislature meets, the appropriations committees hold hearings of their own to secure additional information when necessary. Each of the committees introduces an appropriations bill in its respective house of the Legislature. The bills take the same course as other general bills, but it is usually more difficult to get both houses to agree on all items in the bills, and a conference committee is usually appointed to resolve the differences. This conference committee is normally composed of the chairman and two other members of the appropriations committee of each house.

Although the Governor's approval or veto of any other act applies to the whole act, he may veto any distinct item or items in an appropriations act without affecting the rest of the bill. The Legislature may override an item veto in the same manner as was described for the veto of any other act.

Impeachments

The Governor, members of the Cabinet, Justices of the Supreme Court and Judges of the District Courts of Appeal and Circuit Courts may be removed from office only by impeachment. The House of Representatives has the sole power to impeach; that is, to bring charges against any of the above-mentioned officers for a misdemeanor in office. The Senate tries all impeachments, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court presides at all trials except in the trial of the Chief Justice, when the Governor is required to preside. A two-thirds vote of the House of Representatives is required to impeach, and a twothirds vote of the Senate is required to convict the accused. If convicted the officer is removed from office and disqualified to hold any office of honor, trust or profit in the State Government. However, an officer may also be indicted, tried and punished, according to law, for the offense for which he was impeached.

Enforcement of Authority

Either house of the Legislature has the power to compel witnesses to appear at any investigation held

by it or by any of its committees.

During a session of the Legislature, either house may punish by fine or imprisonment any nonmember who has been guilty of disorderly or contemptuous conduct in its presence or who has refused to obey its lawful summons. Imprisonment, however, cannot extend beyond the final adjournment of the session. Each house may punish its own members for disorderly conduct and may, by a two-thirds vote, expel a member.





SENATE OFFICIALS

SECRETARY OF THE SENATE



HON. ROBERT W. DAVIS, JR., came to Tallahassee to observe the Legislature in 1927 and has stayed on as an official of the Senate ever since. During the 1927 session of the Legislature he was Assistant Bill Secretary in the Senate and he had an opportunity to understudy Capt. Charles A. Finley, of Graceville, who had held the position of Secretary of the Senate for 32 years.

Capt. Finley retired from active duty after the 1927 session, becoming Secretary Emeritus, and

Mr. Davis became his successor. Since that time he has surpassed Capt. Finley's record of tenure.

Born in Tampa and raised in Gainesville, Mr. Davis was destined for a career in law from childhood. After receiving his law degree he practiced in his father's law office in Gainesville until the 1927 trip to Tallahassee shifted his interests from the dispensing to the producing end of the law business.

Mr. Davis, who is married to the former Carol Bridges, of Tallahassee, and has one son, Robert W. Davis III, became Florida's first full-time Secretary of the Senate following the 1959 session. Prior to that time the Secretary's position was a part-time job. Hs was employed between sessions for 18 years as Chief Deputy Insurance Commissioner and took a leave of absence during each session of the Legislature.

One distinction he has as Secretary of the Senate is that he is the only person, other than a senator, permitted to attend executive sessions of the Senate. He records the proceedings of these closed meetings but they are not a matter of public record and are kept under seal.

He also is responsible for recording all other proceedings of the Senate, is custodian of legislative bills and is responsible for general supervision of all clerical work. His is a highly responsible position and he deserves commendation for his long and distinguished service.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS



HON, LeROY ADKISON has many important duties as Sergeant-at-Arms, but he is best known for his ability to make the walls of the old capitol reverberate when he sounds off the Senate call to arms—"roll call."

He takes a lot of kidding about his booming voice—such as offers of a job as hog caller—but the jokers come and go while he stays on session after session. In fact, his leather lungs have become something of a senate tradition and there has never been

any serious suggestion to replace them with bell or buzzer.

LeRoy (no one ever calls him Mr. Adkison) will chalk up his seventh regular session as sergeant-at-arms this year, and his 14th regular session as a senate employee. He is also rounding out some 35 years as a state worker, having worked at the Motor Vehicle Commission and the State Treasurer's Department.

A native of Tallahassee, he is married to the former Ruth Stephenson, of Tampa, and they have a son and a daughter.

His duties as sergeant-at-arms include supervision of pages, attaches, mailing room and janitorial services. He also equips the various senate offices and purchases supplies.

His job is important to the successful operation of the senate and the energetic, dependable manner in which he does it is deserving of high praise.

FLORIDA FACTS

Florida was discovered by Juan Ponce de Leon, of Spain, who landed near St. Augustine between April 2 and 8, 1513. He named the land "Pascua Florida" because it was during the time of the "Feast of Flowers."

The first permanent settlement in the United States was made by Pedro Menendez de Aviles of Spain at St. Augus-tine in 1565, almost 100 years before the first English colony was founded at Jamestown, Virginia.

The first Catholic mass in the United

States was said in St. Augustine in 1565, when Father Lopez de Mendoza Graiales gave the mass at the Mission of Nombre de Dios.

The first Protestant colony in America was established at Fort Caroline by the French in 1563.

Famous Spanish explorers of Florida include Panfilo de Narvaez, who landed near Tampa Bay in 1528 and explored into Northwest Florida; Hernando de Soto, who landed in the Tampa area in 1539 and explored to the Mississippi River; and Don Tristan de Luna, who landed at Pensacola in 1559 and tried to establish a colony.

Florida has been under five flags: Spanish, 1513-1719, 1723-1763, 1783-1821; English, 1763-1783, French (Pen-sacola), 1719-1723; United States, 1821-1861,1865 to present; Confeder-

ate, 1861-1865.
Florida was purchased from Spain and became a Territory of the United States on March 30, 1822.

Florida became the 27th state on June 25, 1845.


Florida became the third Southern state to withdraw from the Union on January 11, 1861. Tallahassee was the only Confederate capital east of the Mississippi to escape occupation during the War Between the States.

The first state constitution was adopted at Port St. Joe on February 1, 1838. The present constitution was adopted in January 1887.

The JUDICIAL BRANCH

The Judicial Branch of Florida's Government is made up of the courts of the State. There are several kinds of courts in the counties of Florida; however the State pays the salaries of the Supreme Court Justices, of Judges of the District Court of Appeals, and of Circuit Judges, while other judges are paid by the counties in which their courts are located. The kind of case which a court in a particular county may try depends upon the kinds of courts existing in that county and the types of cases over which each has been given jurisdiction by law.

The Supreme Court is the highest court in Florida. This court does not try cases but reviews important cases which have been tried in the lower courts and appealed to it. Similarly, less important cases are appealed to the District Courts of Appeal (at Talla-

hassee, Lakeland and Miami).

Among other duties, the courts pass on the constitutionality of laws enacted by the Legislature, when questions arise requiring such rulings. When, in the opinion of the court, a law in question has not met all the requirements set forth in the Constitution or is not in keeping with its provisions, the law is declared unconstitutional. The Supreme Court of Florida is the final authority on such questions unless issues of federal law are also raised.

The Supreme Court consists of seven justices elected for terms of six years. Every two years the justices select from among their number the Chief Justice, who is the presiding officer of the Court. The

terms of justices are staggered so that at least two must be elected every two years. A justice must be at least twenty-five years of age and an attorney at law. Justices receive an annual salary of \$17,500.

There are three District Courts of Appeal. The First Appellate District, with four judges, covers north Florida from Escambia to Duval Counties and as far south as Volusia and Marion Counties.

The Second Appellate District, with five judges, covers all of central and south Florida except Dade and Monroe Counties.

The Third Appellate District, with five judges, includes only Dade and Monroe Counties.

Most appeals from trial courts and from County Judges' Courts in probate and guardianship matters are taken to the District Courts of Appeal.


There are sixteen judicial circuits in Florida, consisting of from one to eight counties each, and a circuit judge for each 50,000 population or major part thereof. The Circuit Courts try the most important cases.

There is in each county a county judge who supervises the estates of deceased persons, minors and incompetents and presides over trial courts of limited jurisdiction in his county. In addition, there are special courts that exist in some counties; such as juvenile courts, courts of record for criminal or civil matters, or both, small claims courts, and others.

The procedure in all courts and the temporary assignment of judges are governed by rules adopted by

the Supreme Court.



throughout the nation as a new approach to crime prevention.

These things we can look upon with pride and a sense of worthwhile accomplishment, but at the same time we must also look to the challenges of the future. We must continue to keep pace with our fast-changing times, and with fast-moving criminals who, night and day, threaten the lives and security of the citizens we are sworn to protect.

Legislative Program

Of immediate concern to all of us are the bills which we propose to sponsor in the 1963 Legislature to foster better law enforcement. Briefly, they would:

- (1) Create "high hazard" retirement provisions to meet the special needs of Sheriffs and their "front line" deputies.
- (2) Tighten county jail security by making the smuggling of weapons and other contraband into jails a serious offense.
- (3) Increase the Florida Statute of Limitations from two years to five years—to make it the same as the Federal statute.
- (4) Prohibit obscene or indecent telephone calls by anonymous callers.
- (5) Set uniform fees for serving civil papers to increase the efficiency of the Sheriffs' bookkeeping systems.
- (6) Require polygraph (lie detector) examiners to be licensed.
- (7) Amend the concealed weapons law to include tear gas projectors.
- (8) Amend the law prohibiting felons from possessing firearms so that it will include persons convicted in other states.

(9) Streamline and improve the procedure for disposing of confiscated, abandoned or contraband property.

This is a sound legislative program, which will help us to operate our departments more efficiently and upgrade law enforcement. It will also put "teeth" in weak criminal laws and plug loopholes that have allowed the guilty to go free.

Our challenge of the moment is the Florida Law Enforcement Academy which is being established in Tallahassee as a permanent training center for all Florida law enforcement officers, from rookie to top command.

Will Upgrade Enforcement

This project, which is discussed in detail elsewhere in this publication, will require our best efforts if it is to become a success. However, it will be well worth everything we put into it because I cannot think of anything which can do more to upgrade Florida law enforcement and brighten the future of our great state.

Truly we have made astounding progress, and the opportunities which lie ahead can be even greater than those of the past.

I am confident that the Sheriffs of Florida will be equal to these opportunities, and I consider it both a privilege and an honor to serve them as president of the Florida Sheriffs Association during the year 1963.

Working together I am sure we can make this year a landmark in the history of our organization, and in the annals of Florida law enforcement.



DON'T MAKE IMPROPER TURNS

Always get ready for your turn at least a half block ahead. If you are not in proper lane for turning, signal your intentions and move into proper lane as quickly as possible. Slow down, signaling your intentions to other drivers with flashing brake lights or manual signals. Give the correct signal for direction you wish to turn, continuing to signal until your turn is safely begun. Watch carefully so that your maneuver will not interfere with motor or pedestrian traffic ahead of you or to the left and right in the time it will take you to turn. Don't insist on your right of way.



Improper turning is one of the principal causes of accidents. Improper turning means not signaling your intentions; giving wrong signals; turning into approaching traffic without stopping; turning left from the outside lane; turning right from the inside lane; and many other violations of safe driving rules and common sense.

Theoretically, when turning to the right, you have the right of way over an approaching driver who signals for a left turn into the same lane you want to turn. Before you begin your turn, be sure the approaching driver knows your intentions and is willing for you to turn first. Many drivers were within their rights but are just as dead as if they had been wrong.

Speed is number one in *fatal* accidents and number two in *all* accidents. And it doesn't always mean exceeding the stated limit.
