President's Goals for 1964:

- * A serious, intensive study of the roots of crime.*
- * Greater respect for the law.*
- * Closer cooperation among law enforcement agencies.*

To serve as president of the Florida Sheriffs Association is a great honor, but when I was installed on February 7, 1964, I felt somewhat like the young man of my acquaintance who had ambitions to be an archaeologist.

"What bothers me," this young man told his father, "is that practically all of the great archaeological treasures have been dug up, and there isn't much left for me to dig."

I can understand this youth's predicament, because Florida's Sheriffs have left me in pretty much the same spot. In the past decade they have accomplished so many fine things that, as I search for goals for my administration, there doesn't seem to be "much left for me to dig."

In the 12 years since I was first elected Sheriff of Hillsborough County I have had the privilege of working with my fellow sheriffs to:

★ Create the FLORIDA SHERIFFS BOYS RANCH, a home for needy and worthy boys located on the Suwannee River, near Live Oak, Florida.

★ Create the FLORIDA SHERIFFS BUREAU, a state agency which makes the latest scientific techniques of crime detection available to all Sheriffs.

★ Strengthen CRIMINAL LAWS in Florida to upgrade law enforcement and plug loopholes which formerly allowed the guilty to go free.

★ Modernize Sheriffs' departments by putting DEPUTIES IN UNIFORM, and by adopting an OFFICIAL BADGE and standardized MARKING FOR PATROL CARS.

★ Develop a BUDGET-SALARY SYSTEM of operating Sheriffs' Departments to replace the antiquated fee system and its evils.

★ Create a state-wide radio and teletype COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK to increase the speed and efficiency of law enforcement.

★ Distribute PUBLICATIONS which elevate the prestige of law enforcement officers, catch "wanted" criminals and warn the public regarding various types of crimes.

★ Foster WATER SAFETY and TRAFFIC SAFETY programs.

★ Create the FLORIDA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY, a statewide training school for state, county and municipal officers— from rookie to top command.

I am proud that I have had an opportunity to participate in these various accomplishments which have brought the Florida Sheriffs Association to the pinnacle of its half-century of progress.

At the same time I am aware that, as the current president of the Association, I have a responsibility not only to continue the momentum of progress that has already been generated by my predecessors, but also to try to elevate our fine organization to even higher levels of attainment.

I therefore propose that the Sheriffs of Florida broaden their activities in the field of crime prevention by fostering a comprehensive study of crime's roots and causes—that we seek the advice and counsel of educators, the clergy, learned jurists, criminologists and other law enforcement officials in order to develop for Florida a pilot crime prevention program and measure its effectiveness.

Since the vast majority of crimes result from a basic contempt for the law, I further propose that we do everything possible to combat this. All of us in law enforcement have a bright opportunity and a solemn responsibility to do this by conducting ourselves in a way that will earn continuing admiration and respect. We owe this to our profession and to the citizens whose security we are sworn to protect—particularly the youngsters whose future conduct and attitudes will be strongly influenced by their first contact with a sheriff, deputy sheriff, highway patrolman or city policeman.

And, finally, I propose that we encourage closer cooperation between law enforcement agencies at all levels of government in order to produce maximum efficiency in the never-ending fight against crime.

These goals are lofty and great, but if we would ever "Do justly, love mercy" and walk humbly before our God, the race for the goal line would soon be won.

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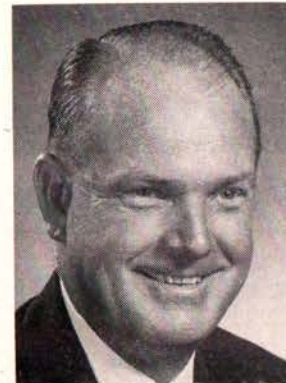

Florida Law Enforcement Academy, the newest brain-child of the Florida Sheriffs Association, became a complete reality on February 9, 1964, when a class of 33 city, county and state enforcement officers enrolled for the first two-week course of intense, highly technical training.

Three days later, on February 12, Gov. Farris Bryant stood before an audience representing the entire hierarchy of city, county, state and federal law enforcement to solemnly dedicate the new facility to the memory of Florida lawmen who have lost their lives in the line of duty—"to those who, because they believed in justice, were willing to die."

The Governor went on to describe the Academy as "part of the fabric of democracy," and he added that it will help to strengthen our democracy by increasing public respect for the law and the men who enforce it.

"From this small beginning," he concluded, "many great things will come."

He then presented certificates to the following members of his Advisory Council for Law Enforcement Training who were responsible for planning the Academy curriculum: Berwin Williams, special agent of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau and Director of Training for the Academy; Louie Wainwright, Director of the State Division of Corrections; E. W. Pellicer, Sheriff of Putnam County; Reeves Bowen, Assistant Attorney General; David Swindell, Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission; P. W. Sapp, Florida Narcotics Bureau; Lt. B. J. Barnett, Capt. Roger Collar and Capt. Jay Hall of the Florida Highway Patrol; Norman Pomrenke, Florida State University; Cecil Sewell, State Beverage Department; Jim Ball, State Division of Corrections; and Elmer Emrich, Governor's staff.

Other speakers introduced by Leon County Sheriff W. P. (Bill) Joyce, the master of ceremonies, included:

Sheriff of Hillsborough County, who described education as "the hope of the Republic . . . and truly the hope of law enforcement."

Berwin Williams and Norman Pomrenke who described the dedication as a proud moment in their lives.

Roma Trulock, special agent for the Florida Sheriffs Bureau and also the president of the Florida Peace Officers Association, who offered the full cooperation of the peace officers' organization.

Driscoll Oglesby, chief investigator for the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Department and president of the first Academy class, who declared he and his classmates realize "that to become effective we must become professionals."

Secretary of State Tom Adams, who found it gratifying that "every branch of law enforcement in Florida is here in support of this program".

Thomas D. Bailey, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, who pledged the full support of his department.

Doyle Conner, State Commissioner of Agriculture, who saw the Academy as an important step "in making Florida first in the nation as far as local and state law enforcement are concerned."

Richard W. Ervin, Justice of the Florida Supreme Court and former Attorney General, who said that the Academy, created through the voluntary efforts of the Florida Sheriffs Association, "will mean more protection for the public and greater respect for law enforcement."

The audience gave a standing ovation to Don McLeod, Director of the Academy and also Director of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, in recognition of the key role he played in creation of the Academy.

First of its kind in Florida—and possibly in the nation—the Academy will answer the ever-increasing demand for well trained officers at every level of law enforcement, and it will do much to upgrade the caliber of enforcement throughout the state.

Facilities, which are located on a 10-acre site at the Tallahassee Municipal Airport, were built and equipped by the Florida Sheriffs Association at a cost of approximately \$115,000. They include a dormitory, office, classroom, and a combination dining room and recreation room.

The school will be operated year 'round by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency created by the 1955 legislature at the request of the Sheriffs Association. Training is part of the Bureau's business, as set forth in the law, and the Academy will provide a means of broadening and increasing the effectiveness of this important activity.

Although students will be paying only about \$15-a-day tuition (which will include room and meals) they will receive training that will be exceptionally high in both quantity and quality.

A "no fooling around" schedule of daytime classes and night assignments will keep them busy from dawn to "lights

out", and the instructors will be recognized experts in their fields.

Some 30 instructors, representing almost 400 years of combined practical experience in law enforcement, were signed up for the first two-week session of In-Service Training.

They were drawn from The FBI, The Florida Highway Patrol, Florida's Courts, The Florida Sheriffs Bureau, The State Beverage Department, police departments, Sheriffs' departments, The National Auto Theft Bureau, The National Board of Fire Underwriters, The State Bureau of Narcotics, The U.S. Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization, The Internal Revenue Service (Intelligence Division), The State Attorney General's Office, the legal profession and the medical profession.

It is doubtful that an array of law enforcement "know how" of this caliber has ever been offered in Florida before—and this is only one course out of 20 which are now on the Academy curriculum.

Only duly constituted law enforcement officers employed on a full-time basis by a city, county, state or federal law enforcement agency are eligible to attend the Academy. They must also be residents of Florida.

Imagine that you are a sheriff and you have a spectacular murder to solve.

You pick up the telephone, dial a supermarket that deals in all kinds of crime problems, describe your case and order technical assistance necessary to help you solve it.

Sounds fantastic doesn't it?

But, actually it isn't as far from reality as you might suppose.

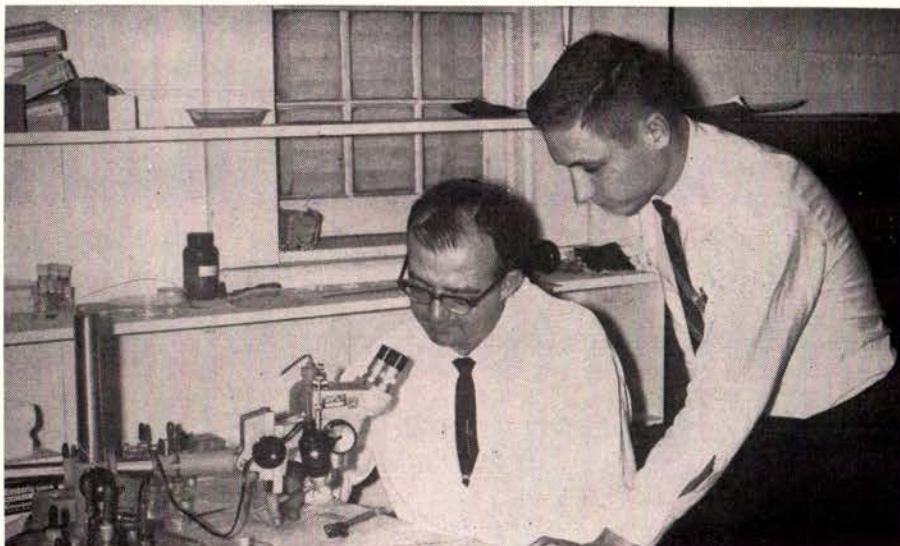
When sheriffs need technical assistance of any kind, they simply pick up the telephone and call the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, a state agency whose creation they sponsored in 1955.

And the Bureau can truthfully be described as a crime fighting "supermarket" because it has something for everyone — an arsenal of technical "know-how" that gives more muscle to

all levels of law enforcement (city, county and state) in Florida.

Bureau Director Don McLeod calls this "a balanced program of assistance"—and Duval County Sheriff Dale Carson, a member of the Bureau's administrative board, gave some illustrations in an address before the Mid-Winter Conference of the Florida Sheriffs Association, in Jacksonville, February 6, 1964.

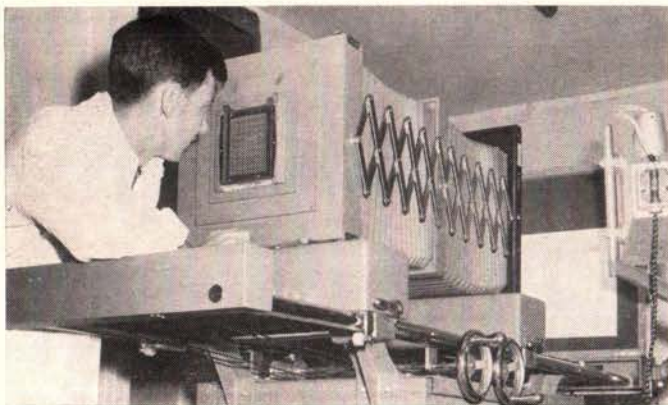
"First," said Carson, "let's look at the special agents in the field. There are seven of these around the state on call for major investigations, and four who operate as lie detector examiners. (This, incidentally, is not nearly enough to keep up with demand.) These men do far more than just answer requests from sheriffs. They are very essential field representatives—the "sales force," so to speak—who increase the effectiveness of the technical services at bureau headquarters in Tallahassee by showing us exactly how to make the best use of them.

"Two more men comprise the training and research staff and when not presenting training courses around the state, which show our own people the latest and most effective enforcement and investigative techniques, these men stay busy developing other more effective approaches to law enforcement. They will very shortly have the vastly increased responsibility of being on the permanent staff of the Florida Law Enforcement Academy—another vital program sponsored and underwritten by the Florida Sheriffs Association.

"Behind these 13 men, and increasing their effectiveness—just as they do that of the other services—are a number of units which supply assistance of a quality equal to any in the country. These units, in turn, mesh together, and quite often one or more field men will be involved in a single case using every single facility at bureau headquarters.

"Available at headquarters is a professionally-staffed and excellently-equipped crime laboratory, offering a wide range of services — ranging from microanalysis, document and firearms examinations to chemical analyses and examinations of physical properties. To those counties within range, there is even a mobile crime unit that, on request, will move in and process an entire crime scene. At the lab, too, are the statewide fraudulent check files which have managed to put a serious crimp in the operations of bad check artists in Florida.

"Then, at headquarters, there is the big central records and identification section. Here with one letter, one teletype, or one telephone call, you can often find out volumes of information about a criminal. In this section, and working closely with the crime lab, is the fingerprint laboratory, devoted to developing and identifying latent fingerprints from crime scenes. This is a part of the fingerprint unit which also maintains vast files of submitted fingerprints, including those of all state prison inmates. These fingerprints files serve, among other things, to provide positive identification of persons we are investigating.

"Tied in closely with the records service is a small intelligence unit which devotes all its time to keeping track of major criminals and reporting their activities, throughout the state, through the cooperation of local agencies.

"Then, of course, there is the highly-successful Sheriff's Crime Bulletin, published at headquarters two or three times a week, which broadcasts throughout Florida and elsewhere all the information concerning wanted criminals, missing persons, major crimes and other information we all need. This publication gathers information from all the units in the bureau.

"The Florida Sheriffs Bureau is a carefully designed, tightly-knit organization that knows exactly what it is doing. It offers every sheriff and enforcement administrator in the state—and through them, all of our citizens—services of tremendous value. Yet it in no way infringes on our jurisdictions or on the basic right of local self-government."

Tom Boen, Special Agent in Charge of Records and Identification, supervises clerks at Master Alphabetical Index, the unique key to the bureau's voluminous criminal records. It facilitates the rapid, one-stop records service available to all law enforcement agencies.

The Charley E. Johns state office building, now under construction and slated for completion in September. The FSB will occupy most of two floors. Outstanding feature of Bureau's new quarters will be the crime laboratory accommodations, as modern as any in the country. A U-shaped hall through the center of the laboratory, glassed above waist-high, will allow tours by student groups and other interested persons without interfering with technicians' work.

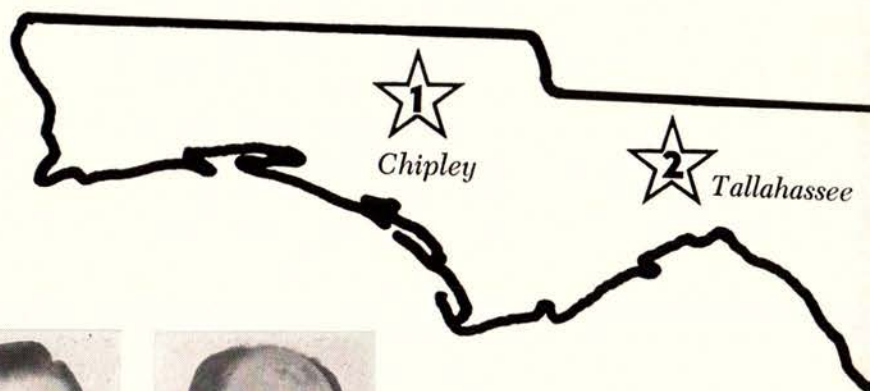

"A Tom Thumb Agency Doing a Gargantuan Job"

Florida newspapers on January 26, 1964, printed the following Associated Press story about the Florida Sheriffs Bureau by Donald North.

TALLAHASSEE—There's a Florida counterpart of England's famed Scotland Yard that works just as quietly behind the scenes rounding up law-breakers.

The Florida Sheriffs Bureau, with 11 agents investigating virtually every crime of consequence in a state of better than five million people, is a Tom Thumb agency doing a gargantuan job.

The celebrated Chillingworth case, in which a circuit judge and his wife disappeared into the sea off Palm Beach in 1955, was solved almost single-handedly by the bureau.

COUNTERFEITERS EXPOSED

More recently, the bureau exposed a ring counterfeiting state warrants, arresting 14 persons and succeeding, thus far in the case, in convicting three, who got prison sentences.

The attempted slaughter of a Boni-

fay family of three was solved with the arrest of a depraved ex-convict for rape and murder and his subsequent execution.

And the killer of Gilchrist County Sheriff Mark Read was brought swiftly to justice in 1956.

The bureau enters a case only when called by the sheriff of a county where a crime has been committed that is serious enough to warrant an all-out investigation. The law sets this out plainly.

Since the creation of the bureau by the 1955 Legislature, the "consulting" system has worked out fine. Relations between sheriffs and the bureau are satin-smooth.

A FORMER SHERIFF

The director of the bureau is a former sheriff himself, Don McLeod of Marion county, whom Gov. LeRoy Collins tapped to head the then newest of state agencies.

McLeod brought in Ross Anderson, head of the criminal division of the Hillsborough county sheriff's department, to be his No. 1 assistant.

The Legislature since 1957 has doubled the bureau's beginning budget to \$1 million for two operating years.

The staff backing up the agents in the field now numbers 67—including firearms, fingerprint and document experts, chemists and microanalysts.

McLeod points out that none of the bureau's agents has the power to make an arrest unless the sheriff in whose county the agent is working specifically says so.

'MAKE NO ARRESTS'

"We make no arrests, we issue no press releases, we seek no publicity," says McLeod. "That way we stay in the background where we work more efficiently."

Many times a tough case is solved by the bureau without anyone's knowing its agents helped except the highest ranking local police authorities.

Seven agents conduct general investigations, four are polygraph (lie detector) examiners with special training in that area. All of the agents and most staff members are experienced investigators.

The bureau is ruled by a board made up of the governor, attorney general and five sheriffs appointed by the governor.

On the current board are Sheriffs Dave Starr of Orange county, Dale

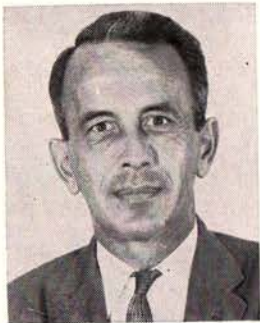

Key Members of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau Staff

HON. DON McLEOD, DIRECTOR OF THE FLORIDA SHERIFFS BUREAU, was born in Atlanta, Georgia, June 26, 1902 and attended the public schools of South Carolina. A veteran of World War II, he entered the U. S. Army in 1941 and was discharged as a Warrant Officer in 1946. He is married and a member of the Methodist Church. Prior to his long and distinguished career in law enforcement he was in the restaurant business and the wholesale grocery business. He served as a Justice of the Peace in Marion County (County Seat, Ocala, Florida) from 1937 to 1941; and as Chief Deputy Sheriff of Marion County from 1946 until he was appointed Sheriff on April 20, 1951. He was elected Sheriff of Marion County in 1952, and resigned in 1955 to become the first Director of the newly-created Florida Sheriffs Bureau. A professional enforcement officer and a graduate of the FBI National Academy, McLeod steered the Bureau through its trying early days and up to its present position of wide acclaim. During the same period he has also served as Secretary of the Florida Sheriffs Association; and Secretary of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch Board of Trustees. He has played an active role in all of the Sheriffs Association's various projects during the past decade and recently accepted new responsibilities as Director of the Florida Law Enforcement Academy. In recognition of his distinguished service, the Sheriffs of Florida, in 1963, elected him a Lifetime Member of the Florida Sheriffs Association. He served as president of the Florida Chapter of the FBI National Academy Associates in 1954.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, fingerprints serve as irrefutable and universally accepted means of identification, and an accepted and vital tool in the development of sound employment screening practices, and

WHEREAS, Florida, by administrative order, has, since mid-1962, had in effect a fingerprint requirement for all employees, and

WHEREAS, under this policy the Florida Sheriffs Bureau has been assigned the important role of processing, filing, and reporting on the fingerprint records provided by employing agencies of the State, and serving as Florida's Official Liaison with the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the checking of state employee fingerprints against the Federal file, and

WHEREAS, as a result of the effective procedures devised and implemented by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau, more than fifty thousand state employees have been fingerprinted, with a review of the fingerprints thus obtained revealing that approximately ten percent of these employees had enforcement agency records, many not serious in nature and already known to the employing entity, and

WHEREAS, by virtue of the successful procedures adopted by the Florida Sheriffs Bureau in the establishment of the Florida Fingerprint Program, its extension and formalization by act of the Legislature has become feasible and desirable,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Florida Legislative Investigation Committee, pursuant to a motion properly made and adopted at its public meeting in Tallahassee, Florida, January 29, 1964, expresses through this Resolution its gratitude and commendation to the

FLORIDA SHERIFFS BUREAU

for its effective and efficient service to the government and citizens of Florida and for its enhancement of the employment security program of state government.

Boys Ranch Herd

"Beefed up" Again

By Sunshine Sale

The top-priced bull and 14 heifers auctioned during the annual Sunshine Sale of polled Herefords, at A.D. Davis' Santa Fe River Ranch, near Alachua, were donated by generous bidders to the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

As in years past, this will give another "shot in the arm" to the steadily improving Boys Ranch herd and to the vocational agriculture program which is such an important factor at the Ranch.

The 1964 sale at the Davis Ranch, one of the big events of the cattle world, was held on January 18, and produced a large financial windfall for the Ranch in addition to the fine array of beefy blue-bloods.

The top-priced heifer brought \$7,100 paid by Cecil Webb, President of Dixie Lily Milling Co., Williston, after Davis announced that proceeds would go into a memorial fund for the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Swick, former owners of Copeland Sausage Co. who lost their lives in Jacksonville's tragic Hotel Roosevelt fire, December 28, 1963.

The Swick family, aware that the fire victims had been generous supporters of the Boys Ranch and lifetime honorary members of the Florida Sheriffs Association, later decided to apply the heifer proceeds to a new \$90,000 cafeteria which is being built at the Boys Ranch as a memorial to the Swicks.

Swicks Honored

JACKSONVILLE — The Board of Directors of the Florida Sheriffs Association, at a meeting here February 5, unanimously adopted a memorial resolution honoring the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Swick Sr., of Alachua, and describing them as "great friends" of the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

Mr. and Mrs. Swick lost their lives in the Hotel Roosevelt fire, in Jacksonville, December 28, 1963.

The resolution was presented to members of their family by Alachua County Sheriff Joe Crevasse Jr., of Gainesville, shortly after it was passed.

It pointed out that the Swicks had been "long-time ardent sponsors" of the Boys Ranch, and Lifetime Honorary Members of the Florida Sheriffs Association.

Webb, who is a trustee of the Boys Ranch, was the top buyer at the auction and contributed five heifers to the Boys Ranch. He was also joint purchaser—with Mr. and Mrs. Joe Diaz, of Tampa, and James Towey, of St. Petersburg—of the top-priced bull which was donated to the Boys Ranch. The bull brought \$5,000.

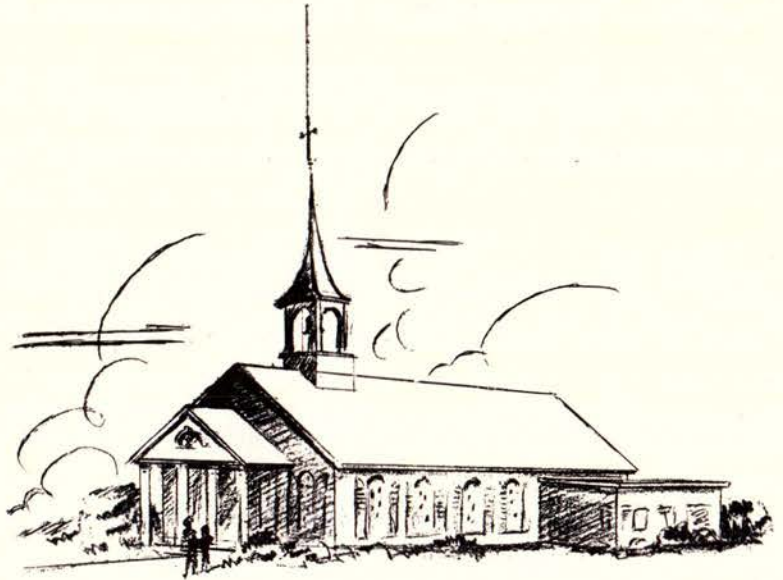
Mrs. Diaz is a trustee of the Boys Ranch and she and her husband have supported it in many ways.

Other generous donors who gave cattle to the Ranch were: Copeland Sausage Co.; Lykes Bros. Ranch, of Tampa; Sol Goldman, of Jacksonville; Central Packing Co., Center Hill; Dirr Farms, Hialeah; Frosty Morn Meat Co., Quincy; and Watkins Youth Foundation, Thomasville, Ga.

The 15 animals donated to the Boys Ranch this year brought approximately \$33,000; compared to 14 heifers sold at \$47,100 in 1963; and 16 fine animals sold at over \$20,000 in 1962.

Aside from their value in cash and prestige, the Herefords will produce many fine calves that the boys at the ranch will raise and groom for the show ring. This will teach them many basic business principles they can use in future careers; and also provide a source of wholesome recreation. Experience has shown that many of the boys get just as much kick out of raising and showing blue ribbon cattle as they do out of baseball, fishing, swimming and other sports.

Big Building Boom at Boys Ranch

The problem of financing a \$200,000 building program was solved when a "blue ribbon" committee raised \$90,000 in 15 minutes.

1964 will be known as the year of the big building boom at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

Before the year is over Ranch Trustees expect to complete a \$90,000 cafetorium; a \$50,000 all-faiths chapel with library wing, and a large \$10,000 cattle and horse barn.

They are also talking of constructing a \$50,000 residence cottage which will bring the total outlay close to \$200,000.

What will this mean in terms of building a brighter future for Florida's needy and neglected boys?

Completion of the cafetorium, a combination cafeteria and auditorium, will do two important things. It will allow the Ranch staff to broaden the present program of recreational and educational activities by providing much-needed space for group functions; and it will also allow the trustees to turn the present temporary dining hall into a residence cottage for 20 boys.

If the proposed new residence cottage is also built this year, space will be provided for 20 additional boys, and the enrollment capacity will jump from 60 to 100.

This will mean a new life and a secure future for some 40 underprivileged boys who want to get into the

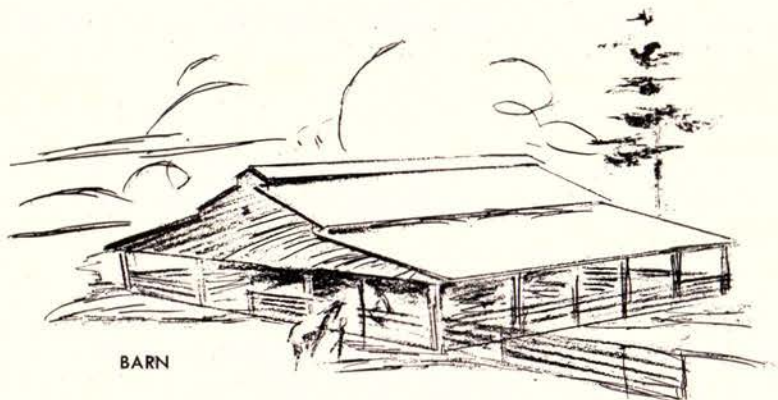
Ranch but can't because it is filled to capacity. Most of these boys have applied for admission and are on the waiting list already. Others want to apply but have not bothered to because they know there is no room for them.

The all-faiths memorial chapel — financed primarily with funds donated in memory of deceased friends and relatives—will enrich the spiritual lives of the boys and serve to symbolize for them the important position religion holds in the Ranch program. The library wing in the rear of the chapel building will be an important factor in the education of the boys.

The cattle barn will enhance the agricultural program which in many ways is the "backbone of the Ranch." It is this program that provides the boys with healthful work, enjoyable recreation and a basic sense of values.

All of these projects were on the drawing board in 1963, but funds were not available to put them under construction. Then, as the year's end drew near, a series of unrelated events broke the financial log jam.

From America's "Moon Port," at Cape Kennedy, came the initial "blast off."



BARN

Preparations down there for the coming "moon shot" wiped out the community of North Canaveral and put its chamber of commerce out of business.

This left chamber members with a large "kitty" in the bank and nothing to spend it on. "Let's give the money to worthy charities," someone suggested, and when this proposal was approved \$12,000 was earmarked for equipping the all-faiths chapel at the Boys Ranch.

This generous windfall, plus the memorial funds that had been building up for years, gave the Ranch Trustees the green light to go ahead with actual construction of the chapel.

As the year 1964 began, word reached the Ranch from Alachua County Sheriff Joe Crevasse, Jr., that financing had been arranged for the proposed cattle barn. A major portion of the money had been raised through horse shows sponsored by the Gainesville Roping Club and Sheriff Crevasse's Junior Deputy Sheriffs; and the balance had been pledged by Gainesville donors.

This left only one project—the cafetorium—unfinanced, and the price tag of \$90,000 made it the biggest financial obstacle the trustees had ever encountered.

Baker County Sheriff Ed Yarbrough, chairman of the trustees thought he knew the answer.

Yarbrough, early in 1963, had appointed a committee of trustees to raise the necessary funds for the cafetorium. On the committee were men of means who were widely known for their business success and philanthropic

gifts—men like A. D. Davis, chain store executive; Cecil Webb, milling magnate; Syde Deeb, big time building contractor; and Col. Bob Pentland, banker, sportsman and financier.

It was a blue ribbon committee but it had one fault. The members were busy men with many commitments and travel itineraries that sometimes kept them out of the state for long periods of time.

Setting a date for a meeting was almost impossible.

"If we can only get them together, I believe we can swing this thing," said Yarbrough, after several unsuccessful tries. Joe Diaz, husband of Ranch Trustee Frances Diaz, agreed with Yarbrough and launched a one-man campaign under the title of executive director of the committee.

After many phone calls and a few false starts he finally set up a meeting for February 5, 1964, at the Hotel George Washington, in Jacksonville.

This was the opening date of the Florida Sheriffs Association's Annual Mid-Winter Conference, also held at the Hotel George Washington, and the family of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Swick was on hand to receive a memorial resolution passed by the Sheriffs.

Mr. and Mrs. Swick, owners of Copeland Sausage Co., had perished on Dec. 28, 1963, in Jacksonville's tragic Hotel Roosevelt fire, and the resolution cited them for their past generosity toward the Boys Ranch.

After the resolution was presented, the Swick family sat in on the cafetorium committee meeting, with Col. Pentland presiding, and offered to provide a large portion of the cafetorium cost if the trustees would dedicate it in memory of the hotel fire victims.

This touched off further pledges from Col. Pentland, Lake County Sheriff Willis McCall, Cecil Webb, A. D. Davis, Joe and Frances Diaz, and Dade County sheriff T. A. Buchanan.

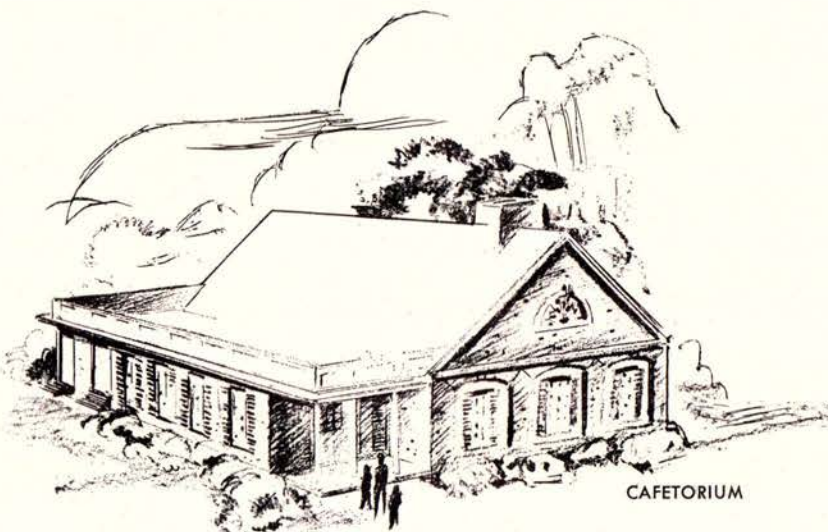
And in just 15 minutes, the committee that had waited almost a year to hold its first meeting raised a total of \$90,000. This included a \$10,000 donation made earlier by Gerald C. Holbrook, of Hobe Sound, a new trustee.

Elated over the results, Diaz headed for the nearest phone and announced that he was immediately starting a one-man campaign to raise the additional \$50,000 needed for a residence cottage.

Chances are he will.



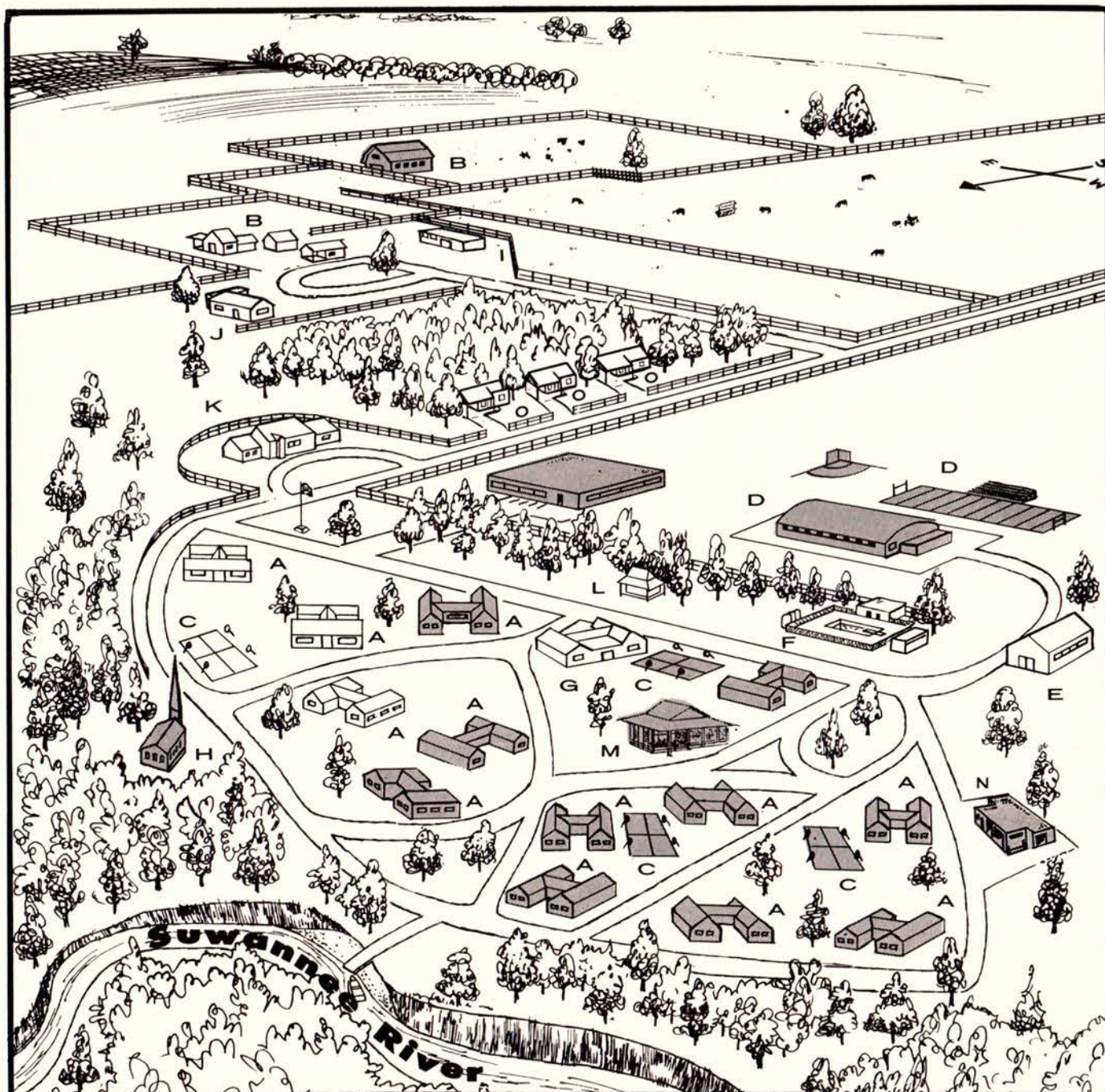
RESIDENCE COTTAGE

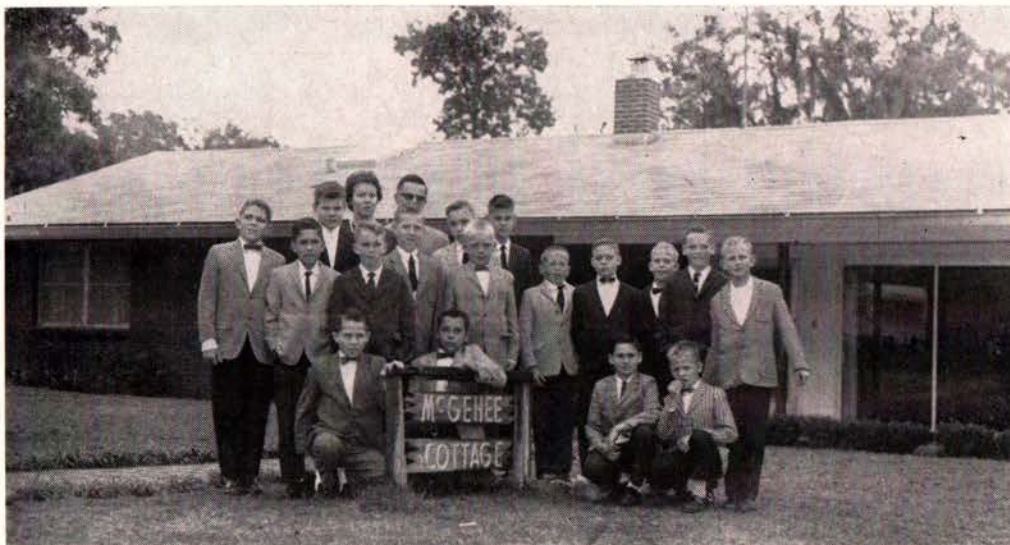

Progress ... Nothing but Progress

Optimism was busting out all over as the Boys Ranch reached the end of 1963—its 6th year of Operation

The optimist's theme song—"every day in every way I'm getting better and better"—would have applied very well to the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch in 1963, according to a progress report submitted by Harry Weaver, the Ranch Administrator.

Here are some of the highlights:

STAFF RESIDENCES—Three urgently needed staff residences were built for a bargain basement total cost of \$25,000. This opened up additional living quarters for boys in the apartment space formerly occupied by staff members, and also boosted staff morale.

BATH HOUSE—A very generous and publicity-shy young man, long a supporter of the Ranch, financed a \$4,100 bath house at the swimming pool. He also brought to the Ranch a new two-horse, four-wheel trailer which

has more than paid for itself in transporting donated animals.

WATER SYSTEM—It was providential that a new six-inch well was drilled to boost the water supply. Just one week after the new well was put into operation, the pump motor on the old well broke down. Without the new well there would have been a serious water famine for several days. Following completion of the well a 4,000-gallon water tank was installed which will later tie into a 15,000-gallon ground reservoir and aerator. One of the big jobs performed by the boys and staff members was laying a mile of

four-inch water lines. Most of the pipe was donated by Van Dorn Iron Works, a Cleveland-based firm that has long been interested in the ranch, and the boys did the pick and shovel work.

TRUCK—Worn out beyond repair after covering countless thousands of miles all over the state picking up livestock and other donations, the old Ranch truck purchased in 1958 was replaced with a new GMC. When Harry Weaver reported that funds were not immediately available in the budget to purchase the truck, Hillsborough County Sheriff Ed Blackburn Jr. and Volusia County Sheriff Rodney Thurs-

by volunteered to raise the necessary amount in their counties. They accomplished their mission a few weeks later, but the truck was purchased immediately through the generosity of Ranch Trustee Frances Diaz and her husband, Joe Diaz, of Tampa, who advanced the necessary cash as a loan.

ENROLLMENT — Our family of boys increased to a record enrollment of 60 (full capacity) representing all sections of Florida—and because of the reputation of the Ranch as a haven for needy and neglected boys, the waiting list of boys who hope to get in as soon as facilities are available continued to grow also.

HIGHER EDUCATION — Wally Edwards, formerly of Tallahassee, became the first Boys Rancher to enter college. He is a student at North Florida Junior College.

SCHOLARSHIPS—A special scholarship fund established in memory of the late Hugh Lewis, Sheriff of Suwannee County, to provide college educations for Ranchers reached a total of over \$1,000. St. Leo College, located near Dade City, also offered to give one of the Ranchers a four-year scholarship valued at over \$6,000.

FARM—A big equipment shed was built by the staff for only \$500. There was also a general upgrading of the cattle herd and the boys won many prizes in cattle shows. An important assist was received from Sears Roebuck Foundation in the form of a \$2,000 grant for improvement of the livestock program.

PERSONNEL—At year's end the staff totaled 17 full-time employees, including four husband and wife teams. "We have, I believe, the most dedicated and best staff of any facility of this kind," said Harry Weaver. Health insurance was provided as a new benefit for employees and arrangements were completed for a pension plan to go into effect in 1964.

RECORDS—Under the guidance of Joe Henry, our non-paid volunteer internal auditor, the records and accounting procedures were improved. A central supply system with one staff member in charge was also put into operation.

ASSETS—The physical assets at the Ranch totaled almost \$600,000 (compared to \$5,000 in 1957).

Where There's a Will . . .

For the information of any person who has done this or is planning to do this, the proper designation of the legatee is "THE FLORIDA SHERIFFS BOYS RANCH FUND."

Unless otherwise designated, bequests, trusts, annuities, stock certificates and similar gifts are going into an endowment fund that will provide long-range financing and future security for the Ranch.

The endowment trust fund is administered by the Exchange National Bank of Tampa, under supervision of the Boys Ranch Trustees.

"Have you looked at your responsibility as a Christian steward of your accumulated possessions?"

"Though your dependents have needs, have you considered 'tithing' your estate or providing for those needs by income from the estate, then passing the principal on to help those whose needs are great?"

AGE LIMITS—To be admitted a boy must be between the ages of 8 and 12½. Once he is admitted, Boys Ranch becomes his home and he re-

mains there through high school and college unless his home situation changes or another good home develops.

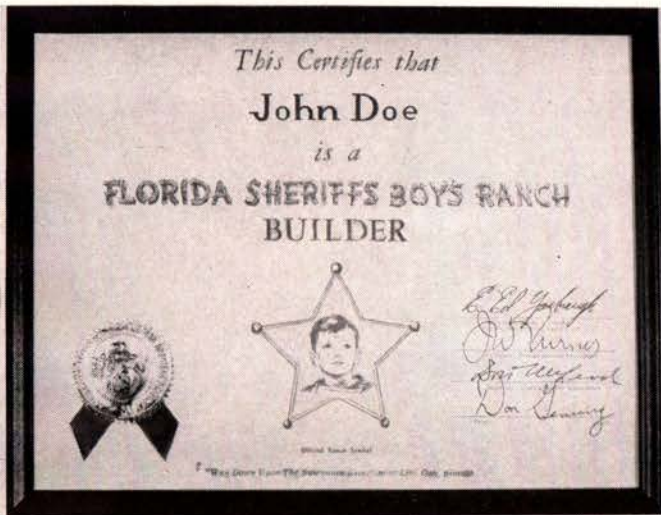
ELIGIBILITY—each boy who meets the age requirements must also be approved by the Sheriff and the Juvenile Court Judge of the county in which he resides. Applicants are referred to Sheriffs by interested citizens; and also by school, welfare and juvenile court officials.

Ranch Receives \$6,600 Scholarship

DADE CITY — The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch received from St. Leo College a four-year scholarship which will provide an almost completely expense-paid college education for one of the youngsters enrolled at the Ranch.

Valued at \$6,600, the scholarship commitment was presented to Hillsborough County Sheriff Ed Blackburn Jr., president of the Florida Sheriffs Association; and Pasco County Sheriff Basil Gaines.

Sheriff Gaines, who conferred with St. Leo officials to complete arrangements for the scholarship, said that one of the young Ranchers will be selected as the scholarship recipient upon graduation from high school.

He explained that the Ranch, a home for underprivileged boys founded by the Florida Sheriffs Association, plans to give college educations or a vocational education to all of the Ranchers.

A scholarship fund has been established for this purpose, he added, and the St. Leo gift is the largest ever received by the Ranch in this category.

Quality of Boys Ranch Herd Boosted by Sears Foundation

The cattle herd at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch is steadily improving, and much of the credit belongs to the Sears Roebuck Foundation, philanthropic agency established by the world famous mail order house.

Through contacts made by Volusia County Sheriff Rodney Thursby, who is a trustee of the Boys Ranch, Sears became interested in the Ranch in 1962 and officials of the Foundation made a thorough study of its program and needs.

They decided that the Ranch was worthy of their support and in 1963 gave a generous donation of \$2,000 to establish a livestock improvement program.

This year the Foundation gave a donation of \$2,500 which, as luck would have it, came through just when Boys Ranch Administrator Harry Weaver needed it most.

Harry had acquired for the Ranch a magnificent Black Angus bull valued at \$7,500. Dr. Jim Hicks, of Birmingham, Ala., had donated the animal, and he had said the boys could keep it if they received matching donations totaling \$7,500 during the following six months.

News of the Sears contribution was received at the Ranch shortly after the bull was acquired and gave Harry a good start toward his goal of \$7,500 in matching funds.

The Sears funds were used in 1963 to improve the cattle herd, and will be used for the same purpose in 1964. This will not only increase the value of the herd, but will also enhance the quality of the vocational agriculture program as a source of education and recreation.

Winning blue ribbons at livestock shows gives the youngsters at the ranch just as much of a thrill as winning a baseball pennant or a football trophy.

Raising cattle for exhibition at livestock shows also teaches the boys basic business methods and how to accept responsibility.

There were thousands of them — 150,000 to be exact.

Some were yellow, some were red, some purple, some orange, and they were stacked almost to the roof of the big warehouse at the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch.

They had been manufactured as plastic juice containers, but somebody goofed (the caps leaked) and the unhappy juice processor donated them to the Ranch.

"What in the world will we do with them?" moaned Ranch officials, and their question was directed mostly at Carl Stauffer, the Field Secretary of the Florida Sheriffs Association — a sort of "odd jobs man."

Stauffer went into seclusion with a handful of balls, some pipe cleaners, odds and ends of plastic and paper, and came back a few days later with a thing he called "The Sphere of Good Cheer."

He had given one of the balls a white belly band that said: "I support the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch"; attached a wraparound Christmas greeting; and topped it off with a hook fashioned from a pipe cleaner.

"It can be used as a Christmas tree decoration," he explained, "and we'll send one to each of the Honorary Members of the Sheriffs Association (the folks who help to support the Ranch with their dues)."

"Furthermore," said Stauffer, "it won't cost any more than the Christmas card we usually mail out each year from the Ranch."

"Bully," said the Ranch officials.

What the boys at the Ranch said, was not recorded, but it is a matter of record that during November and part of December they got away behind in their fishing, horseback riding, football playing, and comic book reading.

We can hardly wait until next year when you THINK of something else.

Signed — The Boys

Back came a note from Stauffer:

Dear Boys:

You just don't know how much I appreciate the gold plated "Whatzit."

In fact, I just don't know how much I appreciate it either!

I will make up my mind after I find out whether it is a token of your love (ha ha) and affection (deep belly laugh) — or a time bomb set to go off on Christmas Eve and blow the "Thinker of Work" into 1964.

Unfortunately for the boys, the "Whatzit" didn't blow up and Stauffer is mulling over ways and means of using up the remaining balls — 133,999 to be exact.

Biography of Gov. Farris Bryant

Farris Bryant became Florida's 34th Governor on January 3, 1961. For the Ocala attorney the inauguration marked the fulfillment of a long-standing ambition and the acceptance of a challenge for which he had prepared himself most of his life.

Bryant is a democrat, is serving a four-year term and under Florida law cannot succeed himself in office. The Governor's offices are in the Capitol Building in Tallahassee, and his home is the nearby state-owned Executive Residence.

As Governor, Bryant has worked closely with the Legislature of Florida in support of programs for the betterment of the state. His interests have extended beyond the boundaries of Florida, and his support of programs for the good of the South resulted in his election as 1963-64 Chairman of the 17 state Southern Governors' Conference. Through the National Governors' Conference he has spearheaded a program of Cold War Education — understanding of our times — which has attracted favorable and extensive national attention.

As a member of the National Governors' Conference he has twice been selected to be a member of a limited delegation of that body to exchange information on governmental procedures with the governors of the Japanese states. As representative of Florida's trade and tourism, Bryant has toured Europe, Japan and Latin America — providing personal leadership for the most aggressive international sales program of any state in the nation.

As Governor, Bryant has fostered businesslike operation of all facets of state government. He spearheaded legislation designed to spur industrial development and which led to reorganization of Florida's important natural resource conservation program, in which he has a continuing interest.

Road reforms, the stimulation of tourism by effective programs within the tourist industry itself, and the development of a quality education system at all scholastic levels are programs which have received vigorous gubernatorial attention. He created the Florida Council of 100, a continuing group of top business leaders working for new industry and in support of programs of progress within Florida. For development of new knowledge on the state's educational system he brought into being a special Quality Education Study Committee and led a task force on Space Era Education. He created a Council on Economic Development, and brought into being the Governor's Inter-Agency Council on Traffic Safety.

The Governor, a vigorous proponent of the rights of the states, has consistently encouraged local governments to solve problems at the local level, rather than bucking them on to state authorities. Similarly, he has pushed for full acceptance by the state of state-level responsibilities and has called on private enterprise to support state programs rather than adopting an attitude of "let the Federal Government do it."



GOV. FARRIS BRYANT

Bryant was born July 26, 1914, in Marion County, in Central Florida, near the farm his grandfather established there in 1890. His father, Cecil Bryant, maintained a farm during his son's early years although his primary occupation was as an accountant. Bryant was one of three children. His parents and sister are deceased. A brother, Eugene W. Bryant, is a Tampa accountant.

The lure of public service was instilled in Bryant early in his life. His father was one of the first members of the State Board of Accountancy and an uncle, Ion Farris, served two terms as Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives.

Bryant attended the public schools of Marion County, went to Emory University in 1931-32, but then returned to Florida where he worked his way through the state university at Gainesville, earning a degree in business administration in 1935. From the University of Florida, Bryant went to Harvard, where by waiting on tables in his off hours, he earned a degree in law from the highly regarded Harvard Law School in 1938.

From Harvard, Bryant returned to Florida to work for the State Comptroller at Tallahassee. There he met Julia Burnett, of Madison, also a native Floridian. They were married in September, 1940, and shortly thereafter moved to Ocala where Bryant began the practice of law.

The Bryants have three children, Julie, born in 1941, a student at Florida State University; Cecelia, born in 1946; and Adair, born in 1950. Both younger girls attend Tallahassee public schools.

The Bryants are Methodists and regular churchgoers. Bryant has been active in church affairs in posts ranging from Sunday School teacher to chairman of church building committees and to trusteeship of the Florida Methodist Conference.

He was first elected to public office in 1942, when he won a Marion County (Ocala) seat in the Florida House of Representatives. He resigned, however, to serve in World War II with the U. S. Navy. His three and a half years of service included tours of duty as a gunnery officer in the North Atlantic, the Irish Sea, the Gulf of Mexico, the Mediterranean, the Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean; and he was also in charge of an anti-submarine unit on Guam. Almost all of his service was under combat conditions, during which he rose in rank from Ensign to Lieutenant.

On return to civil life, Bryant was elected in 1946 for the first of five legislative terms which ended with his decision to seek the governorship in 1956. He was never opposed for the House during this period.

He served as Speaker of the 1953 House of Representatives, stressing then, as now, the need for economy at all levels of government. During his legislative career he was generally identified with programs in these areas: Constitutional revision; improved school system (he participated in development of Florida's Minimum Foundation Program); curbs on illegal gambling; flood control (he participated in development of Central and South Florida Flood Control District); junior college development; creation of a full-length Florida Turnpike; livestock fencing; tax collection consolidation and central purchasing.

Bryant was an unsuccessful candidate for Governor in 1956, and in 1960 topped a 10-man field in the Democratic primaries and won election handily in the face of the most determined Republican drive for state-wide offices of recent times. (Florida went Republican in the presidential contest.)

Bryant has been active in many projects and received many awards during his career. He is the only Floridian ever to be twice named by the state's Junior Chamber of Commerce as one of Florida's five outstanding young men. He won the Chamber's "Gold Key Distinguished Service Award" in 1948 and 1950. In 1949, '51 and '55 he was named the "Most Outstanding Member of the Florida House of Representatives" by the state's newspaper editors and political writers. In each of his sessions, he received one of the Allen Morris Cracker Politics Awards voted by members of the Legislature themselves. In 1947, he was "Most Outstanding First Term." In 1949, '51 and '53, he was "Most Valuable Member of the House"; and in 1955, he was named "Most Valuable Member of the Legislature." Bryant was also honored for his ability as a debater and is known as one of the most articulate men in Florida public life. His reliance upon television and his ability to communicate through it have been given major credit in assuring his election success.

Bryant was active in the creation of, and participated in, the Legislative Council, a research arm of the Legislature. He participated in development of the Florida Citizenship Clearing House, an organization designed to encourage students to take an interest in, and plan an active role in their government. He is co-author of "Government and Politics in Florida," a text used in political science classes at the state's universities. Bryant has twice been part of Florida's representation at Democratic National Conventions. In 1952, he served as chairman of the Florida Delegation and in 1960 was an alternate delegate. In non-governmental fields, he has participated in a wide range of civic and charitable activities ranging from community projects to the state-wide chairmanship of drives to raise funds to combat cancer, mental illness, polio and muscular dystrophy.

THE HON. TOM ADAMS, Florida's 15th Secretary of State, assumed office on January 3, 1961. He was born in Jacksonville, March 11, 1917. He attended public schools in Duval County, the Hill School at Pottstown, Pennsylvania, and received an A.B. degree in pre-law at the University of Michigan. Later he attended the University of Florida Law School. Prior to entering public life, he was successfully engaged in private business, including property management, dairy farming, timber, real estate and insurance. In 1956, he was elected to the

State Senate and was voted by his colleagues as the "Outstanding Freshman Senator." Following the 1959 session, he was voted the "Most Valuable Member of Legislature." In 1961, his first year as Secretary of State, he was named "Most Effective Administrator of a State Agency." Following the 1963 session he was again voted "Most Effective Administrator of a State Agency" to become the only state official ever to be so honored on two occasions. For leadership in higher education, he was awarded an honorary degree as Doctor of Space Education. He is listed in Marquis' "Who's Who" and is a member of the Rotary Club, Navy League, Newcomen Society, Gold Key at Florida State University, Phi Delta Theta social fraternity and Alpha Kappa Psi business fraternity. A Baptist, he is married and has three daughters.

THE HON. JAMES W. KYNES, JR., 29th Attorney General of the State of Florida, was appointed by Gov. Farris Bryant, January 15, 1964. He succeeded the Hon. Richard W. Ervin, who was appointed to the Florida Supreme Court by Gov. Bryant to fill a vacancy created by the retirement of the late Justice Glenn Terrell. Mr. Kynes was born August 31, 1928, at Marianna, Florida, and attended the public schools there. He received a B.S. degree in Public Administration from the University of Florida; served as a First Lieutenant in the U. S. Air Force during the

Korean War; and returned to his Alma Mater for an LL.B. degree. He was admitted to the Florida Bar in 1955. During his college career he earned letters in both football and baseball; was elected to Blue Key, honorary leadership fraternity; and was elected to the University Hall of Fame. He entered the private practice of law in Ocala, in 1955; and accepted an appointment as Executive Assistant to Gov. Farris Bryant in 1961 — the position he was holding at the time he was appointed Attorney General. Honors: named Ocala's "Outstanding Young Man," in 1958, and one of Florida's five outstanding young men, in 1960, by the Junior Chamber of Commerce; served as national president of the University of Florida Alumni Association in 1960. He is a member of the Methodist Church and the following organizations: Kappa Alpha social fraternity; Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity; American Legion; AVC; and the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He is married to the former Marjorie Hiatt, of Marianna, and they have three sons.

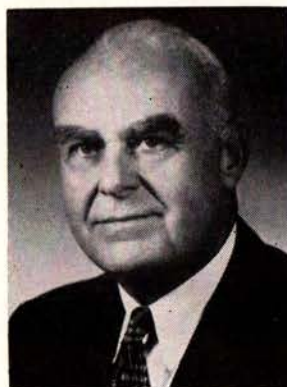

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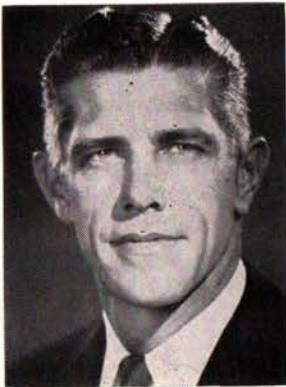

THE HON. EDWIN L. MASON, was born in Portsmouth, Virginia, in 1916 and moved to Miami, Florida in May, 1925. He attended the public schools of Dade County and graduated from Edison High School. Carson of Duval, George Watts Jr. of Washington, Ross E. Boyer of Sarasota and Don Genung of Pinellas.

In addition to jumping into the investigation of major crimes, the bureau serves research, education and information functions on a statewide basis that were nonexistent before it was created.

For instance, McLeod is proud of the Florida Crime Bulletin, published and distributed two or three times a week, which lists the state's most-wanted criminals and gives their history and photographs.

MOBILE LABORATORY

The bureau operates a mobile crime laboratory with which agents are equipped to completely process evidence at crime scenes. To serve the whole state, two more mobile labs are needed.

The newest of the bureau's responsibilities is administering the Florida Law Enforcement Academy, which will serve as an orientation school for freshman law officers and a sort of graduate school to bring the veterans up to date on new techniques.

Sponsored by the Florida Sheriffs

Association, the school is to open in several weeks in a brand-new \$115,000 building in Tallahassee. The bureau will provide two full time instructors. McLeod is the director.

Last, but not least, the bureau serves as a clearing house for information among all of Florida's law enforcement agencies.

This McLeod classifies as one of its most important functions. Before the bureau was set up, police officers could answer statewide questions only by asking all other agencies one by one.

Polygraph Not Just Anti-Crime Tool

PENSACOLA — More extensive use of the lie detector in pre-employment checking would reveal the job-candidate's integrity and point up his criminal tendencies, according to Joe R. Townsend, a polygraph examiner of the Florida Sheriffs Bureau.

Most people are familiar with polygraph work in crime investigation, Townsend said, but are not aware that 75 per cent of its usage today lies in fields outside police activities. Pre-employment checking is one of the biggest commercial uses, he added, especially for such businesses as supermarkets and department stores.

Advance lie detector testing of prospective employees is not widespread in the South, Townsend said.

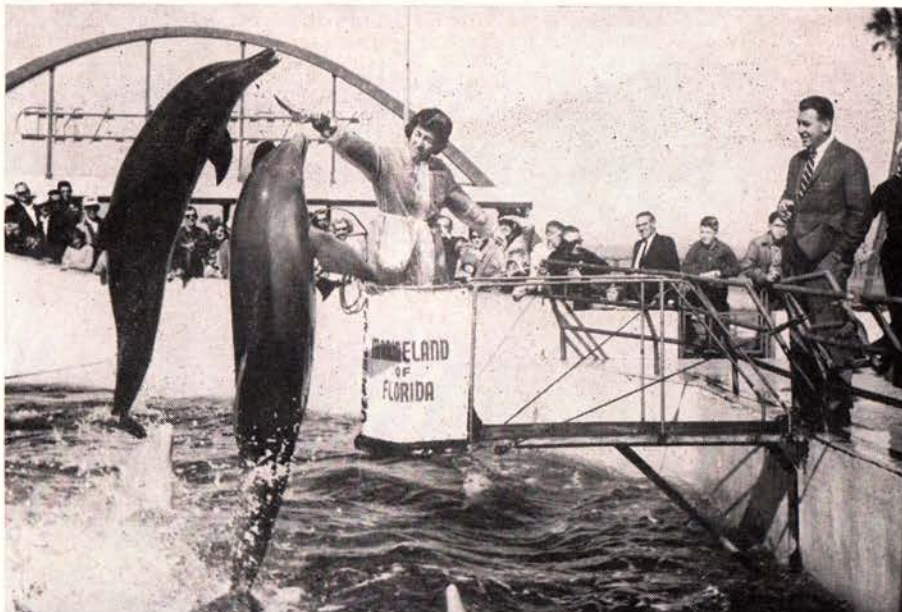
"That is something I cannot understand," he stated, "because it has been proven most successful in the East and on the West Coast."

Such testing would reveal abnormalities such as homosexuality and actually could bring out many things the employer desired to know, he pointed out.

"Best I've Seen"

ST. PETERSBURG — Don Rademacher, technical consultant with the National Council on Crime and Delinquency's Southern Regional Office at Austin, Tex., termed Sheriff Don Genung's Youth Study Center "The best program I've seen inside a jail."

Rademacher came here to make a survey of the county's facilities for juvenile offenders. He said he is disturbed over present policies of some police departments in putting juvenile offenders in jail when they might possibly be released to their parents immediately.

60 Minutes Flat

KEY WEST — Just one hour after two hooded men robbed a finance company of \$500, Sheriff Henry Haskins' deputies apprehended the pair and held them for investigation.

Picked up at a roadblock in Marathon, the two identified themselves as Raiford state prison parolees. Deputies found hooded sweatshirts in the trunk of the car and a .38 caliber revolver in the glove compartment.

The sheriff said the two men walked into the finance company office and demanded money from Mrs. Elizabeth Pinder who was alone at the counter. They bound and gagged her but she managed to free herself after they left and reported the robbery to the sheriff's office.

Two-Way Street

BONITA SPRINGS—Law enforcement is a two-way street—and the job of clearing the innocent is as important as finding the guilty.

Larry Edward Underwood, 24, of Orlando, encountered a good illustration of this when he was arrested for speeding.

Sharp-eyed officers found blood and hair on the under side of his car and immediately suspected him of being involved in a fatal hit-and-run accident which had occurred here the previous day.

However, when the hair and blood samples were analyzed at the Florida Sheriffs Bureau crime laboratory, in Tallahassee, they were found to have come from an animal, not a human.

Underwood, much relieved, was charged only with reckless driving.

The Sheriffs Bureau laboratory also gave Sheriff Flanders Thompson and his men some new clues to work on by reporting that minute samples of red paint were found on the clothing of the hit-and-run victim.

Buchanan's Goals

MIAMI—A program to aid underprivileged youths in the community; and expansion of a campaign to make his employees more courtesy-conscious are among the goals of Dade County Sheriff T. A. Buchanan.

The courtesy campaign will require deputies to be more active in giving friendly warnings to wayward drivers and in aiding motorists with car trouble on the highways.

Buckels' Story

KISSIMMEE — When R. M. (Bob) Buckels became sheriff in 1953, the jail was in the basement of the County Court House. His force and equipment comprised one deputy and one mobile radio.

Today Buckels has a new, modern jail, eight outside deputies, three office girls, and ten mobile radios. He has added three deputies in the past three years and hopes to add two more in 1964.

The sheriff's office handled 3,000 cases in 1963, an 87 per cent increase over 1961, and spent only \$97,000, a 20 per cent increase. An average of from thirty to thirty-five prisoners were fed each day in 1963. The cost of feeding each prisoner three meals a day is 76 cents.

The sheriff reported also that each of the eight deputies travels 3,500 to 3,800 miles every month for a total yearly mileage of about 360,000 miles.

That Old Gang

FERNANDINA BEACH — Eight teen-agers picked up here were charged with breaking and entering.

Most of the loot, including four shot-guns, two rifles, eight transistor radios and several watches taken from a jewelry store, and a private home was recovered.

No One Man Job

BRADENTON — Sheriff J. Kenneth Gross' department is not a one-man operation. If it were, it would require nearly eleven years for one man to do all the work completed in 1963.

The department patrolled 759,061 miles in Manatee County during the year, handled 12,144 complaints and 5,542 civil processes.

The relative cost of operating the department has declined during the past few years, the sheriff reported. The cost was 5.48 cents of the dollar in 1958; 5.51 in 1951; 4.85 in 1962, and 4.47 cents in 1963.

They're a Nuisance

BB guns and pellet guns are a nuisance.

Ask any sheriff.

Each year, in the weeks following the spending debauchery of Christmas, sheriffs are plagued with complaints about property damage and injuries inflicted by these dangerous weapons given to youngsters by doting parents.

In Orange County (Orlando) a window shooting spree shattered some 50 panes of glass at various times and locations during the early part of this year.

Aside from the reckless vandalism of this amazing score, there's the matter of law enforcement manpower and equipment involved in investigating the rash of complaints — manpower and equipment that could be better used in solving serious crimes.

In Brevard County (Titusville) businessmen reported several thousand dollars worth of damage wrought by the BB brigade.

This prompted Sheriff Leigh Wilson to take firm measures. He ordered his men to confiscate any BB gun found in the possession of a child under the age of 16 not accompanied by an adult.

In Charlotte County (Punta Gorda) Sheriff Travis Parnell announced a similar crackdown and promised strict enforcement of the law which forbids the use of BB guns by youngsters under 16 unless an adult is present and supervising.

Under this law any parent permitting a child under 16 to use an air rifle without supervision can be found guilty of a misdemeanor and fined up to \$300 or sent to jail for up to 30 days.

GAINESVILLE — Volunteers from all types of civilian vocations give Alachua County Sheriff Joe Crevasse reserve strength — a sort of "Sunday Punch" — for all types of emergencies.

Bolstering his force of experienced deputies is a non-paid auxiliary group capable of handling any situation from searching for drowning victims to flying airplanes to look for lost children or escaped convicts.

Thomas E. Napier, commandant of the unit, is an industrial sales manager with an electronic firm; Lieut. John I. Ruth, traffic manager, is a watch supervisor with the Federal Aviation Agency; Lieut. Herman Breland, training officer, is a chemist with the agricultural experiment station soils department; Lieut. Dewey R. Henderson, mounted posse leader, a horse trainer; and Lieut. Shellie Downs who is employed with the University of Florida science department.

The reserves were organized in the Fall of 1962 as a civil defense measure during the Cuban crisis. They now number 127 men who participate in training programs and work at the jail or with deputies.
