

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR



DEAR MEMBERS.

As I reflect over the past year, I am proud of the accomplishments made by the staff of the Florida Sheriffs Association (FSA) on behalf of the sheriffs, their personnel, and the citizens of our great state. This 2022 Annual

Report will provide more details, but I want to highlight some achievements.

The 2022 Legislative Session proved to be historic due to strong bipartisan support. Numerous public safety bills were passed that will have a lasting positive impact on the safety and security of Floridians for years to come. A few of the key bills supported by the FSA included legislation to help retain and recruit new personnel, strengthen laws to ensure juvenile offenders can be held or monitored more closely before their cases are heard, school safety, mental and substance abuse treatments, and drug control measures were further improved. Through the sheriffs' efforts and relationships with their legislators, Florida remains one of the safest places to live.

Supporting the youth remains a top priority for FSA and we operate several programs developed for children and young adults. For instance, through the FSA Scholarship program, children of full-time sheriff's office employees are eligible to apply for scholarships to help them achieve their educational goals. This year the FSA awarded 25 scholarships worth \$2,000 each.

Each year the FSA Board of Directors vote to make substantial donations to the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches (FSYR), and this year was no exception. The President and Chair of the Board presented checks totaling \$280,000 to the FSYR in support of their work with at-risk children. Additionally, we assist in their fundraising efforts and have been able to raise over \$345,000

through the generosity of our members. This year, we also had the opportunity to support the college fund of the Ranchers who were able to help with our annual Law Enforcement Memorial Ceremony.

Finally, it is hard to ever forget the destruction from Hurricane Ian when it hit southwest Florida as a category 4 hurricane on September 28, 2022, causing devastating damage and terrible loss of life. Sheriffs from across the state and their personnel were on sight immediately, despite their own losses, providing rescue and aid to those in need. The FSA Task Force mobilized units from around the state and the FSA staffed the state Emergency Operations Center to provide organization and direction.

As you review the information in this report, you will see more about the programs and services we are able to provide, including \$2,134,829 that was used to invest in various grants for sheriffs' office personnel, donated to charities that share a similar mission, and services provided to help the sheriffs keep their communities safe. This would not be possible without the continued support of our honorary, business, and law enforcement members, as well as our annual business partners. Thank you for your valuable support. GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS



BIG WINS:

- >> HB 3 included several provisions aimed at bolstering law enforcement recruitment and retention, including providing one-time bonuses of up to \$5,000 to new officers in Florida, the creation of the Florida Law Enforcement Academy Scholarship Program to cover basic recruit training expenses and a host of other provisions that will make sure that Florida is the most law enforcement-friendly state in the country. HB 3 also included a provision that nullified a recent Supreme Court decision that required sheriffs to obtain approval from their Board of County Commissioners before they could move money between budget categories. HB 3 nullified that ruling and ensures sheriffs retain autonomy over their budgets as they have done for the past 50 years.
- >> A comprehensive school safety law (HB 1421) passed this year and will implement several of the recent recommendations from the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Commission that will strengthen the security of schools across Florida.
- HB 1262 made several positive changes to the Commission on Mental Health and Substance Abuse, currently chaired by Charlotte County Sheriff Bill Prummell. The law will allow the Commission to start meeting in-person beginning July 1, extends the Commission's initial report due date to January 1, 2023, and allows the Commission to access any information or records necessary to carry out its duties, including confidential and exempt records that may be in the possession of state agencies.

- 3,685 bills filed
- 285 passed and went to the Governor's desk
- ★ FSA monitored over 350 public safety bills
- ★ Passage of a record \$112 BILLION state budget
- >> In addition, \$15 million of recurring funds were included in the state budget to provide pay raises for deputies and correctional officers in the 29 fiscally constrained sheriff's offices.
- >> Another key budgetary issue in the state budget extended DROP for law enforcement officers to allow a member of the Special Risk Class who is a law enforcement officer and who is a DROP participant on or after July 1, 2022, to participate in DROP for up to 36 months beyond the current 60-month period.

PRIORITIES:

- >> The FSA's priority bill related to juvenile justice allows judges to decide whether to place a juvenile that has committed serious crimes in secure detention for more than the current 21-day time limitation and increases the electronic monitoring program by allowing law enforcement to supervise any court-ordered electronic monitoring of juveniles on supervised release.
- The Florida Model Jail Standards bill strengthens the current Florida Model Jail Standards and ensures that all jails, regardless of who runs them, are held to the same high standards.
- >> A carryover priority bill of the sheriffs implements two of the recommendations from the Statewide Task Force on Opioid Abuse, including adding methamphetamine to the list of controlled substances under the murder statute and increasing penalties for selling a controlled substance within 1,000 feet of a drug rehab facility. The law also increases the mandatory minimum sentences under the drug trafficking statute for trafficking in certain amounts of fentanyl analogues.
