



FLORIDA SHERIFFS YOUTH RANCHES

Thanks to the support of FSA members and donors, **\$651,829** was donated to the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches (FSYR). These funds are used to provide valuable services to our youth and cover food costs for children, sponsorships for full-time residential services, or pay for summer camps for the boys and girls.



EXPLORERS

Thanks to the support of FSA members and donors, **\$36,738** was donated to the Florida Explorers Association (FSEA).

The Florida Sheriff's Explorers Association (FSEA) is made up of explorer posts with young men and women between 14 to 21 years old who are exploring the field of law enforcement. The explorers attend State Delegate Meetings in March, June, September, and December. At a week-long state conference in June, the explorers elect new board members for the next year and compete in crisis intervention, crime scenes, high risk traffic stops training, and a shooting competition.



The Florida Deputy Sheriffs Association (FDSA) gave a total of **\$368,325** to deputies and their families through the Lend a Hand Fund.







RESOURCES

FLORIDA SHERIFFS ACCREDITATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- **\$77,193** was provided to fiscally constrained agencies to support their accreditation efforts.
- **Eight** additional agencies obtained accreditation software to begin the file-building process, and were provided training and support on software operations.
- Newly accredited agencies were **mentored** on re-accreditation requirements to help ensure continued certification.
- **The Hardee County Sheriff's Office received full accreditation** from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA).

- **Five court security classes** were held throughout the state.
- **141** law enforcement professionals trained.

TRAINING

FLORIDA SHERIFFS TRAINING INSTITUTE

- ★ **14,997** members enrolled online.
- ★ **5,208** hours of online training completed.
- ★ The operation team provided in-person training to **1,622** attendees for **43,784** hours of training.

ADDITIONAL TRAINING

- ★ The Florida Sheriffs Association hosted its first **Women's Leadership Academy** in Tallahassee.
- ★ The annual **Internal Affairs Training** was conducted at the Florida Sheriffs Association.
- ★ An **Emergency Response Planning course** was held at the Florida Sheriffs Association in Tallahassee. The three-day class prepared law enforcement agencies to respond to potential hurricanes and other emergency events.

COMMANDERS ACADEMY

- ★ Graduated **Class 16** and **Class 17**
- ★ **75** law enforcement leaders graduated the program.





CRISIS INTERVENTION TRAINING (CIT)

- ★ **29** classes were sponsored by FSA.
- ★ **578** law enforcement professionals trained.
- ★ Three CIT Coordinator Academies were held this year. These academies trained law enforcement professionals in the curriculum needed to deliver CIT training within their agencies. **37** individuals attended the training.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING COMMITTEE

Over \$101,000 in grants were distributed to sheriff's offices across the state to aid in prosecuting traffickers and supporting victims of trafficking, resulting in **10** operations and **173** arrests.

OFFICER WELLNESS

- ★ The FSA, in partnership with FDLE and the FPCA, offered **eight** Peer Critical Incident Seminars, giving law enforcement professionals coping skills and resources to recover from critical incidents. More than 100 people completed the program.
- ★ Coordinated and delivered a training for a new chaplains' program, **servicing over 100 chaplains** across participating agencies as they support the spiritual needs of their employees.



COOPERATIVE PURCHASING PROGRAM

SALES BY CONTRACT



Launched in 1993, the Florida Sheriffs Association Cooperative Purchasing Program (CPP) provides sheriffs' offices and other government agencies access to competitively bid contracts for the vehicles and equipment they rely on. What began as a way to purchase pursuit vehicles at a statewide rate has grown into a comprehensive catalog that includes radios, tires, fire trucks, tractors, trailers, SWAT vehicles, and more. CPP is for government use only and is not open to the general public.



GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

PRIORITIES

FSA's priority bills were passed by the legislature and were signed into law by Governor DeSantis.

» PROTECTING FLORIDA'S CHILDREN

HB 777, sponsored by Florida Rep. Rachel Plakon and former Florida Sen. Jay Collins, was a top priority for sheriffs carried over from 2024. The law increased the penalty for luring a child under 14 for unlawful purposes to a felony. By elevating the crime to a felony, officers can obtain search warrants — something previously not possible when the offense was only a misdemeanor. This common-sense, bipartisan reform gave law enforcement the tools they need to stop predators before they harm a child.

» REINFORCING LAW ENFORCEMENT'S ABILITY TO SOLVE CASES

During legislative session, a court ruled a search warrant for electronic devices was stale after 10 days. Working with Florida Rep. Danny Nix and former Florida Sen. Jay Collins, HB 1371 was amended to extend the return period for digital device warrants from 10 to 45 days. With digital forensics units facing growing caseloads and technical complexities, this change ensures agencies have the time needed to conduct thorough and lawful searches. The bill also revised a 2023 mandate requiring law enforcement to report missing persons to the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs) within two hours, extending it to 90 days. This allows officers to focus on initial investigations while preserving NamUs' purpose — solving long-term missing persons cases.

» THE TRISTIN MURPHY ACT

Thanks to the leadership of Florida Senate President Ben Albritton and the advocacy of FSA President and Charlotte County Sheriff Bill Prummell, Florida took a major step this year towards transforming how the state responds to individuals with serious mental illness who encounter the criminal justice system. The Tristin Murphy Act — named for Tristin Murphy, a young father who tragically died by suicide in a Florida prison in 2021 — is a landmark piece of legislation. Tristin was not a career criminal; he was a young man battling severe mental health challenges. His story highlighted the urgent need for smarter, more compassionate approaches that prioritize mental health treatment over incarceration for those who need it most. The new law establishes model

procedures for diverting certain nonviolent defendants with mental illness into treatment programs rather than jail. By expanding mental health diversion options within the criminal justice system, Florida equipped law enforcement, prosecutors, and judges with better tools to ensure individuals receive the help they need — while still maintaining public safety.



» FLORIDA SHERIFFS YOUTH LEARNING CENTER

For the second consecutive year, the Legislature invested in the creation of the Florida Sheriffs Youth Learning Center, appropriating another \$5 million toward the project this year. With \$15 million in state funding now secured, FSA will seek the final round of funding during the 2026 session. Once completed, the Center will highlight more than 200 years of sheriff history and provide an educational hub with immersive exhibits, videos, and hands-on activities for children to learn about law enforcement. The Youth Learning Center will introduce students to careers such as a law enforcement officer, correctional deputy, dispatcher, or civilian roles within a sheriff's office.

FLORIDA MODEL JAIL STANDARDS COMMITTEE

- ★ FSA hosted annual Jail Summit in Charlotte County with **188** participants.
- ★ **100% participation** and completion by all Florida jails for Annual Jail Inspections, Annual Jail Medical Inspections, and Annual Unannounced Jail Inspections.
- ★ Served as correction advisor to FDLE in the three-day Corrections Basic Curriculum Design update workshop.
- ★ Hosted online and in-person training across the state of Florida training over **275** sheriffs office personnel. Training included:
 - PREA Program Implementation and Investigations in Flagler County and at FSA headquarters.
 - FMJS Inspector Certification in Flagler and Martin County
 - Leadership Development training in Okaloosa County



CRIMINAL APPREHENSION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

- ★ Committed **\$5,000** in potential reward funds towards tips to assist with solving crimes. These cases are still pending and are under investigation.
- ★ Three of these cases were solved and **\$15,000** was paid out to tipsters. These cases were a homicide in Marion County, a child sex abuse case in Osceola County, and a homicide in Miami-Dade County.



COLD CASE ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Cold Case Advisory Commission met twice during the year and conducted homicide training at each meeting. **73** law investigators attended these trainings.
